A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to a grant program for mobile crisis outreach teams.
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. Subchapter B, Chapter 531, Government Code, is
5	amended by adding Section 531.09915 to read as follows:
6	Sec. 531.09915. GRANT PROGRAM FOR MOBILE CRISIS OUTREACH
7	TEAMS. (a) In this section, "mobile crisis outreach team" means a
8	group of mental health professionals who assist adults and children
9	who are experiencing a mental health crisis by providing a variety
10	of services.
11	(b) The executive commissioner shall establish and
12	administer a mobile crisis outreach team grant program to grant
13	money to municipalities and counties to establish local agencies
14	that, in partnership with local law enforcement and local mental
15	health authorities, provide an alternate response program under
16	which a mobile crisis outreach team may be deployed in the
17	municipality or county to appropriate situations determined not to
18	require police intervention, for the purpose of reducing the number
19	of incarcerations by the municipality or county of individuals
20	with:
21	(1) mental illness;
22	(2) substance use disorders; or
23	(3) intellectual or developmental disabilities.
24	(c) A grant application from a municipality or county to the

1	commission must be submitted on a form prescribed by the commission
2	and include a statement from the governing body of the municipality
3	or county regarding the municipal or county proposal to establish
4	an alternate response program that includes:
5	(1) training 9-1-1 emergency service dispatchers to
6	distinguish between situations in which the dispatcher must deploy
7	local law enforcement and situations in which a mobile crisis
8	outreach team may be deployed instead;
9	(2) creating collaborative training opportunities to
10	increase mental health and trauma awareness for emergency medical
11	services providers, local law enforcement, and mobile crisis
12	<pre>outreach teams;</pre>
13	(3) strengthening community engagement to raise
14	awareness about mobile crisis outreach teams, including by
15	establishing relationships between mobile crisis outreach teams
16	and:
17	(A) schools;
18	(B) child protective services providers;
19	(C) religious organizations;
20	(D) nonprofit food bank or food pantries;
21	(E) community health centers;
22	(F) recreation centers; and
23	(G) shelters designed to provide temporary
24	living accommodations, including:
25	(i) welfare hotels;
26	(ii) congregate shelters; and
27	(iii) transitional housing for persons with

1	mental illness;
2	(4) ensuring mobile crisis outreach teams provide
3	appropriate care to individuals, especially individuals who lack
4	adequate health insurance coverage, including by identifying
5	options for individuals to receive care through:
6	(A) shelters, as defined by Section 42.201, Human
7	Resources Code;
8	(B) crisis residential programs;
9	(C) treatment centers;
10	(D) after hours clinics; and
11	(E) inpatient and outpatient treatment programs;
12	(5) promoting access to any available free or
13	affordable care through community mental health services
14	providers;
15	(6) increasing the availability of public
16	transportation and other transportation options for individuals
17	who require mental health services;
18	(7) employing as mobile crisis outreach team members
19	individuals who:
20	(A) hold degrees in relevant behavioral health
21	fields and have received appropriate training to serve on a mobile
22	crisis outreach team; or
23	(B) are licensed mental health professionals;
24	and
25	(8) providing comprehensive and continuing training
26	to employees of mobile crisis outreach teams about:
27	(A) suicide;

1	(B) risk assessment;
2	(C) crisis intervention;
3	(D) issues relevant to marginalized populations;
4	<u>and</u>
5	(E) bias awareness.
6	(d) The executive commissioner shall develop criteria for
7	the evaluation of applications submitted under this section and the
8	selection of recipients for a grant under the mobile crisis
9	outreach team grant program. The executive commissioner shall award
10	grants on a competitive basis.
11	(e) A grant awarded under this section may not exceed \$5
12	million.
13	(f) A municipality or county that receives a grant under
14	this section is required to leverage funds in an amount:
15	(1) equal to 50 percent of the grant amount if:
16	(A) the county has a population of less than
17	<u>250,000; or</u>
18	(B) the municipality is located in a county with
19	a population of less than 250,000;
20	(2) equal to 100 percent of the grant amount if:
21	(A) the county has a population of 250,000 or
22	more; or
23	(B) the municipality is located in a county with
24	a population of 250,000 or more; and
25	(3) equal to the percentage of the grant amount
26	otherwise required by this subsection for the largest county in
27	which a mobile crisis outreach team is located if the mobile crisis

- 1 outreach team is located in more than one county.
- 2 (g) A municipality or county that receives a grant under
- 3 this section may also accept:
- 4 (1) gifts, grants, and donations;
- 5 (2) money donated from the budget of a law enforcement
- 6 agency;
- 7 (3) money donated from the budget of a municipality or
- 8 county; and
- 9 (4) money donated from the budget of a local mental
- 10 <u>health authority.</u>
- 11 (h) The executive commissioner shall adopt all rules
- 12 necessary for the establishment of the mobile crisis outreach team
- 13 grant program under this section.
- 14 SECTION 2. As soon as practicable after the effective date
- 15 of this Act, the executive commissioner of the Health and Human
- 16 Services Commission shall adopt rules necessary to implement
- 17 Section 531.09915, Government Code, as added by this Act.
- SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
