A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4
- SECTION 1. Subchapter B, Chapter 40, Human Resources Code, 5
- is amended by adding Section 40.045 to read as follows: 6
- 7 Sec. 40.045. EFFICIENCY AUDIT. (a) For purposes of this
- section, "efficiency audit" means an investigation of the 8
- 9 operations of the department to examine fiscal management,
- efficiency, outcomes for children and families served by the 10
- department, and utilization of resources. 11
- 12 (b) During the state fiscal year ending August 31, 2022, and
- every fourth year after that date, the department shall conduct an 13
- 14 efficiency audit.
- (c) In a year in which an efficiency audit is completed as 15
- 16 required by this section, the efficiency audit shall satisfy the
- department's annual internal audit requirements under Chapter 17
- 2102, Government Code. 18
- (d) The department shall pay the costs associated with an 19
- efficiency audit required under this section using money 20
- appropriated for administrative and internal audit operations in 21
- the state fiscal year the audit is conducted. 22
- 23 (e) Not later than March 1 of the state fiscal year in which
- an efficiency audit is required under this section, the 24

- 1 commissioner, in collaboration with the council, the department's
- 2 chief financial officer, and the department's internal audit
- 3 director, shall select an external auditor to conduct the
- 4 efficiency audit.
- 5 (f) The external auditor shall be independent of the
- 6 department's direction.
- 7 (g) The external auditor shall complete the audit not later
- 8 than the 90th day after the date the auditor is selected.
- 9 (h) The Legislative Budget Board shall establish the scope
- 10 of the efficiency audit and determine the areas of investigation
- 11 for the audit, including:
- 12 (1) reviewing the department's resources to determine
- 13 whether they are being used effectively and efficiently to achieve
- 14 desired outcomes for children and families served by the
- 15 <u>department</u>, including the following outcomes:
- 16 (A) ensuring the safety of children in
- 17 placements;
- 18 (B) preventing entry into foster care through the
- 19 use of family preservation services;
- 20 (C) reducing the amount of time that a child is
- 21 placed in substitute care and is in the conservatorship of the
- 22 department;
- (D) increasing the placement of children with
- 24 relative or kinship caregivers when possible;
- 25 (E) ensuring sufficient state capacity for
- 26 foster care and kinship placements;
- 27 (F) reducing the number of children who age out

- 1 of care and enhancing supports for youth at risk of aging out of
- 2 care; and
- 3 (G) increasing the reunification of children
- 4 with the biological parents of the children when possible;
- 5 (2) identifying cost savings or reallocations of
- 6 <u>resources; and</u>
- 7 (3) identifying opportunities for the department to
- 8 partner with other state agencies and community organizations to
- 9 improve services through consolidation of essential functions,
- 10 <u>outsourcing</u>, and elimination of duplicative efforts.
- 11 (i) Not later than November 1 of the calendar year an
- 12 efficiency audit is conducted, the auditor shall prepare and submit
- 13 <u>a report of the audit and recommendations for efficiency</u>
- 14 improvements to the governor, the Legislative Budget Board, the
- 15 state auditor, the commissioner, the council, and the chairs of the
- 16 House Human Services Committee and the Senate Health and Human
- 17 Services Committee.
- 18 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
