2	relating to the establishment of a pilot project to provide
3	supportive housing services through Medicaid to persons
4	experiencing chronic homelessness.
5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
6	SECTION 1. Subtitle I, Title 4, Government Code, is amended
7	by adding Chapter 542 to read as follows:
8	CHAPTER 542. TEXAS PATHWAYS PILOT PROJECT
9	Sec. 542.001. DEFINITION. In this chapter, "pilot project"
10	means the Texas pathways pilot project established by the
11	commission under this chapter.
12	Sec. 542.002. CHRONIC HOMELESSNESS. (a) For purposes of
13	this chapter, an individual or family is considered to be
14	experiencing chronic homelessness if the individual or family:
15	(1) is homeless and living or residing in a safe haven,
16	emergency shelter, or place not meant for human habitation;
17	(2) for a continuous year during the preceding year or
18	on at least four separate occasions during the preceding three
19	years, was homeless and lived or resided in a safe haven, emergency
20	shelter, or place not meant for human habitation; and
21	(3) is the head of household who has, or is a member of
22	a household whose head of household has:
23	(A) a diagnosed substance use disorder, serious
24	mental illness, developmental disability, post-traumatic stress

1 disorder, cognitive impairment resulting from a brain injury, or chronic illness or disability; or 2 (B) the simultaneous occurrence of any two or 3 more of the diagnosed conditions listed in Paragraph (A). 4 5 (b) Notwithstanding Subsection (a)(1), an individual who lives or resides in an institutional care facility, including a 6 7 jail, substance use or mental health treatment facility, hospital, or other similar facility, for a period of not more than 90 days is 8 considered to be experiencing chronic homelessness if, before 9 living or residing in the institutional care facility, the 10 11 individual met the requirements of Subsection (a). 12 Sec. 542.003. ESTABLISHMENT AND OPERATION OF PILOT PROJECT. (a) The commission shall establish and operate a statewide Texas 13 pathways pilot project to provide to individuals experiencing 14 15 chronic homelessness supportive housing services through Medicaid, including the following services: 16 17 (1) behavioral health services, including mental health and substance use services; 18 19 (2) case management services; 20 (3) personal care and personal assistance services; 21 (4) home and community-based services; and 22 (5) other housing support services. (b) In establishing the pilot project, the commission shall 23 24 consider and determine:

21	<pre>intervention services;</pre>
22	(H) education on independent living skills; and
23	(I) services to link pilot project participants
24	to education, job skills training, and employment opportunities;
25	(3) financing and reinvestment strategies that
26	account for:
27	(A) the health care costs and housing status of

2	(B) the degree to which accurate and current
3	information on the housing status of Medicaid recipients is
4	available;
5	(C) the health care costs of individuals
6	receiving supportive housing services;
7	(D) the health care costs of Medicaid recipients
8	who receive Medicaid benefits from federal matching funds available
9	under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (Pub. L.
10	No. 111-148), as amended by the Health Care and Education
11	Reconciliation Act of 2010 (Pub. L. No. 111-152), if applicable;
12	(E) the pilot project's potential impact on costs
13	to other entities, such as jails, long-term care facilities, and
14	<pre>treatment facilities;</pre>
15	(F) affordable housing investments that can be
16	leveraged to create new housing opportunities for pilot project
17	participants; and
18	(G) the amount of flexible service dollars
19	available to cover pilot project costs not covered under Medicaid;
20	and
21	(4) the administration of benefits under the pilot
22	<pre>project, including;</pre>
23	(A) the role of managed care;
24	(B) the role of supportive housing service
25	<pre>providers; and</pre>
26	(C) the coordination of the pilot project with
27	existing and emerging health care systems.

- 1 Sec. 542.004. REPORTS. (a) Not later than June 1, 2022,
- 2 the commission shall prepare and submit to the governor, lieutenant
- 3 governor, and speaker of the house of representatives a written
- 4 report that includes:
- 5 (1) a summary of the pilot project's progress;
- 6 (2) an assessment of the impact of providing
- 7 supportive housing services through Medicaid, including the costs
- 8 to provide the services, to individuals experiencing chronic
- 9 homelessness;
- 10 (3) an update on any waiver or amendment request
- 11 necessary to modify the state Medicaid plan to provide supportive
- 12 housing services under the pilot project;
- 13 (4) a description of the supportive housing services
- 14 being provided to individuals experiencing chronic homelessness at
- 15 the time the report is prepared;
- 16 (5) an analysis of the effectiveness of providing
- 17 supportive housing services at the level at which those services
- 18 are provided at the time the report is prepared;
- 19 (6) estimates of the costs and potential savings of
- 20 expanding health programs administered by the commission to meet
- 21 the needs of individuals experiencing chronic homelessness;
- 22 (7) proposed modification to eligibility criteria for
- 23 <u>supportive housing services; and</u>
- 24 (8) any legislative recommendations.
- 25 (b) Not later than September 1, 2024, the commission shall
- 26 prepare and submit to the governor, lieutenant governor, and
- 27 speaker of the house of representatives a final written report on

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   the pilot project that includes:
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               (1) a summary of the results of the pilot project;
               (2) a statement on the pilot project's success in
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   providing supportive housing services to individuals experiencing
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   chronic homelessness;
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               (3) a recommendation as to whether the pilot project
   should be continued as a pilot project or permanent program; and
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               (4) any legislative recommendations.
