## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4
- SECTION 1. Subtitle B, Title 9, Health and Safety Code, is 5
- amended by adding Chapter 786 to read as follows: 6
- 7 CHAPTER 786. PROHIBITED ADVERSE EMPLOYMENT ACTION AGAINST CERTAIN
- 8 FIRST RESPONDERS
- 9 Sec. 786.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
- (1) "First responder" means a public safety employee 10
- of a state agency or political subdivision of this state whose 11
- duties include responding rapidly to an emergency. 12
- 13 (2) "Mental illness" has the meaning assigned by
- 14 Section 571.003.

- Sec. 786.002. APPLICABILITY. This chapter applies only to 15
- 16 a first responder who is:
- 17 (1) a peace officer licensed under Chapter 1701,
- Occupations Code; 18
- 19 (2) fire protection personnel as defined by Section
- 20 419.021, Government Code; or
- 21 (3) emergency medical services personnel licensed
- under Chapter 773. 22
- Sec. 786.003. DISCRIMINATION PROHIBITED. (a) Except as 23
- provided by Subsection (b), an employer of a first responder may not 24

- 1 suspend, terminate, or take any other adverse employment action,
- 2 including a demotion in rank or reduction of pay or benefits,
- 3 against a first responder solely because the employer knows or
- 4 believes that the first responder has a mental illness.
- 5 (b) Notwithstanding Subsection (a), an employer of a first
- 6 responder who knows or believes that the first responder has a
- 7 mental illness may take an appropriate adverse employment action
- 8 that is necessary to ensure public safety.
- 9 Sec. 786.004. CLAIM OR DEFENSE BASED ON ADVERSE EMPLOYMENT
- 10 ACTION; DAMAGES. (a) A person may assert a violation of this
- 11 chapter as a claim against an employer, including a governmental
- 12 entity, in a judicial or administrative proceeding or as a defense
- 13 in a judicial or administrative proceeding.
- 14 (b) An aggrieved person may seek:
- 15 (1) compensatory damages;
- 16 (2) reasonable attorney's fees and court costs; and
- 17 (3) any other appropriate relief.
- 18 Sec. 786.005. SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY WAIVED. Sovereign
- 19 immunity to suit is waived and abolished to the extent of liability
- 20 created by this chapter.
- 21 SECTION 2. This Act applies only to a suspension,
- 22 termination, or other adverse employment action taken by an
- 23 employer against a first responder on or after the effective date of
- 24 this Act. A suspension, termination, or other adverse employment
- 25 action that is taken by an employer against a first responder before
- 26 the effective date of this Act is governed by the law in effect on
- 27 the date the employment action is taken, and the former law is

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- 1 continued in effect for that purpose.
- 2 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
