## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

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- 2 relating to requiring the Department of Information Resources to
- 3 conduct a study concerning the cybersecurity of small businesses.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS. In this Act:
- 6 (1) "Department" means the Department of Information
- 7 Resources.
- 8 (2) "Tax incentive" means any exemption, deduction,
- 9 credit, exclusion, waiver, rebate, discount, deferral, or other
- 10 abatement or reduction of state tax liability of a business entity.
- 11 SECTION 2. STUDY CONCERNING CYBERSECURITY OF SMALL
- 12 BUSINESSES. (a) The department, in collaboration with the Texas
- 13 Workforce Commission, shall conduct a study to:
- 14 (1) assess how small businesses can improve their
- 15 ability to protect against cybersecurity risks and threats to the
- 16 businesses' supply chain and to mitigate and recover from
- 17 cybersecurity incidents; and
- 18 (2) determine the feasibility of establishing a grant
- 19 program for small businesses to receive funds to upgrade their
- 20 cybersecurity infrastructure and to participate in cybersecurity
- 21 awareness training.
- 22 (b) In conducting the study, the department must:
- 23 (1) consider the current best practices used by small
- 24 businesses for cybersecurity controls for their information

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- 1 systems to protect against supply chain vulnerabilities, which may
- 2 include best practices related to:
- 3 (A) software integrity and authenticity; and
- 4 (B) vendor risk management and procurement
- 5 controls, including notification by vendors of any cybersecurity
- 6 incidents related to the vendor's products and services;
- 7 (2) identify barriers or challenges for small
- 8 businesses in purchasing or acquiring cybersecurity products or
- 9 services;
- 10 (3) consider and estimate the cost of any available
- 11 tax incentives or other state incentives to increase the ability of
- 12 small businesses to acquire products and services that promote
- 13 cybersecurity;
- 14 (4) assess the availability of resources small
- 15 businesses need to respond to and recover from a cybersecurity
- 16 event;
- 17 (5) study the impact of cybersecurity incidents that
- 18 have affected small businesses, including the resulting costs to
- 19 small businesses;
- 20 (6) to the extent possible, identify any emerging
- 21 cybersecurity risks and threats to small businesses resulting from
- 22 the deployment of new technologies; and
- 23 (7) study any other issue the department and the Texas
- 24 Workforce Commission determine would have a future impact on
- 25 cybersecurity for small businesses with supply chain
- 26 vulnerabilities.
- 27 (c) In determining the feasibility of establishing a grant

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- 1 program described by Subsection (a)(2) of this section, the study
- 2 must:
- 3 (1) identify the most significant and widespread
- 4 cybersecurity incidents impacting small businesses, vendors, and
- 5 others in the supply chain network of small businesses;
- 6 (2) consider the amount small businesses currently
- 7 spend on cybersecurity products and services and the availability
- 8 and market price of those services; and
- 9 (3) identify the type and frequency of training
- 10 necessary to protect small businesses from supply chain
- 11 cybersecurity risks and threats.
- SECTION 3. REPORT. (a) Not later than December 31, 2022,
- 13 the department shall submit to the standing committees of the
- 14 senate and house of representatives with jurisdiction over small
- 15 businesses and cybersecurity a report that contains:
- 16 (1) the results of the study conducted under Section 2
- 17 of this Act, including the feasibility of establishing a grant
- 18 program described by Subsection (a)(2) of that section; and
- 19 (2) recommendations for best practices and controls
- 20 for small businesses to implement in order to update and protect
- 21 their information systems against cybersecurity risks and threats.
- (b) The department shall make the report available on the
- 23 department's Internet website.
- SECTION 4. EXPIRATION OF ACT. This Act expires September 1,
- 25 2023.
- 26 SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Act takes effect
- 27 immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members

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- 1 elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas
- 2 Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for
- 3 immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
