- 8 annulment of a marriage to a party to the marriage if:
- 9 (1) the other party was divorced from a third party
- 10 within the 30-day period preceding the date of the marriage

- 12 (2) at the time of the marriage ceremony the
- 13 petitioner did not know, and a reasonably prudent person would not
- 14 have known, of the divorce; and
- 15 (3) [since] the petitioner ceased cohabitation with
- 16 the other party not more than one year after the petitioner
- 17 discovered or a reasonably prudent person would have discovered the
- 18 fact of the divorce  $\underline{\text{and}}$  [ $\tau$  the petitioner] has not voluntarily
- 19 cohabited with the other party since ceasing cohabitation.
