A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

- 2 relating to the administration of assessment instruments in public
- 3 schools and eliminating the requirement to use public school
- 4 assessment instruments as a criterion for promotion or graduation
- 5 or to make certain accountability determinations.
- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 7 SECTION 1. Section 18.005(c), Education Code, is amended to
- 8 read as follows:
- 9 (c) A Job Corps diploma program shall:
- 10 (1) develop educational programs specifically
- 11 designed for persons eligible for enrollment in a Job Corps
- 12 training program established by the United States Department of
- 13 Labor;
- 14 (2) coordinate educational programs and services in
- 15 the diploma program with programs and services provided by the
- 16 United States Department of Labor and other federal and state
- 17 agencies and local political subdivisions and by persons who
- 18 provide programs and services under contract with the United States
- 19 Department of Labor;
- 20 (3) provide a course of instruction that includes the
- 21 required curriculum under Subchapter A, Chapter 28; and
- 22 (4) [require that students enrolled in the diploma
- 23 program satisfy the requirements of Section 39.025 before receiving
- 24 a diploma under this chapter; and

- 1 $\left[\frac{(5)}{(5)}\right]$ comply with a requirement imposed under this
- 2 title or a rule adopted under this title relating to the Public
- 3 Education Information Management System (PEIMS) to the extent
- 4 necessary to determine compliance with this chapter, as determined
- 5 by the commissioner.
- 6 SECTION 2. Section 18.006(b), Education Code, is amended to
- 7 read as follows:
- 8 (b) In addition to other factors determined to be
- 9 appropriate by the commissioner, the accountability system must
- 10 include consideration of [↔
- 11 [(1) student performance on the end-of-course
- 12 assessment instruments required by Section 39.023(c); and
- [(2)] dropout rates, including dropout rates and
- 14 diploma program completion rates for the grade levels served by the
- 15 diploma program.
- SECTION 3. Section 19.0043(b), Education Code, is amended

- (j) No more than 15 percent of the funds certified by the 23 24 commissioner under Subsection (i) may be spent on indirect costs. 25 The commissioner shall evaluate the programs that fail to meet the standard of performance under Section 39.301(c)(6) $[\frac{39.301(c)(5)}{5}]$ 26 and may implement interventions or sanctions under Chapter 39A. Sections 28.0211(a-1), (c), (d), (g), (i), and 10 (k), Education Code, are amended to read as follows: 11 (a-1) Each time a student fails to perform satisfactorily on 12 an assessment instrument administered under Section 39.023(a) [in 13 the third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, or eighth grade], the 14 15 school district in which the student attends school shall provide to the student accelerated instruction in the applicable subject 16 17 area. Accelerated instruction may require participation of the student before or after normal school hours and may include 18 19 participation at times of the year outside normal school operations. 20 21 (c) [Each time a student fails to perform satisfactorily on an assessment instrument specified under Subsection (a), the school 22 district in which the student attends school shall provide to the 23 24 student accelerated instruction in the applicable subject area, including reading instruction for a student who fails to perform 25

fails to perform satisfactorily on an assessment instrument

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- second time, a grade placement committee shall be established to 1 prescribe the accelerated instruction the district shall provide to 2 the student before the student is administered the assessment instrument the third time. The grade placement committee shall be 4 5 composed of the principal or the principal's designee, the student's parent or guardian, and the teacher of the subject of an 6 assessment instrument on which the student failed to perform 7 8 satisfactorily. The district shall notify the parent or quardian of the time and place for convening the grade placement committee 9 10 and the purpose of the committee.] An accelerated instruction group administered by a school district under this section may not 11 have a ratio of more than 10 students for each teacher. 12
- 13 (d) In addition to providing accelerated instruction to a student under Subsection (a-1) [(c)], the district shall notify the student's parent or guardian of:
- 16 (1) the student's failure to perform satisfactorily on 17 the assessment instrument; and
- 18 (2) the accelerated instruction program to which the 19 student is assigned[; and
- [(3) the possibility that the student might be retained at the same grade level for the next school year].
- 22 (g) This section does not preclude the retention at a grade 23 level, in accordance with state law or school district policy, of a 24 student who performs satisfactorily on an assessment instrument 25 [specified under Subsection (a)].
- 26 (i) The admission, review, and dismissal committee of a 27 student who participates in a district's special education program

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- 1 under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, and who does not perform
- 2 satisfactorily on an assessment instrument [specified under

- 14 will be used for purposes of Section 39.054].
- SECTION 11. Section 28.0217, Education Code, is amended to

- 18 STUDENTS. Each time a student fails to perform satisfactorily on an
- 19 assessment instrument <u>required</u> [administered] under Section

- 21 shall provide to the student accelerated instruction in the
- 22 applicable subject area, using funds appropriated for accelerated
- 23 instruction under Section 28.0211. Accelerated instruction may
- 24 require participation of the student before or after normal school
- 25 hours and may include participation at times of the year outside
- 26 normal school operations.
- 27 SECTION 12. Section 28.023(c), Education Code, is amended

1 to read as follows:

- (c) A school district shall give a student in grade level 2 3 six or above credit for a subject on the basis of an examination for credit in the subject approved by the board of trustees under 4 5 Subsection (a) if the student scores in the 80th percentile or above on the examination or if the student achieves a score as provided by 6 Subsection (c-1). If a student is given credit in a subject on the 7 basis of an examination, the district shall enter the examination score on the student's transcript [and the student is not required 9 10 to take an end-of-course assessment instrument adopted under Section 39.023(c) for that subject]. 11
- SECTION 13. Sections 28.025(b-4), (b-7), (c), (c-8), and (e), Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

- (b-7) The State Board of Education, in coordination with the 20 Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, shall adopt rules to 21 ensure that a student may comply with the curriculum requirements 22 under the foundation high school program or for an endorsement 23 24 under Subsection (c-1) by successfully completing appropriate courses in the core curriculum of an institution of higher 25 26 education under Section 61.822. - 1 this code and notwithstanding any school district policy, a student who has completed the core curriculum of an institution of higher 2 3 education under Section 61.822, as certified by the institution in accordance with commissioner rule, is considered to have earned a 4 5 distinguished level of achievement under the foundation high school program and is entitled to receive a high school diploma from the 6 appropriate high school as that high school is determined in 7 8 accordance with commissioner rule. A student who is considered to have earned a distinguished level of achievement under the 9 10 foundation high school program under this subsection may apply for admission to an institution of higher education for the first 11 semester or other academic term after the semester or other 12 academic term in which the student completes the core curriculum. 13
- (c) A person may receive a diploma if the person is eligible for a diploma under Section 28.0251. In other cases, a student may graduate and receive a diploma only if:
- 17 (1) the student successfully completes the curriculum 18 requirements identified by the State Board of Education under 19 Subsection (a) and complies with <u>Section</u> [Sections] 28.0256 [and 20 39.025]; or
- 21 (2) the student successfully completes an 22 individualized education program developed under Section 29.005.
- (c-8) For purposes of Subsection (c-7), the admission, review, and dismissal committee of a student in a special education program under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, shall determine whether the student is required to achieve satisfactory performance on an [end-of-course] assessment instrument required under Section

- $1 \quad 39.023(c)$ to earn an endorsement on the student's transcript.
- 2 (e) Each school district shall report the academic
- 3 achievement record of students who have completed the foundation
- 4 high school program on transcript forms adopted by the State Board
- 5 of Education. [The transcript forms adopted by the board must be
- 6 designed to clearly identify whether a student received a diploma
- 7 or a certificate of coursework completion.
- 8 SECTION 14. Sections 28.02541(a) and (d), Education Code,
- 9 are amended to read as follows:
- 10 (a) This section applies only to a student who:
- 11 (1) entered the ninth grade before the 2011-2012
- 12 school year; and
- 13 (2) successfully completed the curriculum
- 14 requirements for high school graduation applicable to the student

- 11 student was enrolled].
- 12 SECTION 16. Section 28.02591(a), Education Code, is amended

- 22 research-based strategies to assist students in becoming able
- 23 academically to pursue postsecondary education, including:
- 24 (A) high quality, college readiness instruction
- 25 with strong academic and social supports;
- 26 (B) secondary to postsecondary bridging that
- 27 builds college readiness skills, provides a plan for college

- 1 completion, and ensures transition counseling; and
- 2 (C) information concerning appropriate supports
