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A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to establishing the Texas Climate Change Mitigation and 3 Adaptation Commission to study and address the impacts of climate change in this state. 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 5 6 SECTION 1. (a) This Act shall be known as the Texas Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Act. 7 The legislature finds that: 8 (b) climate change is real and is the overriding 9 (1)challenge of the 21st century; 10 11 (2) climate change poses immediate and long-term 12 threats to this state's economy, sustainability, security, and way 13 of life; countless scientific studies have concluded that 14 (3) greenhouse gas emissions are a leading contributing factor to 15 16 global warming; and 17 addressing climate change requires a two-pronged (4)approach that includes: 18 19 (A) the reduction of activities that contribute to global warming; and 20 21 (B) adaptations to mitigate the impacts of 22 climate change on this state. The legislature further finds that: 23 (c) on December 12, 2015, 195 countries at the 21st 24 (1)

1 Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change adopted an agreement addressing 2 greenhouse gas emissions mitigation, adaptation, and finance, 3 known as the Paris Agreement. The Paris Agreement entered into 4 5 force on November 4, 2016, and is the largest concerted global effort to combat climate change to date. The agreement will be 6 implemented to reflect equity and the principle of common but 7 8 differentiated responsibilities and respective capabilities, in light of different national circumstances. Under the agreement, 9 the parties will: 10

11 (A) set greenhouse gas emissions reduction 12 goals;

13 (B) record and communicate information through a14 transparency framework; and

15 (C) provide support to undeveloped countries16 through a finance mechanism; and

17 (2) the Paris Agreement aims to strengthen the global 18 response to the threat of climate change in the context of 19 sustainable development and efforts to eradicate poverty, 20 including by:

(A) holding the increase in the global average
temperature to well below two degrees Celsius above preindustrial
levels while pursuing efforts to limit the temperature increase to
1.5 degrees Celsius above preindustrial levels to significantly
reduce the risks and impacts of climate change;

(B) developing ways to adapt to the adverseimpacts of climate change and to foster climate resilience and low

No. 1044 1 greenhouse gas emissions development in a manner that does not threaten food production; and 2 3 (C) making finance flows consistent with а pathway toward low greenhouse gas emissions and climate-resilient 4 5 development. 6 (d) The legislature declares that: 7 notwithstanding federal action, the legislature (1)8 supports the goals of the Paris Agreement to combat climate change 9 and the effects of climate change on environments, economies, and communities around the world; 10 this state recognizes that to promote a statewide 11 (2) 12 response to climate change, collaboration and cooperation are needed in the following areas: 13 14 (A) early warning systems; 15 (B) emergency preparedness; 16 (C) slow onset events; 17 (D) events that may involve irreversible and permanent loss and damage; 18 19 (E) comprehensive risk assessment and 20 management; 21 (F) risk insurance facilities, climate risk pooling, and other insurance solutions; 22 23 (G) noneconomic losses; and 24 (H) resilience of communities, livelihoods, and 25 ecosystems; and it is in the best interests of this state to: 26 (3) 27 (A) expand strategies and mechanisms to reduce

1 greenhouse gas emissions statewide through the reduction of energy 2 use, adoption of renewable energy, and control of air pollution 3 among all governmental entities, industries, and sectors, 4 including transportation;

5 (B) expand only the strategies and mechanisms under Paragraph (A) that use the best available science, 6 technologies, and policies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and 7 8 that are closely aligned with the climate change principles and goals adopted in the Paris Agreement and in this state's share of 9 10 obligations within the expectations apportioned to the United States in the agreement, notwithstanding federal action; 11

12 (C) strive to formulate and communicate13 long-term low greenhouse gas emissions development strategies; and

(D) take actions to conserve and enhance long-term sinks and reservoirs of greenhouse gases by prioritizing the development of parks and greenways, and the restoration of coastal forests and wetlands.

SECTION 2. The purpose of this Act is to document this state's commitment to combating climate change and improving this state's resilience to climate change by systematically reducing greenhouse gas emissions and by aligning with the principles and contributing to the goals set by the Paris Agreement through the creation of the Texas Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission.

25 SECTION 3. Subtitle C, Title 5, Health and Safety Code, is 26 amended by adding Chapter 396 to read as follows:

H.B. No. 1044 1 CHAPTER 396. TEXAS CLIMATE CHANGE MITIGATION AND ADAPTATION 2 COMMISSION Sec. 396.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter: 3 4 (1) "Commission" means the Texas Climate Change 5 Mitigation and Adaptation Commission. (2) "Institution of higher education" has the meaning 6 7 assigned by Section 61.003, Education Code. Sec. 396.002. LIBERAL CONSTRUCTION. This chapter shall be 8 liberally construed to minimize future risk to the residents and 9 10 environment of this state. Sec. 396.003. COMMISSION CREATED; COMPOSITION. (a) 11 The Texas Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission is 12 13 created. 14 (b) The commission is composed of: 15 (1) one member appointed by the governor; 16 (2) one member appointed by the lieutenant governor; 17 (3) one member appointed by the governor from a list of names submitted by the speaker of the house of representatives; 18 19 (4) one member appointed by the governor from a list of names submitted by the most senior member of the minority party of 20 21 the house of representatives; 22 (5) one member appointed by the governor from a list of names submitted by the most senior member of the minority party of 23 24 the senate; and 25 (6) the following members of which two-thirds are 26 appointed evenly between the governor and the lieutenant governor, 27 and the remaining one-third are appointed by the governor from a

2	(c) In addition to the members listed in Subsection (b), the
3	chairs of the commission may request the participation or input of
4	other individuals as the chairs determine is necessary, including:
5	(1) other members of the public;
6	(2) individuals with expertise in the area of climate
7	change; and
8	(3) local, state, and federal officials involved in
9	climate change adaptation planning.
10	Sec. 396.004. JOINT CHAIRS; MEETINGS; COMPENSATION. (a)
11	The commission shall elect two of the commission's members to serve
12	as joint chairs of the commission.
13	(b) The commission shall meet at the call of either joint
14	chair.
15	(c) A commission member is not entitled to receive
16	compensation for service on the commission but is entitled to
17	reimbursement for actual and necessary expenses, including travel
18	expenses, incurred by the member in performing commission duties.
19	Sec. 396.005. TERMS; VACANCY. (a) Members of the
20	commission serve staggered six-year terms, with eight or nine
21	members' terms expiring February 1 of each odd-numbered year.
22	(b) A vacancy on the commission shall be filled in the same
23	manner as the original appointment.
24	Sec. 396.006. DUTIES OF COMMISSION. The commission shall:
25	(1) establish climate change mitigation and
26	adaptation strategies, including goals to help guide planning and
27	statewide implementation of the strategies, using the latest and

No. 1044 best available scientific analysis, risk assessment tools, and 1 other information the commission considers necessary to monitor and 2 3 forecast the impact of climate change at the state, regional, and 4 local levels; 5 (2) provide policy direction, facilitation, coordination, and planning to federal, state, and local agencies, 6 7 and other persons as appropriate; (3) identify: 8 9 (A) persons, communities, industries, and 10 ecosystems of this state vulnerable to impacts related to climate 11 change; 12 (B) potential economic ramifications of impacts related to climate change; and 13 14 (C) existing climate change mitigation and 15 adaptation efforts at the federal, state, and local levels; 16 (4) make recommendations for meeting or exceeding this 17 state's climate change <u>mitigation goals established by the</u> 18 commission; 19 (5) assess the capacity and availability of existing resources and identify new sources of revenue necessary to address 20 climate change mitigation and adaptation; and 21 22 (6) advise the governor, legislature, and local governments of this state on the economic and budgetary 23 24 ramifications of climate change impacts, mitigation, and 25 adaptation. 26 Sec. 396.007. INTERNET WEBSITE. The commission shall 27 develop and maintain an Internet website that:

1	(1) includes a mission statement relating to the
2	duties and goals of the commission under this chapter; and
3	(2) describes the actions, plans, and policies of the
4	commission, and the results, if any, of such actions, plans, and
5	policies.
6	Sec. 396.008. BIENNIAL PROGRESS REPORT. The commission
7	shall identify the information necessary to track this state's
8	progress in implementing the climate change mitigation and
9	adaptation strategies established by the commission under Section
10	396.006 and shall submit a biennial progress report to the governor
11	and the legislature not later than the 20th day before the date each
12	regular session of the legislature convenes.
13	Sec. 396.009. COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW; REPORT. Not later than
14	the 20th day before the date the regular session of the 90th
15	Legislature convenes, and before the end of each successive
16	five-year period after that date, the commission shall conduct a
17	comprehensive review of the statewide implementation of the climate
18	change mitigation and adaptation strategies established by the
19	commission under Section 396.006 and submit a report on the
20	commission's findings and recommendations to the governor, the
21	legislature, and the governing body of each municipality and county
22	in this state.
23	Sec. 396.010. SEA LEVEL RISE VULNERABILITY AND ADAPTATION
24	REPORT. (a) The commission shall develop and make publicly
25	available a sea level rise vulnerability and adaptation report that
26	identifies:
27	(1) the major areas of this state that are or will be

1	impacted by sea level rise during the next 30 years;
2	(2) the sea level rise impacts reasonably expected to
3	occur during the next 30 years in each area identified under
4	Subdivision (1), based on the latest and best available scientific
5	research;
6	(3) the economic ramifications of sea level rise; and
7	(4) applicable federal laws, policies, and programs
8	affecting areas of this state impacted by sea level rise.
9	(b) The report developed under Subsection (a) must include
10	the commission's recommendations for planning, management, and
11	adaptation relating to hazards associated with sea level rise.
12	(c) In developing the report under Subsection (a), the
13	commission shall:
14	(1) solicit public comment; and
15	(2) coordinate with the federal, state, and local
16	agencies involved in climate change adaptation planning.
17	(d) The commission shall evaluate and update the sea level
18	rise vulnerability and adaptation report developed under this
19	section at least once every five years.
20	SECTION 4. (a) As soon as practicable after the effective
21	date of this Act:
22	(1) the governor and lieutenant governor shall appoint
23	the 25 members to the Texas Climate Change Mitigation and
24	Adaptation Commission as provided by Section 396.003, Health and
25	Safety Code, as added by this Act; and
26	(2) the governor, lieutenant governor, and speaker of
27	the house of representatives or their designees shall meet to

1 apportion the appointments under Section 396.003(b)(6), Health and 2 Safety Code, as added by this Act.

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3 (b) The initial members of the Texas Climate Change 4 Mitigation and Adaptation Commission appointed under this section 5 shall draw lots to determine which members will serve terms 6 expiring February 1, 2023, which members will serve terms expiring 7 February 1, 2025, and which members will serve terms expiring 8 February 1, 2027.

9 SECTION 5. Not later than September 30, 2022, the Texas 10 Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission shall develop 11 and make publicly available the initial sea level rise 12 vulnerability and adaptation report required by Section 396.010, 13 Health and Safety Code, as added by this Act.

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SECTION 6. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
