A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

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- 2 relating to the donation of food by public school campuses.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 4 SECTION 1. Section 33.907, Education Code, is amended by
- 5 amending Subsections (b), (c), and (d) and adding Subsection (c-1)
- 6 to read as follows:
- 7 (b) A school district or open-enrollment charter school may
- 8 allow a campus to elect to donate food to a nonprofit organization
- 9 through <u>a person</u> [an official of the nonprofit organization] who is
- 10 directly and officially affiliated with the campus, including a
- 11 teacher $or[\tau]$ counselor, or through a parent of a student enrolled
- 12 at the campus. The donated food may be received, stored, and
- 13 distributed on the campus. Food donated by the campus may include:
- 14 (1) surplus food prepared for breakfast, lunch, or
- 15 dinner meals or snacks [a snack to be] served from [at] the campus
- 16 cafeteria, subject to any applicable local, state, and federal
- 17 requirements; or
- 18 (2) food donated to the campus as the result of a food
- 19 drive or similar event.
- 20 (c) The type of food donated under Subsection (b)(1) [this
- 21 section] may include:
- 22 (1) packaged [or unpackaged] unserved food that is
- 23 packaged on the campus of a school district or open-enrollment
- 24 charter school and has not been removed from the campus cafeteria;

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- 1 (2) packaged served food if the packaging and food are 2 [is] in good condition;
- 3 (3) whole, uncut produce; and

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- 4 (4) wrapped raw unserved produce[; and
- 5 [(5) unpeeled fruit required to be peeled before 6 consumption].
- 7 (c-1) Food that by law must be maintained at a certain 8 temperature for safety may not be donated unless the campus has 9 maintained the food at the required temperature.
- Food donated under this section to a nonprofit 10 (d) organization may be distributed at the campus at any time. Campus 11 employees may assist in preparing and distributing the food as 12 volunteers for the nonprofit organization. Each person who assists 13 in the preparation and distribution of food as a volunteer must have 14 completed, or be supervised by a person who has completed, a basic 15 16 food safety education or training program for food handlers 17 accredited under Subchapter D, Chapter 438, Health and Safety Code.

SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
