## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to formula funding for excess undergraduate credit hours
3	at public institutions of higher education and to the tuition rate
4	that may be charged for those credit hours.
5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
6	SECTION 1. Section 54.014, Education Code, is amended by
7	amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsections (a-1) and (a-2) to
8	read as follows:
9	(a) An institution of higher education may charge a resident
10	undergraduate student tuition at a higher rate than the rate
11	charged to other resident undergraduate students, not to exceed the
12	rate charged to nonresident undergraduate students, if before the
13	semester or other academic session begins the student has
14	previously attempted a number of semester credit hours for courses
15	taken at any institution of higher education while classified as a
16	resident student for tuition purposes that exceeds [by at least 30
17	hours] the number of semester credit hours required for completion
18	of the degree program in which the student is enrolled $\underline{\text{by at least:}}$
19	(1) for an associate degree program, 15 hours; or
20	(2) for a baccalaureate degree program, 30 hours.
21	<pre>(a-1) For purposes of Subsection (a) [this subsection], an</pre>
22	undergraduate student who is not enrolled in a degree program is

23 considered to be enrolled in a  $\underline{\text{baccalaureate}}$  degree program [ $\underline{\text{or}}$ 

24 programs requiring a minimum of 120 semester credit hours,

- 1 including minors and double majors, and for completion of any
- 2 certificate or other special program in which the student is also
- 3 enrolled, including a program with a study-abroad component].
- 4 (a-2) An institution of higher education that charges
- 5 students tuition at a higher rate under Subsection (a) [this
- 6 subsection] may adopt a policy under which the institution exempts
- 7 from the payment of that higher rate a student that is subject to
- 8 the payment of the higher rate solely as a result of hardship as
- 9 determined by the institution under the policy.
- SECTION 2. Sections 61.0595(a) and (b), Education Code, are
- 11 amended to read as follows:
- 12 (a) In the formulas established under Section 61.059, the
- 13 board may not include funding for semester credit hours earned by a
- 14 resident undergraduate student who before the semester or other
- 15 academic session begins has previously attempted a number of
- 16 semester credit hours for courses taken at any institution of
- 17 higher education while classified as a resident student for tuition
- 18 purposes that exceeds [by at least 30 hours] the number of semester
- 19 credit hours required for completion of the degree program or
- 20 programs in which the student is enrolled, including minors and
- 21 double majors, and for completion of any certificate or other
- 22 special program in which the student is also enrolled, including a
- 23 program with a study-abroad component, by at least:
- 24 (1) for an associate degree program, 15 hours; or
- 25 (2) for a baccalaureate degree program, 30 hours.
- (b) For purposes of Subsection (a), an undergraduate
- 27 student who is not enrolled in a degree program is considered to be

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- 1 enrolled in a <u>baccalaureate</u> degree program [requiring a minimum of
- 2 120 semester credit hours].
- 3 SECTION 3. Section 54.014, Education Code, as amended by
- 4 this Act, applies beginning with tuition charged for the 2023 fall
- 5 semester.
- 6 SECTION 4. Section 61.0595, Education Code, as amended by
- 7 this Act, applies beginning with funding recommendations made under
- 8 Section 61.059, Education Code, for the state fiscal biennium
- 9 beginning September 1, 2023.
- 10 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
