## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to a designated essential caregiver for residents of
3	certain long-term care facilities during public health
4	emergencies.
5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
6	SECTION 1. Subtitle A, Title 4, Health and Safety Code, is
7	amended by adding Chapter 226 to read as follows:
8	CHAPTER 226. LONG-TERM CARE FACILITY ESSENTIAL CAREGIVER
9	DESIGNATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS
10	Sec. 226.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
11	(1) "Essential caregiver" means an individual
12	designated as a resident's essential caregiver in accordance with
13	Section 226.003.
14	(2) "Executive commissioner" means the executive
15	commissioner of the Health and Human Services Commission.
16	(3) "Long-term care facility" means:
17	(A) a facility licensed or regulated under
18	Chapter 242, 247, or 252; and
19	(B) a state supported living center as defined by
20	Section 531.002.
21	(4) "Public health emergency" means an immediate
22	threat from a communicable disease as defined by Section 81.003
23	that:
24	(A) poses a high risk of death or serious

- 1 long-term disability to a large number of people in the general
- 2 population; and
- 3 (B) creates a substantial risk of public exposure
- 4 because of the disease's high level of contagion or the method by
- 5 which the disease is transmitted.
- 6 (5) "Resident" means an individual, including a
- 7 patient or client, who resides in a long-term care facility.
- 8 Sec. 226.002. PURPOSE. The purpose of this chapter is to
- 9 require long-term care facilities to develop and implement policies
- 10 and procedures for residents to designate an essential caregiver
- 11 and to ensure that during a public health emergency the facility
- 12 provides an essential caregiver with meaningful access to the
- 13 resident to:
- 14 (1) detect resident concerns and advocate on behalf of
- 15 the resident;
- (2) observe and communicate to facility staff and
- 17 health care providers important details and changes related to the
- 18 resident's condition or behavior;
- 19 (3) assist the resident in managing complex or
- 20 <u>critical</u> information;
- 21 (4) provide emotional support and ensure the
- 22 <u>resident's personal values and care preferences are considered by</u>
- 23 <u>facility staff and health care providers;</u>
- 24 (5) alleviate caregiving tasks of facility staff and
- 25 health care providers;
- 26 (6) preserve and promote the resident's quality of
- 27 life; and

- 1 (7) promote and help maintain a sense of continuity,
- 2 identity, and autonomy for the resident.
- 3 Sec. 226.003. POLICIES AND PROCEDURES FOR DESIGNATION AND
- 4 USE OF ESSENTIAL CAREGIVER. (a) The executive commissioner by rule
- 5 shall require each long-term care facility to develop and implement
- 6 policies and procedures allowing each resident to designate an
- 7 essential caregiver to whom the facility will provide, in
- 8 accordance with and in the manner described by this chapter,
- 9 meaningful access to the resident during a public health emergency.
- 10 (b) The policies and procedures must:
- 11 (1) require long-term care facility staff and health
- 12 care providers to consult each resident to determine the most
- 13 appropriate individual to designate as the resident's essential
- 14 caregiver;
- 15 <u>(2)</u> establish criteria for individuals to be
- 16 designated as a resident's essential caregiver, provided the
- 17 criteria allow the resident to designate a family member, a friend,
- 18 an outside caregiver, or a volunteer who has provided regular care
- 19 and support to the resident;
- 20 (3) if demonstrated by one or more individuals' past
- 21 involvement with the resident or necessitated by the resident's
- 22 particular needs, allow a resident to designate more than one
- 23 essential caregiver;
- 24 (4) authorize a resident's essential caregiver to
- 25 regularly assist facility staff and health care providers in
- 26 providing care and emotional support to the resident, including
- 27 during a public health emergency;

- 1 (5) except as otherwise provided by Section 226.004
- 2 due to the imposition of quarantine restrictions, require facility
- 3 staff to work cooperatively with each resident and essential
- 4 caregiver to develop a visitation schedule that ensures:
- 5 (A) the caregiver has meaningful access to the
- 6 resident during a public health emergency;
- 7 (B) the caregiver is allowed access to the
- 8 resident to provide caregiving services:
- 9 (i) for the greater of three hours each day
- 10 or the hours necessary for the caregiver to complete the services;
- 11 and
- 12 (ii) in a manner, including during evening
- 13 and weekend visits, that accommodates the caregiver's work,
- 14 child-care obligations, or other schedule; and
- 15 <u>(C)</u> the number of caregivers admitted to the
- 16 facility at any given time is appropriate for maintaining the
- 17 health, safety, and security of each resident, staff member, and
- 18 health care provider; and
- 19 (6) ensure that each essential caregiver has access to
- 20 information on the proper use of personal protective equipment
- 21 <u>during a public health emergency.</u>
- Sec. 226.004. REQUIREMENTS AND RESTRICTIONS FOR ESSENTIAL
- 23 CAREGIVER ACCESS DURING PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY. (a) A long-term
- 24 care facility must designate a central point of entry during a
- 25 public health emergency where each essential caregiver must enter
- 26 and register. Before entering the facility, facility staff or
- 27 health care providers must properly screen each caregiver for

- 1 symptoms of a disease or disorder related to a public health
- 2 emergency in the same manner the facility staff and health care
- 3 providers are screened.
- 4 (b) An essential caregiver admitted to a long-term care
- 5 facility during a public health emergency must wear all necessary
- 6 personal protective equipment while inside the facility, including
- 7 eye protection or a face mask as necessary, and must frequently
- 8 sanitize the caregiver's hands. The facility shall provide an
- 9 appropriate number of hand sanitizing or other stations located
- 10 throughout the facility for caregivers to maintain proper hygiene
- 11 while inside the facility.
- 12 (c) A long-term care facility shall establish procedures
- 13 allowing an essential caregiver to walk outside with the resident
- 14 in the area surrounding the facility if the caregiver and resident
- 15 wear appropriate personal protective equipment. A caregiver may
- 16 <u>not take a resident beyond that area other than to an essential</u>
- 17 medical appointment with the authorization of facility staff or
- 18 health care providers.
- 19 (d) An essential caregiver must:
- 20 (1) visit or provide care to a resident inside the
- 21 <u>resident's room or another area designated by facility staff or</u>
- 22 <u>health care providers;</u>
- 23 (2) while inside the facility maintain an appropriate
- 24 social distance from each individual other than the caregiver's
- 25 resident, including facility staff, health care providers, and
- 26 other residents; and
- 27 (3) immediately notify facility staff or health care

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- 1 providers if, within 14 days following the caregiver's most recent
- 2 visit, the caregiver develops a fever or experiences symptoms of a
- 3 disease or disorder related to a public health emergency.
- 4 (e) Except for a compassionate care visit authorized by a
- 5 long-term care facility, an essential caregiver may not visit a
- 6 resident who is under quarantine restrictions imposed by the
- 7 <u>facility due to the resident testing positive for, being exposed</u>
- 8 to, or experiencing symptoms of a disease or disorder related to a
- 9 public health emergency.
- 10 <u>Sec. 226.005. RESTRICTION</u> OR REVOCATION OF ESSENTIAL
- 11 CAREGIVER DESIGNATION. (a) A long-term care facility may restrict
- 12 an essential caregiver's access to the facility or revoke a
- 13 caregiver's designation for a violation of Section 226.004.
- 14 (b) Before restricting an essential caregiver's access or
- 15 revoking a caregiver's designation, a long-term care facility must
- 16 provide the caregiver with an opportunity to discuss the
- 17 restriction or revocation with facility staff, health care
- 18 providers, and the resident in an attempt to correct the violation.
- 19 SECTION 2. As soon as practicable after the effective date
- 20 of this Act, the executive commissioner of the Health and Human
- 21 Services Commission shall adopt rules as necessary to implement
- 22 Chapter 226, Health and Safety Code, as added by this Act.
- 23 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
