4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Chapter 773, Health and Safety Code, is amended
6	by adding Subchapter J to read as follows:
7	SUBCHAPTER J. BODY WORN CAMERA PROGRAM
8	Sec. 773.301. DEFINITION. In this subchapter, "body worn
9	<pre>camera" means a recording device that is:</pre>
10	(1) capable of recording, or transmitting to be
11	recorded remotely, video or video and audio; and
12	(2) worn on the person of emergency medical services
13	personnel, which includes being worn as an attachment to the

- 14 person's clothing or as glasses.
- 16 medical services provider that elects to operate a body worn camera

Sec. 773.302. BODY WORN CAMERA POLICY. (a) An emergency

- 17 program shall adopt a policy for the use of body worn cameras by
- 18 emergency medical services personnel who provide emergency medical
- 19 <u>services for the provider.</u>

- 20 (b) The policy must:
- (1) comply with all state and federal laws governing
- 22 video recordings, records retention, and protected health
- 23 <u>information</u>, including Chapter 181 and the Health Insurance
- 24 Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (Pub. L. No. 104-191);

- 2 (2) ensure emergency medical services personnel
- 3 activate a body worn camera only for a legitimate emergency medical
- 4 services purpose.
- 5 (c) The policy must include:
- 6 (1) guidelines for the circumstances in which
- 7 emergency medical services personnel are authorized or required to
- 8 activate a camera or discontinue a recording in progress,
- 9 considering the need for privacy in certain situations and at
- 10 certain locations;
- 11 (2) provisions on data retention and automatic
- 12 expungements, including retention of recordings preserved for use
- 13 as part of the patient care record or quality improvement
- 14 processes;
- 15 (3) provisions on storage of video and audio
- 16 recordings, backup copies of the recordings, and maintenance of
- 17 data security;
- 18 <u>(4) guidelines on use of and public access to</u>
- 19 recordings, including on:
- 20 (A) maintaining confidentiality of recordings
- 21 that contain protected health information and the restricted use of
- 22 and prohibited public access to the portion of those recordings
- 23 that contains protected health information; and
- 24 (B) prohibiting public access to any portion of a
- 25 recording that portrays the inside of a home or personal motor
- 26 vehicle unless the owner of the home or motor vehicle consents to
- 27 the disclosure;

- 1 (5) provisions entitling personnel and persons
- 2 receiving emergency medical services to access a recording of an
- 3 incident involving the personnel or persons;
- 4 (6) procedures for supervisory or internal review; and
- 5 (7) provisions on handling equipment and documenting
- 6 malfunctions of equipment.
- 7 (d) A policy adopted under this section may not require
- 8 emergency medical services personnel to activate a body worn camera
- 9 during an entire work shift.
- 10 Sec. 773.303. TRAINING. Before an emergency medical
- 11 services provider may operate a body worn camera program, the
- 12 provider must provide training to:
- 13 (1) emergency medical services personnel who will wear
- 14 the body worn cameras while providing emergency medical services
- 15 for the provider; and
- 16 (2) any other personnel who will have any access to
- 17 video and audio recordings obtained by the provider from the use of
- 18 body worn cameras.
- 19 Sec. 773.304. RECORDING INTERACTIONS WITH PUBLIC.
- 20 Emergency medical services personnel providing emergency medical
- 21 services for an emergency medical services provider while equipped
- 22 with a body worn camera shall act in a manner consistent with the
- 23 provider's policy in circumstances in which activating a body worn
- 24 camera or discontinuing a recording in progress is authorized or
- 25 required.
- Sec. 773.305. USE OF PERSONAL EQUIPMENT. On-duty emergency
- 27 medical services personnel who are providing emergency medical

- 1 services for an emergency medical services provider:
- 2 (1) may only use a body worn camera that is issued and
- 3 maintained by the provider; and
- 4 (2) may not use a privately owned body worn camera or
- 5 other recording device while providing those services.
- 6 Sec. 773.306. OPEN RECORDS EXCEPTION; REQUEST FOR ATTORNEY
- 7 GENERAL DECISION. (a) The following portions of a body worn camera
- 8 recording are not public information and are not subject to
- 9 disclosure under Chapter 552, Government Code:
- 10 (1) any portion of a recording that contains protected
- 11 health information; or
- 12 (2) any portion of a recording that portrays the
- 13 inside of a home or personal motor vehicle, unless the owner of the
- 14 home or motor vehicle consents to the disclosure.
- 15 (b) Notwithstanding Section 552.301(b), Government Code, a
- 16 request by a governmental entity that directly operates an
- 17 <u>emergency medical services provider or by a private emergency</u>
- 18 medical services provider that is subject to Chapter 552,
- 19 Government Code, for a decision from the attorney general about
- 20 whether a requested body worn camera recording that is not excepted
- 21 from public disclosure under Subsection (a) falls within another
- 22 exception to public disclosure is considered timely if made not
- 23 later than the 20th business day after the date of receipt of the
- 24 written request.
- (c) Notwithstanding Section 552.301(d), Government Code,
- 26 the governmental entity's or private provider's response to a
- 27 requestor regarding a requested body worn camera recording is

- 1 considered timely if made not later than the 20th business day after
- 2 the date of receipt of the written request.
- 3 (d) Notwithstanding Section 552.301(e), Government Code,
- 4 the governmental entity's or private provider's submission to the
- 5 attorney general of the information required by that subsection
- 6 regarding a requested body worn camera recording is considered
- 7 timely if made not later than the 25th business day after the date
- 8 of receipt of the written request.
- 9 (e) Notwithstanding Section 552.301(e-1), Government Code,
- 10 the governmental entity's or private provider's submission to a
- 11 requestor of the information required by that subsection regarding
- 12 <u>a requested body worn camera recording is considered timely if made</u>
- 13 not later than the 25th business day after the date of receipt of
- 14 the written request.
- 15 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
