## CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Human trafficking is a serious and escalating
problem in the United States, particularly in Texas; and

3 WHEREAS, A multibillion-dollar business, human trafficking is second only to drug dealing in criminal profitability and is the 4 5 fastest-growing illegal enterprise, according to the Polaris Project, a Washington, D.C.-based organization that maintains the 6 7 National Human Trafficking Hotline; thousands of foreign nationals are trafficked into the United States each year, and it is estimated 8 that the number of U.S. citizens trafficked within our own borders 9 10 is even higher; and

11 WHEREAS, Texas is a major point of illegal entry into the 12 United States; its large geographic size along with its 13 demographics make the Lone Star State appealing to traffickers, who 14 endeavor to blend into the population while exploiting their 15 victims in forced labor and prostitution; and

16 WHEREAS, Although Texas has been recognized as a leader in 17 the effort to end the scourge of human trafficking, eradication of 18 this modern-day form of slavery is a difficult challenge, and every 19 means of combating it should be explored; now, therefore, be it

20 RESOLVED, That the 87th Legislature of the State of Texas 21 hereby request the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house 22 of representatives to create a joint interim committee to study the 23 problem of human trafficking in Texas; and, be it further

24 RESOLVED, That the committee's proceedings and operations be

No. 57 1 governed by such general rules and policies for interim committees 2 as the 87th Texas Legislature may adopt; and, be it further 3 RESOLVED, That the committee submit a full report, including 4 findings and recommendations, to the 88th Texas Legislature before

5 it convenes in January 2023.
