A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

2 relating to the administration of assessment instruments in public schools, eliminating the requirement to use public school 3 assessment instruments as a criterion for promotion or graduation, 4 5 and the temporary suspension of certain accountability determinations for a school district or campus in a school year in 6 7 which the operations of the district or campus are disrupted as a result of a declared disaster. 8

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

10 SECTION 1. Section 18.005(c), Education Code, is amended to 11 read as follows:

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(c) A Job Corps diploma program shall:

(1) develop educational programs specifically designed for persons eligible for enrollment in a Job Corps training program established by the United States Department of Labor;

(2) coordinate educational programs and services in the diploma program with programs and services provided by the United States Department of Labor and other federal and state agencies and local political subdivisions and by persons who provide programs and services under contract with the United States Department of Labor;

(3) provide a course of instruction that includes the
required curriculum under Subchapter A, Chapter 28; <u>and</u>

(4) [require that students enrolled in the diploma
 program satisfy the requirements of Section 39.025 before receiving
 a diploma under this chapter; and

4 [(5)] comply with a requirement imposed under this 5 title or a rule adopted under this title relating to the Public 6 Education Information Management System (PEIMS) to the extent 7 necessary to determine compliance with this chapter, as determined 8 by the commissioner.

9 SECTION 2. Section 19.0043(b), Education Code, is amended 10 to read as follows:

Section 28.021(c), Education Code, is amended to 6 read as follows: 7 (c) In determining promotion under Subsection (a), a school district shall consider: 8 the recommendation of the student's teacher; 9 (1)10 (2) the student's grade in each subject or course; and [the student's score on an assessment instrument 11 (3) administered under Section 39.023(a), (b), or (1), to the extent 12 applicable; and 13 14 [(4)]any other necessary academic information, as 15 determined by the district. 16 SECTION 5. The heading to Section 28.0211, Education Code, 17 is amended to read as follows: Sec. 28.0211. [SATISFACTORY PERFORMANCE ON ASSESSMENT 18 **INSTRUMENTS REQUIRED;**] ACCELERATED INSTRUCTION. 19 SECTION 6. Sections 28.0211(a-1), (b), (c), (d), (g), and 20 (i), Education Code, are amended to read as follows: 21 22 (a-1) Each time a student fails to perform satisfactorily on an assessment instrument administered under Section 39.023(a) [in 23 the third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, or eighth grade], the 24 school district in which the student attends school shall provide 25 to the student accelerated instruction in the applicable subject 26 area. Accelerated instruction may require participation of the 27

1 student before or after normal school hours and may include 2 participation at times of the year outside normal school 3 operations.

4 (b) A school district shall provide to a student who 5 initially fails to perform satisfactorily on an assessment instrument <u>administered</u> [specified] under Section 39.023(a) 6 [Subsection (a)] at least two additional opportunities to take the 7 8 assessment instrument. A school district may administer an alternate assessment instrument to a student who has failed an 9 10 assessment instrument <u>administered</u> [specified] under <u>Section</u> <u>39.023(a)</u> [Subsection (a)] on the previous two opportunities. 11 [Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, a student may 12 be promoted if the student performs at grade level on an alternate 13 14 assessment instrument under this subsection that is appropriate for 15 the student's grade level and approved by the commissioner.]

16 (c) [Each time a student fails to perform satisfactorily on 17 an assessment instrument specified under Subsection (a), the school district in which the student attends school shall provide to the 18 19 student accelerated instruction in the applicable subject area, including reading instruction for a student who fails to perform 20 21 satisfactorily on a reading assessment instrument. After a student fails to perform satisfactorily on an assessment instrument a 22 second time, a grade placement committee shall be established to 23 24 prescribe the accelerated instruction the district shall provide to the student before the student is administered the assessment 25 instrument the third time. The grade placement committee shall be 26 composed of the principal or the principal's designee, the 27

student's parent or guardian, and the teacher of the subject of an assessment instrument on which the student failed to perform satisfactorily. The district shall notify the parent or guardian of the time and place for convening the grade placement committee and the purpose of the committee.] An accelerated instruction group administered by a school district under this section may not have a ratio of more than 10 students for each teacher.

8 (d) In addition to providing accelerated instruction to a
9 student under Subsection (a-1) [(c)], the district shall notify the
10 student's parent or guardian of:

11 (1) the student's failure to perform satisfactorily on 12 the assessment instrument; and

13 (2) the accelerated instruction program to which the
14 student is assigned [; and

15 [(3) the possibility that the student might be 16 retained at the same grade level for the next school year].

(g) This section does not preclude the retention at a grade level, in accordance with state law or school district policy, of a student who performs satisfactorily on an assessment instrument [specified under Subsection (a)].

(i) The admission, review, and dismissal committee of a student who participates in a district's special education program under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, and who does not perform satisfactorily on an assessment instrument [specified under <u>Subsection (a) and</u>] administered under Section 39.023(a) or (b) must meet before the student is administered the assessment instrument for the second time. The committee shall determine[+

[(1)] the manner in which the student will participate
 in an accelerated instruction program under this section[; and

3 [(2) whether the student will be promoted in 4 accordance with Subsection (i=1) or retained under this section].

5 SECTION 7. Sections 28.025(b-7), (c), and (e), Education 6 Code, are amended to read as follows:

(b-7) The State Board of Education, in coordination with the 7 8 Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, shall adopt rules to ensure that a student may comply with the curriculum requirements 9 10 under the foundation high school program or for an endorsement under Subsection (c-1) by successfully completing appropriate 11 courses in the core curriculum of an institution of higher 12 education under Section 61.822. Notwithstanding Subsection (b-15) 13 or (c) [of this section, Section 39.025,] or any other provision of 14 15 this code and notwithstanding any school district policy, a student who has completed the core curriculum of an institution of higher 16 17 education under Section 61.822, as certified by the institution in accordance with commissioner rule, is considered to have earned a 18 distinguished level of achievement under the foundation high school 19 program and is entitled to receive a high school diploma from the 20 appropriate high school as that high school is determined in 21 22 accordance with commissioner rule. SECTION 9. Section 28.0255(g), Education Code, is amended 10 to read as follows: 11 12 (g) A student is entitled to a high school diploma if the 13 student[+ 14 [(1)] successfully complies with the curriculum 15 requirements specified under Subsection (e) [; and 16 [(2) performs satisfactorily, as determined by the 17 commissioner under Subsection (h), on end-of-course assessment instruments listed under Section 39.023(c) for courses in which the 18 19 student was enrolled]. SECTION 10. Section 28.02591(a), Education Code, is amended 20 to read as follows: 21 The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, 22 (a) in coordination with the agency, shall collect longitudinal data 23 24 relating to the post-graduation pursuits of each student who is awarded a diploma based on the determination of an individual 25 26 graduation committee under former Section 28.0258, as that section existed on January 1, 2021 [before September 1, 2023], including 27
