- 5 SECTION 1. Chapter 109, Education Code, is amended by

- SUBCHAPTER E. TEXAS PRODUCED WATER CONSORTIUM 7
- Sec. 109.201. DEFINITIONS. In this subchapter: 8
- (1) "Agency advisory council" means the agency 9

- 11 (2) "Consortium" means the Texas Produced Water

- 13 (3) "Fluid oil and gas waste" has the meaning assigned

- Sec. 109.202. TEXAS PRODUCED WATER CONSORTIUM. The Texas 23
- Produced Water Consortium is a consortium consisting of the host 2.4

- 1 university, the agency advisory council, the stakeholder advisory
- 2 council, the technical and economic steering committee, and private
- 3 entities. The consortium is created to bring together information
- 4 resources to study the economics of and technology related to, and
- 5 the environmental and public health considerations for, beneficial
- 6 uses of <u>fluid oil and gas waste.</u>
- 7 Sec. 109.203. ADMINISTRATION. (a) The agency advisory
- 8 council is composed of representatives of the:
- 9 (1) Department of Agriculture;
- 10 (2) General Land Office;
- 11 (3) Parks and Wildlife Department;
- 12 (4) Railroad Commission of Texas;
- 13 (5) <u>State Energy Conservation Office;</u>
- 14 (6) Texas Commission on Environmental Quality;
- 15 (7) Texas Economic Development and Tourism Office

- 17 (8) Texas Water Development Board.
- 18 (b) Each entity described by Subsection (a) shall select a

- 5 economic, environmental, and public health considerations of

- 7 those uses. After October 1, 2022:
- 8 <u>(1) the research and investigation goals of the</u>
- 9 consortium shall be directed by the members of the consortium; and
- 10 (2) the host university may disband the consortium if

- 13 <u>(a-1) This subsection expires October 1, 2022. Not later</u>

- 4 equipment or other resources in lieu of money.
- 5 (b) Money paid by private entities as membership costs may
- 6 be used only for research and investigation conducted by the
- 7 <u>consortium.</u>
- 8 <u>(c) Except for state money appropriated to the host</u>
- 9 university for use in meeting the requirements of Section
- 10 109.204(a-1) and resources provided by the host university and
- 11 other state university system entities or state agencies, the
- 12 consortium may not receive state money.

- 14 SECTION 3. The Texas Produced Water Consortium, as created
- 15 by Subchapter E, Chapter 109, Education Code, as added by this Act,
- 16 is required to implement a provision of this Act only if the
- 17 legislature appropriates money specifically for that purpose. If
- 18 the legislature does not appropriate money specifically for that
- 19 purpose, the consortium may, but is not required to, implement a
- 20 provision of this Act using other appropriations available for that
- 21 purpose.
- 22 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 23 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 24 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 25 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 26 Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
