H.B. No. 411

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to the terminology used to refer to an individualized 3 education program team. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 SECTION 1. Section 5.001, Education Code, is amended by 5 amending Subdivision (5-a) and adding Subdivision (5-b) to read as 6 7 follows: (5-a) "Individualized education program team" has the 8 9 meaning assigned by 20 U.S.C. Section 1414(d)(1)(B). "Mental health condition" means a persistent or 10 (5**-**b) 11 recurrent pattern of thoughts, feelings, or behaviors that: 12 (A) constitutes a mental illness, disease, or 13 disorder, other than or in addition to epilepsy, substance abuse, or an intellectual disability; or 14 impairs a person's social, emotional, (B) 15 or educational functioning and increases the risk of developing a 16 17 condition described by Paragraph (A). 18 SECTION 2. Subchapter A, Chapter 7, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 7.011 to read as follows: 19 Sec. 7.011. USE OF TERMINOLOGY CONSISTENT WITH INDIVIDUALS 20 21 WITH DISABILITIES EDUCATION ACT. (a) The legislature and the Texas Legislative Council are directed, with respect to drafting or 22 23 amending any new or existing statute or resolution, and the commissioner, the agency, and all other state agencies are 24

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1 directed, with respect to the proposing, adopting, or amending of 2 new or existing rules and the producing of state agency reference materials or publications, including electronic media, to avoid 3 using the phrases "admission, review, and dismissal committee" or 4 5 "ARD committee." (b) In enacting, revising, proposing, adopting, amending, 6 7 or producing new or existing statutes, resolutions, rules, or state 8 agency materials, the legislature, the Texas Legislative Council, the commissioner, the agency, and all other state agencies are 9 10 directed to replace, as appropriate, the phrases described in Subsection (a) with the preferred phrases "individualized 11 education program team" or "IEP team." 12 (c) A statute, resolution, or rule is not invalid solely 13

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13 (c) A statute, resolution, or rule is not invalid solely 14 because it does not employ this section's preferred phrases.

15 SECTION 3. Section 25.007(b), Education Code, is amended to 16 read as follows:

(b) In recognition of the challenges faced by students who are homeless or in substitute care, the agency shall assist the transition of students who are homeless or in substitute care from one school to another by:

(1) ensuring that school records for a student who is homeless or in substitute care are transferred to the student's new school not later than the 10th working day after the date the student begins enrollment at the school;

(2) developing systems to ease transition of a student
who is homeless or in substitute care during the first two weeks of
enrollment at a new school;

(3) developing procedures for awarding credit,
 including partial credit if appropriate, for course work, including
 electives, completed by a student who is homeless or in substitute
 care while enrolled at another school;

5 (4) developing procedures to ensure that a new school 6 relies on decisions made by the previous school regarding placement 7 in courses or educational programs of a student who is homeless or 8 in substitute care and places the student in comparable courses or 9 educational programs at the new school, if those courses or 10 programs are available;

(5) promoting practices that facilitate access by a student who is homeless or in substitute care to extracurricular programs, summer programs, credit transfer services, electronic courses provided under Chapter 30A, and after-school tutoring programs at nominal or no cost;

16 (6) establishing procedures to lessen the adverse 17 impact of the movement of a student who is homeless or in substitute 18 care to a new school;

(7) entering into a memorandum of understanding with the Department of Family and Protective Services regarding the exchange of information as appropriate to facilitate the transition of students in substitute care from one school to another;

(8) encouraging school districts and open-enrollment charter schools to provide services for a student who is homeless or in substitute care in transition when applying for admission to postsecondary study and when seeking sources of funding for postsecondary study;

1 (9) requiring school districts, campuses, and open-enrollment charter schools to accept a referral for special 2 education services made for a student who is homeless or in 3 substitute care by a school previously attended by the student, and 4 5 to provide comparable services to the student during the referral process or until the new school develops an individualized 6 education program for the student; 7

8 (10) requiring school districts, campuses, and 9 open-enrollment charter schools to provide notice to the child's 10 educational decision-maker and caseworker regarding events that 11 may significantly impact the education of a child, including:

12 (A) requests or referrals for an evaluation under
13 Section 504, Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. Section 794), or
14 special education under Section 29.003;

15 (B) <u>individualized education program team</u>
16 [admission, review, and dismissal committee] meetings;

17 (C) manifestation determination reviews required 18 by Section 37.004(b);

(D) any disciplinary actions under Chapter 37 forwhich parental notice is required;

(E) citations issued for Class C misdemeanor
 offenses on school property or at school-sponsored activities;

23 (F) reports of restraint and seclusion required 24 by Section 37.0021;

25 (G) use of corporal punishment as provided by26 Section 37.0011; and

27 (H) appointment of a surrogate parent for the

1 child under Section 29.0151;

(11) developing procedures for allowing a student who
is homeless or in substitute care who was previously enrolled in a
course required for graduation the opportunity, to the extent
practicable, to complete the course, at no cost to the student,
before the beginning of the next school year;

7 (12) ensuring that a student who is homeless or in 8 substitute care who is not likely to receive a high school diploma 9 before the fifth school year following the student's enrollment in 10 grade nine, as determined by the district, has the student's course 11 credit accrual and personal graduation plan reviewed;

(13) ensuring that a student in substitute care who is in grade 11 or 12 be provided information regarding tuition and fee exemptions under Section 54.366 for dual-credit or other courses provided by a public institution of higher education for which a high school student may earn joint high school and college credit;

(14) designating at least one agency employee to act as a liaison officer regarding educational issues related to students in the conservatorship of the Department of Family and Protective Services; and

21 (15) providing other assistance as identified by the 22 agency.

23 SECTION 4. Section 25.043(h), Education Code, is amended to 24 read as follows:

25 (h) This section does not affect:

(1) a right or obligation under Subchapter A, Chapter
 27 29, or under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20

U.S.C. Section 1400 et seq.) regarding the individual placement
 decisions of <u>an individualized education program team</u> [the school
 district admission, review, and dismissal committee]; or

4 (2) the right of a school district or teacher to remove5 a student from a classroom under Chapter 37.

6 SECTION 5. Sections 26.0081(a) and (b), Education Code, are 7 amended to read as follows:

8 (a) The agency shall produce and provide to school districts sufficient copies of a comprehensive, easily understood document 9 that explains the process by which an individualized education 10 program is developed for a student in a special education program 11 12 and the rights and responsibilities of a parent concerning the process. The document must include information a parent needs to 13 14 effectively participate in an individualized education program 15 team [admission, review, and dismissal committee] meeting for the parent's child. 16

17 (b) The agency will ensure that each school district 18 provides the document required under this section to the parent as 19 provided by 20 U.S.C. Section 1415(b):

(1) as soon as practicable after a child is referred to determine the child's eligibility for admission into the district's special education program, but at least five school days before the date of the initial meeting of the <u>individualized education program</u> <u>team [admission, review, and dismissal committee]</u>; and

(2) at any other time on reasonable request of the26 child's parent.

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SECTION 6. Section 28.006(g), Education Code, is amended to

1 read as follows:

2 A school district shall notify the parent or guardian of (q) 3 each student in kindergarten or first or second grade who is determined, on the basis of reading instrument results, to be at 4 5 risk for dyslexia or other reading difficulties. The district shall implement an accelerated reading instruction program that provides 6 reading instruction that addresses reading deficiencies to those 7 8 students and shall determine the form, content, and timing of that program. The individualized education program team [admission, 9 10 review, and dismissal committee] of a student who participates in a district's special education program under Subchapter B, Chapter 11 29, and who does not perform satisfactorily on a reading instrument 12 under this section shall determine the manner in which the student 13 14 will participate in an accelerated reading instruction program 15 under this subsection.

SECTION 7. Sections 28.0211(i), (i-1), and (i-2), Education
Code, are amended to read as follows:

The individualized education program team [admission, 18 (i) 19 review, and dismissal committee] of a student who participates in a district's special education program under Subchapter A, Chapter 20 29, and who does not perform satisfactorily on an assessment 21 instrument specified under Subsection (a) and administered under 22 Section 39.023(a) or (b) must meet before the student 23 is 24 administered the assessment instrument for the second time. The team [committee] shall determine: 25

(1) the manner in which the student will participatein an accelerated instruction program under this section; and

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(2) whether the student will be promoted in accordance with Subsection (i-1) or retained under this section. 2

3 (i-1) At a meeting of the individualized education program team [admission, review, and dismissal committee] of a student 4 5 under Subsection (i), the team [committee] may promote the student to the next grade level if the team [committee] concludes that the 6 student has made sufficient progress in the measurable academic 7 8 goals contained in the student's individualized education program developed under Section 29.005. A school district that promotes a 9 10 student under this subsection is not required to provide an additional opportunity for the student to perform satisfactorily on 11 12 the assessment instrument.

(i-2) Not later than September 1 of each school year, a 13 14 school district must notify the parent or person standing in 15 parental relation to a student enrolled in the district's special education program under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, of the options of 16 17 the individualized education program team [admission, review, and dismissal committee] under Subsections (i) and (i-1) if the student 18 19 does not perform satisfactorily on an assessment instrument.

SECTION 8. Section 28.0213(e), Education Code, is amended 20 to read as follows: 21

(e) For a student in a special education program under 22 Subchapter A, Chapter 29, who does not perform satisfactorily on an 23 24 assessment instrument administered under Section 39.023(a), (b), or (c), the student's <u>individualized education program team</u> 25 26 [admission, review, and dismissal committee] shall design the 27 program to:

1 (1) enable the student to attain a standard of annual 2 growth on the basis of the student's individualized education 3 program; and

4 (2) if applicable, carry out the purposes of Section5 28.0211.

6 SECTION 9. Sections 28.025(b-11), (b-14), (c-7), and (c-8),
7 Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

In adopting rules under Subsection (b-1), the State 8 (b-11) Board of Education shall allow a student who is unable to 9 10 participate in physical activity due to disability or illness to substitute one credit in English language arts, mathematics, 11 12 science, or social studies, one credit in a course that is offered for credit as provided by Section 28.002(g-1), or one academic 13 14 elective credit for the physical education credit required under 15 Subsection (b-1)(8). A credit allowed to be substituted under this subsection may not also be used by the student to satisfy a 16 17 graduation requirement other than completion of the physical education credit. The rules must provide that the determination 18 19 regarding a student's ability to participate in physical activity will be made by: 20

(1) if the student receives special education services under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, the student's <u>individualized</u> <u>education program team</u> [admission, review, and dismissal <u>committee</u>];

(2) if the student does not receive special education
services under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, but is covered by Section
504, Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. Section 794), the

1 committee established for the student under that Act; or

(3) if <u>a team or a committee</u> [each of the committees]
described by <u>Subdivision</u> [Subdivisions] (1) or [and] (2) is
inapplicable, a committee established by the school district of
persons with appropriate knowledge regarding the student.

6 (b-14) In adopting rules under Subsection (b-1), the State 7 Board of Education shall allow a student who, due to disability, is 8 unable to complete two courses in the same language in a language other than English, as provided under Subsection (b-1)(5), to 9 10 substitute for those credits two credits in English language arts, mathematics, science, or social studies or two credits in career 11 12 and technology education, technology applications, or other academic electives. A credit allowed to be substituted under this 13 14 subsection may not also be used by the student to satisfy a 15 graduation credit requirement other than credit for completion of a language other than English. The rules must provide that the 16 17 determination regarding a student's ability to participate in language-other-than-English courses will be made by: 18

(1) if the student receives special education services under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, the student's <u>individualized</u> <u>education program team</u> [admission, review, and dismissal <u>committee</u>]; or

(2) if the student does not receive special education
services under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, but is covered by Section
504, Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. Section 794), the
committee established for the student under that Act.

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(c-7) Subject to Subsection (c-8), a student who is enrolled

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3 (1) successfully completing, with or without 4 modification of the curriculum:

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5 (A) the curriculum requirements identified by 6 the State Board of Education under Subsection (a); and

7 (B) the additional endorsement curriculum
8 requirements prescribed by the State Board of Education under
9 Subsection (c-2); and

10 (2) successfully completing all curriculum 11 requirements for that endorsement adopted by the State Board of 12 Education:

13 (A) without modification of the curriculum; or

(B) with modification of the curriculum, provided that the curriculum, as modified, is sufficiently rigorous as determined by the student's <u>individualized education program</u> team [admission, review, and dismissal committee].

18 (c-8) For purposes of Subsection (c-7), the <u>individualized</u> 19 <u>education program team</u> [admission, review, and dismissal 20 committee] of a student in a special education program under 21 Subchapter A, Chapter 29, shall determine whether the student is 22 required to achieve satisfactory performance on an end-of-course 23 assessment instrument to earn an endorsement on the student's 24 transcript.

25 SECTION 10. Section 29.001, Education Code, is amended to 26 read as follows:

27 Sec. 29.001. STATEWIDE PLAN. The agency shall develop, and

modify as necessary, a statewide design, consistent with federal 1 law, for the delivery of services to children with disabilities in 2 3 this state that includes rules for the administration and funding of the special education program so that a free appropriate public 4 5 education is available to all of those children between the ages of three and 21. The statewide design shall include the provision of 6 services primarily through school districts and shared services 7 8 arrangements, supplemented by regional education service centers. The agency shall also develop and implement a statewide plan with 9 10 programmatic content that includes procedures designed to:

(1) ensure state compliance with requirements for supplemental federal funding for all state-administered programs involving the delivery of instructional or related services to students with disabilities;

15 (2) facilitate interagency coordination when other 16 state agencies are involved in the delivery of instructional or 17 related services to students with disabilities;

periodically assess statewide personnel needs in 18 (3) 19 all areas of specialization related to special education and pursue meet those needs through a 20 strategies to consortium of representatives from regional education service centers, local 21 education agencies, and institutions of higher education and 22 23 through other available alternatives;

(4) ensure that regional education service centers
throughout the state maintain a regional support function, which
may include direct service delivery and a component designed to
facilitate the placement of students with disabilities who cannot

1 be appropriately served in their resident districts;

2 (5) allow the agency to effectively monitor and 3 periodically conduct site visits of all school districts to ensure that rules adopted under this section are applied in a consistent 4 5 and uniform manner, to ensure that districts are complying with those rules, and to ensure that annual statistical reports filed by 6 the districts and not otherwise available through the Public 7 8 Education Information Management System under Sections 48.008 and 48.009 are accurate and complete; 9

10 (6) ensure that appropriately trained personnel are 11 involved in the diagnostic and evaluative procedures operating in 12 all districts and that those personnel routinely serve on district 13 <u>individualized education program teams</u> [admissions, review, and 14 <u>dismissal committees</u>];

(7) ensure that an individualized education program for each student with a disability is properly developed, implemented, and maintained in the least restrictive environment that is appropriate to meet the student's educational needs;

(8) ensure that, when appropriate, each student with a disability is provided an opportunity to participate in career and technology and physical education classes, in addition to participating in regular or special classes;

(9) ensure that each student with a disability is
provided necessary related services;

(10) ensure that an individual assigned to act as a
surrogate parent for a child with a disability, as provided by 20
U.S.C. Section 1415(b), is required to:

No. 411 1 (A) complete a training program that complies with minimum standards established by agency rule; 2 3 (B) visit the child and the child's school; 4 (C) consult with persons involved in the child's 5 including teachers, caseworkers, court-appointed education, volunteers, guardians ad litem, attorneys ad litem, foster parents, 6 and caretakers; 7 review the child's educational records; 8 (D) 9 (E) attend meetings of the child's 10 individualized education program team [admission, review, and dismissal committee]; 11 12 (F) exercise independent judgment in pursuing the child's interests; and 13 14 (G) exercise the child's due process rights under 15 applicable state and federal law; and 16 ensure that each district develops a process to (11)17 be used by a teacher who instructs a student with a disability in a regular classroom setting: 18 19 (A) to request a review of the student's individualized education program; 20 21 to provide input in the development of the (B) student's individualized education program; 22 23 (C) that provides for a timely district response 24 to the teacher's request; and (D) that provides for notification 25 to the 26 student's parent or legal guardian of that response. SECTION 11. Section 29.004(a-1), Education Code, is amended 27

1 to read as follows:

(a-1) If a school district receives written consent signed 2 3 by a student's parent or legal guardian for a full individual and initial evaluation of a student at least 35 but less than 45 school 4 5 days before the last instructional day of the school year, the evaluation must be completed and the written report of 6 the evaluation must be provided to the parent or legal guardian not 7 8 later than June 30 of that year. The student's individualized [admission, review, and dismissal education program team 9 committee] shall meet not later than the 15th school day of the 10 following school year to consider the evaluation. If a district 11 12 receives written consent signed by a student's parent or legal guardian less than 35 school days before the last instructional day 13 14 of the school year or if the district receives the written consent 15 at least 35 but less than 45 school days before the last instructional day of the school year but the student is absent from 16 17 school during that period on three or more days, Subsection (a)(1) applies to the date the written report of the full individual and 18 initial evaluation is required. 19

SECTION 12. Sections 29.005(a), (b), (b-1), (c), and (g),
Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

(a) Before a child is enrolled in a special education program of a school district, the district shall establish <u>an</u> <u>individualized education program team</u> [a committee] composed of the persons required under 20 U.S.C. Section 1414(d) to develop the child's individualized education program. If a <u>team</u> [committee] is required to include a regular education teacher, the regular

1 education teacher included must, to the extent practicable, be a
2 teacher who is responsible for implementing a portion of the
3 child's individualized education program.

(b) The <u>individualized education program team</u> [committee]
shall develop the individualized education program by agreement of
the <u>team</u> [committee] members or, if those persons cannot agree, by
an alternate method provided by the agency. Majority vote may not be
used to determine the individualized education program.

9 (b-1) The written statement of the individualized education 10 program must document the decisions of the <u>individualized education</u> 11 <u>program team</u> [committee] with respect to issues discussed at each 12 <u>team</u> [committee] meeting. The written statement must include:

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(1) the date of the meeting;

14 (2) the name, position, and signature of each member15 participating in the meeting; and

16 (3) an indication of whether the child's parents, the 17 adult student, if applicable, and the administrator agreed or 18 disagreed with the decisions of the <u>team</u> [<del>committee</del>].

individualized education program 19 (C) If the is not developed by agreement, the written statement of the program 20 required under 20 U.S.C. Section 1414(d) must include the basis of 21 the disagreement. Each member of the individualized education 22 program team [committee] who disagrees with the individualized 23 24 education program developed by the team [committee] is entitled to include a statement of disagreement in the written statement of the 25 26 program.

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(g) The individualized education program team [committee]

may determine that a behavior improvement plan or a behavioral 1 intervention plan is appropriate for a student for whom the team 2 3 [committee] has developed an individualized education program. If the team [committee] makes that determination, the behavior 4 improvement plan or the behavioral intervention plan shall be 5 included as part of the student's individualized education program 6 and provided to each teacher with responsibility for educating the 7 8 student.

9 SECTION 13. Section 29.008(c), Education Code, is amended 10 to read as follows:

When a student, including one for whom the state is 11 (c) 12 managing conservator, is placed primarily for care or treatment 13 reasons in a private residential facility that operates its own private education program, none of the costs may be paid from public 14 15 education funds. If a residential placement primarily for care or treatment reasons involves a private residential facility in which 16 17 the education program is provided by the school district, the 18 portion of the costs that includes appropriate education services, 19 as determined by the individualized education program team [the school district's admission, review, and dismissal committee], 20 shall be paid from state and federal education funds. 21

22 SECTION 14. Sections 29.011(a) and (a-1), Education Code, 23 are amended to read as follows:

(a) The commissioner shall by rule adopt procedures for
compliance with federal requirements relating to transition
services for students who are enrolled in special education
programs under this subchapter. The procedures must specify the

1 manner in which a student's <u>individualized education program team</u>
2 [admission, review, and dismissal committee] must consider, and if
3 appropriate, address the following issues in the student's
4 individualized education program:

5 (1) appropriate student involvement in the student's6 transition to life outside the public school system;

7 (2) if the student is younger than 18 years of age,
8 appropriate involvement in the student's transition by the
9 student's parents and other persons invited to participate by:

11 (B) the school district in which the student is 12 enrolled;

the student's parents; or

(A)

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(3) if the student is at least 18 years of age,
involvement in the student's transition and future by the student's
parents and other persons, if the parent or other person:

16 (A) is invited to participate by the student or17 the school district in which the student is enrolled; or

(B) has the student's consent to participate
pursuant to a supported decision-making agreement under Chapter
1357, Estates Code;

(4) appropriate postsecondary education options,
 including preparation for postsecondary-level coursework;

(5) an appropriate functional vocational evaluation;
(6) appropriate employment goals and objectives;
(7) if the student is at least 18 years of age, the
availability of age-appropriate instructional environments,
including community settings or environments that prepare the

1 student for postsecondary education or training, competitive 2 integrated employment, or independent living, in coordination with 3 the student's transition goals and objectives;

4 (8) appropriate independent living goals and 5 objectives;

(9) appropriate circumstances for facilitating 6 а 7 referral of a student or the student's parents to a governmental 8 agency for services or public benefits, including a referral to a governmental agency to place the student on a waiting list for 9 10 public benefits available to the student, such as a waiver program established under Section 1915(c), Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 11 Section 1396n(c)); and 12

13 (10) the use and availability of appropriate:

14 (A) supplementary aids, services, curricula, and 15 other opportunities to assist the student in developing 16 decision-making skills; and

17 (B) supports and services to foster the student's
18 independence and self-determination, including a supported
19 decision-making agreement under Chapter 1357, Estates Code.

20 (a-1) A student's <u>individualized education program team</u> 21 [admission, review, and dismissal committee] shall annually review 22 the issues described by Subsection (a) and, if necessary, update 23 the portions of the student's individualized education program that 24 address those issues.

25 SECTION 15. Section 29.0112(e), Education Code, is amended 26 to read as follows:

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(e) A school district shall:

Section 29.019(e), Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 23 24 (e) Nothing in this section prohibits a school district from 25 using individualized education program facilitation as the district's preferred method of conducting initial and annual 26 individualized education program team [admission, review, and 27

1 dismissal committee] meetings.

2 SECTION 19. Section 29.020(a), Education Code, is amended 3 to read as follows:

4 The agency shall develop rules in accordance with this (a) 5 section applicable to the administration of a state individualized education program facilitation project.
