H.B. No. 3668

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

2 relating to grants for disaster response by nonprofit food banks.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

4 SECTION 1. Subchapter B, Chapter 418, Government Code, is
5 amended by adding Section 418.026 to read as follows:

6 Sec. 418.026. GRANTS FOR DISASTER RESPONSE BY NONPROFIT
7 FOOD BANKS. (a) In this section, "nonprofit food bank" means a
8 nonprofit organization that solicits, warehouses, and
9 redistributes edible food to agencies that feed needy families and
10 individuals.

11 (b) Using money available for the purpose, the office of the
12 governor shall establish a program to provide grants to nonprofit
13 organizations in this state for distribution to nonprofit food
14 banks to build the capacity of the nonprofit food banks to respond
15 to disasters.

16 (c) To be eligible to receive a grant under this section, a
17 nonprofit organization must:

18 (1) have at least five years of experience
19 coordinating a statewide network of nonprofit food banks and
20 charitable organizations that distribute food to needy or low
21 income individuals during disasters; and

22 (2) be a member of the Texas Voluntary Organizations
23 Active in Disaster.

24 (d) Grant money awarded under this section may be used only

1 to reimburse a nonprofit food bank for all or part of the costs
2 incurred by the nonprofit food bank as a result of:

3 (1) maintaining an inventory of emergency food boxes
4 in preparation for a disaster;

5 (2) purchasing, storing, and transporting food for
6 distribution during a disaster; and

7 (3) purchasing capital equipment necessary to operate
8 during a disaster, including back-up generators, mobile food
9 pantries, trucks, meal preparation units, forklifts, technology,
10 and other equipment.

11 (e) The office of the governor shall establish procedures to
12 administer the grant program, including a procedure for the
13 submission of a proposal and a procedure to be used by the office to
14 evaluate a proposal.

15 (f) The office of the governor shall enter into a contract
16 that includes performance requirements with each grant recipient.
17 The office shall monitor and enforce the terms of the contract. The
18 contract must authorize the office to recoup grant money from a
19 grant recipient for failure of the grant recipient to comply with
20 the terms of the contract.

21 (g) The office of the governor may solicit and accept gifts,
22 grants, and donations from any source for the purpose of awarding
23 grants under this section.

24 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
