## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the women who are eligible for certification as owners
3	of a historically underutilized business.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Section 2161.001(3), Government Code, is amended
6	to read as follows:
7	(3) "Economically disadvantaged person" means a
8	person who:
9	(A) is economically disadvantaged because of the
10	person's identification as a member of a certain group, including:
11	(i) Black Americans;
12	(ii) Hispanic Americans;
13	(iii) <u>minority</u> women;
14	(iv) Asian Pacific Americans;
15	(v) Native Americans; and
16	(vi) veterans as defined by 38 U.S.C.
17	Section 101(2) who have suffered at least a 20 percent
18	service-connected disability as defined by 38 U.S.C. Section
19	101(16); and
20	(B) has suffered the effects of discriminatory
21	practices or other similar insidious circumstances over which the
22	person has no control.
23	SECTION 2. Sections 2161.061(b), (d), and (e), Government

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Code, are amended to read as follows:

- 1 (b) As one of its certification procedures, the comptroller 2 may:
- 3 (1) approve the certification program of one or more
- 4 local governments or nonprofit organizations in this state that
- 5 certify historically underutilized businesses, minority business
- 6 enterprises, minority women's business enterprises, or
- 7 disadvantaged business enterprises under substantially the same
- 8 definition, to the extent applicable, used by Section 2161.001, if
- 9 the local government or nonprofit organization meets or exceeds the
- 10 standards established by the comptroller; and
- 11 (2) certify a business that is certified by a local
- 12 government or by a nonprofit organization as a historically
- 13 underutilized business under this chapter.
- 14 (d) A local government or a nonprofit organization that
- 15 certifies historically underutilized businesses, minority business
- 16 enterprises, minority women's business enterprises, or
- 17 disadvantaged business enterprises as described in Subsections (b)
- 18 and (c) shall complete the certification of an applicant or provide
- 19 an applicant with written justification of its certification denial
- 20 within the period established by the comptroller in its rules for
- 21 certification activities.
- (e) A local government or a nonprofit organization that
- 23 certifies historically underutilized businesses under Subsection
- 24 (c) or that conducts a certification program described by and
- 25 approved under Subsection (b) shall make available to the public an
- 26 online searchable database containing information about
- 27 historically underutilized businesses, minority business

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- 1 enterprises, minority women's business enterprises, and
- 2 disadvantaged business enterprises certified by the local
- 3 government or nonprofit organization, including:
- 4 (1) the name of the business;
- 5 (2) the contact person or owner of the business;
- 6 (3) the address and telephone number of the business;
- 7 (4) the type or category of business, including
- 8 relevant capabilities of the business and the North American
- 9 Industry Classification System codes for the business; and
- 10 (5) the expiration date of the business's
- 11 certification.
- 12 SECTION 3. The change in law made by this Act applies only
- 13 to the certification of a business as a historically underutilized
- 14 business under Chapter 2161, Government Code, occurring on or after
- 15 the effective date of this Act. The certification of a business as a
- 16 historically underutilized business occurring before the effective
- 17 date of this Act is governed by the law in effect on the date of the
- 18 certification, and the former law is continued in effect for that
- 19 purpose.
- 20 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
