BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Section 455.156, Occupations Code, is amended by amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsection (c) to read as follows:

- (b) An applicant for a license under this section must be an individual and:
- (1)present evidence satisfactory to the department that the person has satisfactorily completed massage therapy studies in a 500-hour minimum, supervised course of instruction in a manner provided by Subsection (c) [provided by a massage therapy a massage school, a licensed massage school, instructor at state-approved educational institution, or any combination instructors or schools], in which at least:
- (A) 200 hours are taught by a licensed massage therapy instructor and dedicated to the study of massage therapy techniques and theory and the practice of manipulation of soft tissue, with at least 125 hours dedicated to the study of Swedish massage therapy techniques;
- 1-41 (B) 50 are dedicated to the hours study 1-42 anatomy;
- 1-43 (C) 25 hours are dedicated to the study of physiology;
- 1-44 1-45 hours (D) 50 are dedicated to the study of
- 1-46 kinesiology; 1-47 40 (E) hours are dedicated study of to the 1-48
- pathology; 1-49 (F) 20 hours are dedicated to the study of 1-50 hydrotherapy;
- 1-51 (G) 45 hours are dedicated to the studv 1-52 therapy laws and rules, business practices, massage and 1-53 professional ethics standards;
 - (H) 20 hours are dedicated to the study of aid, universal precautions, health, hygiene, first and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR); and
 - (I) 50 hours are spent in an internship program;
 - pass the required examinations; and
 - (3) be at least 18 years of age.
- 1-60 The hours of instruction required by Subsection (b) must (c)

be provided by a massage therapy instructor at a massage school, licensed massage school, state-approved educational institution, or any combination of instructors or schools. The hours of instruction required by subscations (h) (1) (2) instruction required by Subsections (b)(1)(B)-(H) may be provided using distance learning. Distance learning is not limited to live instruction.

SECTION 2. An applicant for a massage therapist license may satisfy the requirements of Sections 455.156(b)(1)(B)-(H), Occupations Code, using distance learning as provided by Section 455.156(c), Occupations Code, as added by this Act, regardless of whether the application is submitted before, on, or after the effective date of this Act.

SECTION 3. Not later than December 1, 2021, the Texas Commission of Licensing and Regulation shall adopt rules necessary to implement the changes in law made by this Act.

SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
