## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

- 2 relating to prevention and early intervention programs and
  3 practices.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Section 264.201(d), Family Code, is amended to 6 read as follows:
- 7 (d) The services may include in-home programs, parenting
- 8 skills training, youth coping skills, and individual and family
- 9 counseling. If the department requires or a court orders parenting
- 10 skills training services through a parenting education program or
- 11 practice, the program or practice must be an evidence-based program
- 12 or <u>practice</u>, promising [<del>practice parenting education</del>] program <u>or</u>
- 13 practice, or evidence-informed program or practice described by
- 14 Section 265.151 that is provided in the community in which the
- 15 family resides, if available.
- SECTION 2. Section 265.004(a-1), Family Code, is amended to
- 17 read as follows:
- 18 (a-1) The department shall ensure that not less than 75
- 19 percent of the money appropriated for home visitation programs and
- 20 parenting education programs under Subsection (a) funds
- 21 evidence-based programs or practices described by Section
- 22 265.151(b) and that the remainder of that money funds promising
- 23 [practice] programs or practices described by Section 265.151(c)
- 24 and evidence-informed programs or practices described by Section

- 1 <u>265.151(d)</u>.
- 2 SECTION 3. The heading to Subchapter D, Chapter 265, Family
- 3 Code, is amended to read as follows:
- 4 SUBCHAPTER D. EVIDENCE-BASED PROGRAMS AND PRACTICES [PARENTING
- 5 EDUCATION
- 6 SECTION 4. The heading to Section 265.151, Family Code, is
- 7 amended to read as follows:
- 8 Sec. 265.151. REQUIREMENTS FOR [PARENTING EDUCATION]
- 9 PROGRAMS AND PRACTICES ON EVIDENCE-BASED SPECTRUM.
- SECTION 5. Section 265.151, Family Code, is amended by
- 11 amending Subsections (b) and (c) and adding Subsection (d) to read
- 12 as follows:
- 13 (b) An evidence-based program or practice is a [parenting
- 14 education] program or practice that:
- 15 (1) is research-based and grounded in relevant,
- 16 empirical knowledge and program-determined outcomes;
- 17 (2) has comprehensive standards ensuring the highest
- 18 quality service delivery with continuous improvement in the quality
- 19 of service delivery;
- 20 (3) has demonstrated significant positive [short-term
- 21 and long-term] outcomes;
- 22 (4) <u>is listed as an evidence-based program or practice</u>
- 23 by a nationally recognized clearinghouse associated with a state or
- 24 federal agency or an institution of higher education or, during the
- 25 preceding 10 years, has been subject to an external evaluation that
- 26 showed positive results and was published in peer-reviewed
- 27 literature [has been evaluated by at least one rigorous, random,

- 1 controlled research trial across heterogeneous populations or
- 2 communities with research results that have been published in a
- 3 peer-reviewed journal];
- 4 (5) substantially complies with a program manual or
- 5 design that specifies the purpose, outcomes, duration, and
- 6 frequency of the program services; [and]
- 7 (6) employs well-trained and competent staff and
- 8 provides continual relevant professional development opportunities
- 9 to the staff;
- 10 (7) is associated with a national organization,
- 11 institution of higher education, or national or state public health
- 12 institute; and
- 13 (8) demonstrates substantial connections to other
- 14 community-based services.
- 15 (c) A promising [practice] program or practice is a
- 16 [parenting education] program or practice that:
- 17 (1) has an active impact evaluation program or
- 18 demonstrates a schedule for implementing an active impact
- 19 evaluation program;
- 20 (2) is listed as a promising program or practice by a
- 21 <u>nationally recognized clearinghouse associated with a state or</u>
- 22 federal agency or an institution of higher education or, during the
- 23 preceding 10 years, has been subject to an external evaluation that
- 24 showed positive results and was published in peer-reviewed
- 25 literature [has been evaluated by at least one outcome-based study
- 26 demonstrating effectiveness or random, controlled trial in a
- 27 homogeneous sample];

- 1 (3) substantially complies with a program manual or
- 2 design that specifies the purpose, outcomes, duration, and
- 3 frequency of the program services;
- 4 (4) employs well-trained and competent staff and
- 5 provides continual relevant professional development opportunities
- 6 to the staff; [and]
- 7 (5) is research-based and grounded in relevant,
- 8 empirical knowledge and program-determined outcomes; and
- 9 (6) demonstrates substantial connections to other
- 10 community-based services.
- 11 (d) An evidence-informed program or practice is a program or
- 12 practice that:
- 13 (1) combines well-researched interventions with
- 14 clinical experience and ethics, and client preferences and culture,
- 15 to guide and inform the delivery of treatments and services;
- 16 (2) has an active impact evaluation program or
- 17 demonstrates a schedule for implementing an active impact
- 18 evaluation program;
- 19 (3) substantially complies with a program manual or
- 20 design that specifies the purpose, outcome, duration, and frequency
- 21 of the program services; and
- 22 (4) employs well-trained and competent staff and
- 23 provides continual relevant professional development opportunities
- 24 to the staff.
- 25 SECTION 6. Section 265.152, Family Code, is amended to read
- 26 as follows:
- Sec. 265.152. OUTCOMES OF EVIDENCE-BASED PREVENTION AND

- 1 EARLY INTERVENTION PROGRAMS AND PRACTICES [PARENTING EDUCATION].
- 2 The department shall ensure that a prevention and early
- 3 <u>intervention</u> [parenting education] program or practice provided
- 4 under this subchapter [chapter] achieves favorable behavioral
- 5 outcomes in at least two of the following areas:
- 6 (1) improved cognitive development of children;
- 7 (2) increased [school] readiness for and
- 8 participation and performance in school [of children];
- 9 (3) reduced child abuse, neglect, and injury;
- 10 (4) improved child safety;
- 11 (5) improved social-emotional development of children
- 12 and youth;
- 13 (6) <u>increased protective factors</u> [<u>improved parenting</u>
- 14 skills], including nurturing, [and] bonding, and other parenting
- 15 skills;
- 16 (7) improved family economic self-sufficiency;
- 17 (8) reduced parental or youth involvement with the
- 18 criminal justice system; [and]
- 19 (9) increased paternal involvement and support;
- 20 (10) improved maternal and child health; and
- 21 (11) increased protective factors for children and
- 22 <u>youth</u>.
- SECTION 7. Section 265.153, Family Code, is amended to read
- 24 as follows:
- Sec. 265.153. EVALUATION OF PREVENTION AND EARLY
- 26 INTERVENTION PROGRAMS AND PRACTICES [EVIDENCE-BASED PARENTING
- 27 EDUCATION]. (a) The department shall adopt outcome indicators to

- 1 measure the effectiveness of <u>prevention</u> and <u>early intervention</u>
- 2 [parenting education] programs and practices provided under this
- 3 subchapter [chapter] in achieving desired outcomes.
- 4 (b) The department may work directly with the model
- 5 developer of a prevention and early intervention [parenting
- 6 education] program or practice to identify appropriate outcome
- 7 indicators for the program or practice and to ensure that the
- 8 program or practice substantially complies with the model.
- 9 (c) The department shall develop internal processes to
- 10 share information with prevention and early intervention service
- 11 providers [parenting education programs] to assist the department
- 12 in analyzing the performance of the programs or practices.
- 13 (d) The department shall use information obtained under
- 14 this section to:
- 15 (1) monitor <u>prevention</u> and <u>early intervention</u>
- 16 [parenting education] programs and practices;
- 17 (2) continually improve the quality of the programs
- 18 and practices; and
- 19 (3) evaluate the effectiveness of the programs and
- 20 practices.
- SECTION 8. Section 265.154, Family Code, is amended to read
- 22 as follows:
- Sec. 265.154. REPORTS TO LEGISLATURE. (a) Not later than
- 24 December 1 of each even-numbered year, the department shall prepare
- 25 and submit a report on state-funded prevention and early
- 26 intervention [parenting education] programs and practices to the
- 27 standing committees of the senate and house of representatives with

- 1 jurisdiction over child protective services.
- 2 (b) A report submitted under this section must include:
- 3 (1) a description of the <u>prevention and early</u>
- 4 intervention [parenting education] programs and practices
- 5 implemented and of the models associated with the programs  $\underline{\text{and}}$
- 6 practices;
- 7 (2) information on the families served by the programs
- 8 and practices, including the number of families served and their
- 9 demographic information;
- 10 (3) the goals and achieved outcomes of the <u>implemented</u>
- 11 programs and practices;
- 12 (4) information on the cost for each family served,
- 13 including any available third-party return-on-investment analysis;
- 14 and
- 15 (5) information explaining the percentage of money
- 16 spent on evidence-based programs and practices, on promising
- 17 [practice] programs and practices, and on evidence-informed
- 18 programs and practices.
- 19 SECTION 9. Section 265.151(a), Family Code, is repealed.
- 20 SECTION 10. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
