H.B. No. 2538

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

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- 2 relating to the Task Force on Infectious Disease Preparedness and
- 3 Response.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Section 81.402, Health and Safety Code, is
- 6 amended to read as follows:
- 7 Sec. 81.402. PURPOSE AND FINDINGS. The legislature finds
- 8 that:
- 9 (1) infectious diseases are responsible for more
- 10 deaths worldwide than any other single cause;
- 11 (2) the State of Texas has a responsibility to
- 12 safeguard and protect the health and well-being of its citizens
- 13 from the spread of infectious diseases;
- 14 (3) [on September 30, 2014, the first case of Ebola
- 15 diagnosed in the United States occurred in Dallas, Texas;
- 16 [(4)] addressing infectious diseases requires the
- 17 coordination and cooperation of multiple governmental entities at
- 18 the local, state, and federal levels;
- 19 $\underline{(4)}$ [$\overline{(5)}$] public health and medical preparedness and
- 20 response guidelines are crucial to protect the safety and welfare
- 21 of our citizens; and
- 22 (5) [(6)] Texas has nationally recognized infectious
- 23 disease experts and other highly trained professionals across the
- 24 state with the experience needed to minimize any potential risk to

- 1 the people of Texas.
- 2 SECTION 2. Section 81.403, Health and Safety Code, is
- 3 amended to read as follows:
- 4 Sec. 81.403. TASK FORCE; DUTIES. (a) The Task Force on
- 5 Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response is created as an
- 6 advisory panel to the governor and the legislature.
- 7 (b) The task force shall:
- 8 (1) provide expert, evidence-based assessments,
- 9 protocols, and recommendations related to state responses to
- 10 infectious diseases [, including Ebola]; [and]
- 11 (2) develop a strategic emergency plan for use by
- 12 local governments and agencies;
- 13 (3) develop a comprehensive plan to ensure this state
- 14 is prepared for a widespread outbreak of an infectious disease and
- 15 has the resources and infrastructure to provide a rapid response
- 16 that effectively protects the safety and well-being of this state's
- 17 residents;
- 18 (4) evaluate the supplies and resources available to
- 19 address an infectious disease outbreak; and
- 20 (5) serve as a reliable and transparent source of
- 21 information and education for Texas leadership and citizens.
- (c) In developing the plan described by Subsection (b)(3),
- 23 the task force shall:
- 24 (1) use the significant expertise of medical
- 25 professionals in this state and other states;
- 26 (2) collaborate with local government officials and
- 27 local health officials;

- 1 (3) use, as practicable, the state emergency
- 2 management plan and structure;
- 3 (4) identify various responses necessary to address an
- 4 epidemic or pandemic of infectious disease;
- 5 (5) establish a command and control structure that
- 6 will ensure effective preparations and response if the governor
- 7 declares a state of disaster under Chapter 418, Government Code, or
- 8 takes other emergency action under other law; and
- 9 (6) coordinate with appropriate entities to ensure
- 10 public awareness and education regarding any epidemic or pandemic
- 11 threat.
- 12 SECTION 3. Section 81.404, Health and Safety Code, is
- 13 amended by amending Subsections (a), (b), (c), and (d) and adding
- 14 Subsection (f) to read as follows:
- 15 (a) The commissioner [governor] may appoint members of the
- 16 task force as necessary, including members from relevant state
- 17 agencies, members with expertise in infectious diseases and other
- 18 issues involved in the prevention of the spread of infectious
- 19 diseases, and members from institutions of higher education in this
- 20 state. In appointing the members, the commissioner shall ensure
- 21 that the membership of the task force reflects the ethnic,
- 22 economic, and geographic diversity of this state. The commissioner
- 23 [governor] shall appoint to the task force:
- 24 (1) at least one member who is a county judge of a
- 25 county with a population of less than 100,000;
- 26 (2) at least one member who is a county judge of a
- 27 county with a population of 100,000 or more;

- 1 (3) at least one member who is a county judge of a
 2 county with a population of 1 million or more;
 3 (4) at least one member who is a representative of a
 4 local health authority serving a rural area;
 5 (5) [(4)] at least one member who is a representative
- 6 of a local health authority serving an urban area;
 7 (6) [(5)] at least one member who is a licensed nurse;
- 8 (7) at least one member who is a physician licensed in
- 9 this state;
- 10 (8) at least one member who is a representative of a
- 11 <u>hospital system;</u>
- 12 (9) at least three members who each serve as president
- 13 of a publicly supported medical school or health-related
- 14 institution of higher education, or an employee designated by each
- 15 president;
- 16 (10) at least one member who is a representative of a
- 17 business with less than 100 employees;
- 18 (11) at least one member who is a representative of a
- 19 business with more than 100 employees;
- 20 (12) at least one member who is a representative of an
- 21 organization that advocates on behalf of employees and workers in
- 22 this state; and
- (13) (13) (46) at least one member who is emergency
- 24 medical services personnel, as defined by Section 773.003.
- 25 (b) The <u>commissioner</u> [governor] shall appoint a director of
- 26 the task force from among the members of the task force.
- 27 (c) The commissioner [governor] may fill any vacancy that

- 1 occurs on the task force and may appoint additional members as
- 2 needed.
- 3 (d) Members of the task force serve at the pleasure of the
- 4 commissioner [governor].
- 5 (f) The commissioner may establish one or more working
- 6 groups composed of task force members to study, discuss, and
- 7 address specific policy issues and recommendations. The working
- 8 groups shall refer the issues and recommendations to the task force
- 9 for further consideration.
- 10 SECTION 4. Section 81.405, Health and Safety Code, is
- 11 amended to read as follows:
- Sec. 81.405. REPORTS. (a) Not later than September 1 of each
- 13 even-numbered year, the [The] task force shall prepare and submit
- 14 to the governor and the legislature [may make] written reports on
- 15 its findings and recommendations, including legislative
- 16 recommendations [$\frac{1}{7}$ to the governor and legislature].
- 17 (b) The task force shall report to the department, governor,
- 18 and legislature as often as is necessary to make recommendations
- 19 for updating protocols addressing infectious diseases.
- SECTION 5. Section 81.407, Health and Safety Code, is
- 21 amended to read as follows:
- Sec. 81.407. ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT. (a) State agencies
- 23 with members on the task force shall provide administrative support
- 24 for the task force.
- 25 (b) The legislature may appropriate money to the department
- 26 for the administrative and operational expenses of the task force.
- 27 SECTION 6. Section 81.408, Health and Safety Code, is

- 1 amended to read as follows:
- 2 Sec. 81.408. REIMBURSEMENT. (a) Except as provided by
- 3 Subsection (b), task [Task] force members serve without
- 4 compensation and are not entitled to reimbursement for travel
- 5 expenses.
- 6 (b) The task force members are entitled to reimbursement for
- 7 <u>actual and necessary expenses incurred in serving on the task</u>
- 8 force.
- 9 SECTION 7. Subchapter J, Chapter 81, Health and Safety
- 10 Code, is amended by adding Section 81.409 to read as follows:
- 11 Sec. 81.409. INFECTIOUS DISEASE EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS
- 12 FACILITIES AT HEALTH CARE-RELATED INSTITUTIONS. The commission may
- 13 enter into contracts or agreements to assist in the establishment
- 14 of infectious disease emergency preparedness facilities at health
- 15 care-related institutions in this state. The contracts or
- 16 agreements may provide for:
- 17 (1) developing and equipping the infectious disease
- 18 emergency preparedness facilities; and
- 19 (2) purchasing materials, equipment, services, or
- 20 other items the commission considers necessary to implement this
- 21 <u>section.</u>
- 22 SECTION 8. As soon as practicable after the effective date
- 23 of this Act, the commissioner of state health services shall make
- 24 appointments to the Task Force on Infectious Disease Preparedness
- 25 and Response required under Subchapter J, Chapter 81, Health and
- 26 Safety Code, as amended by this Act.
- 27 SECTION 9. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
