## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

## AN ACT

2 relating to the donation of food by public school campuses.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

4 SECTION 1. Section 33.907, Education Code, is amended by 5 amending Subsections (b) and (c) and adding Subsection (c-1) to 6 read as follows:

(b) A school district or open-enrollment charter school may allow a campus to elect to donate food to a nonprofit organization through <u>a person</u> [an official of the nonprofit organization] who is directly <u>and officially</u> affiliated with the campus, including a teacher <u>or</u> [7] counselor, or <u>through a</u> parent of a student enrolled at the campus. The donated food may be received, stored, and distributed on the campus. Food donated by the campus may include:

(1) surplus food prepared for breakfast, lunch, or dinner meals or <u>snacks</u> [<del>a snack to be</del>] served <u>from</u> [<del>at</del>] the campus cafeteria, subject to any applicable local, state, and federal requirements; or

18 (2) food donated to the campus as the result of a food19 drive or similar event.

20 (c) The type of food donated under <u>Subsection (b)(1)</u> [this 21 section] may include:

(1) packaged [or unpackaged] unserved food that is
packaged on the campus of a school district or open-enrollment
charter school and has not been removed from the campus cafeteria;

10	SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
