17	institutional review board established under Section 108.0135 for
18	review and approval of the request.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 5

SECTION 1. Subchapter D, Chapter 1001, Health and Safety 6

Code, is amended by adding Section 1001.089 to read as follows:

Sec. 1001.089. PUBLIC HEALTH DATA. (a) In this section:

(1) "Essential public health services" has the meaning 9

assigned by Section 121.002. 10

(2) "Local public health entity" means a local health 11

unit, local health department, or public health district. 12

(b) Notwithstanding Sections 81.103, 82.009, 88.002(b), 13

92.006, and 192.002(b), the department may enter into an agreement 14

with a local public health entity that provides essential public 15

health services to provide the entity access to: 16

(1) identified public health data relating to the 17

entity's jurisdiction and any public health data relating to a 18

jurisdiction contiguous to the entity; and 19

(2) deidentified public health data maintained by the 20

department relating to the jurisdiction of any other local public 21

health entity. 22

(c) The public health data obtained through the agreement 23

may be used only in the provision of essential public health 24

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- 2 (d) Access to public health data includes necessary
- 3 identified public health data required for an infectious disease
- 4 investigation conducted under Chapter 81.
- 5 (e) For any public health data request that is not subject
- 6 to Subsection (b), (c), or (d) and except as provided by Subsection
- 7 (f), the department shall establish a review process for the
- 8 consideration of public health data requests relating to essential
- 9 public health services or public health research. The process must
- 10 evaluate:
- (1) the public health benefit and purpose of the

- 13 (2) the privacy of the individuals whose data is

- 15 (3) the management of the data by the requestor,

- (f) A local public health entity seeking public health data
