I fully support this legislation. I would make one suggested change to Section 1 (d). The author might want to consider adding language that says "...the secretary of state shall assess a noncompliance fee, [ADD: or in counties where voting centers are being utilized the Secretary may also decertify the county's participation in the countywide voting program under section 43.007.]

When Harris County was applying to be a countywide vote center county if did so in a local municipal election where about only a third of the county's voting population was participating. Even so, the lag time between a voter signing in at a polling location and that information populating to the other polling places was in excess of thirty minutes. This kind of lag time opens the door where a voter could vote at one polling place, hop in his or her car, and then go to another location and vote a second time. It is critical that there be no more than a ten minute lag time (as provided in this legislation). Failure to comply with this requirement should have consequences that go beyond a civil noncompliance fee.

Texas Eagle Forum supports securing electronic voting systems in the strongest way possible while Texas is still using electronic voting systems. The fatal flaw in this bill is the premise that electronic voting systems can be secured. They cannot. DOD cannot secure the air (wireless networks) nor can they secure their computers (even if they are isolated from the internet), so it is

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doubtful that any election system vendors could accomplish what the best in the world have yet to accomplish. We want hand marked paper ballots and hand count for Central Count Tabulation. An example of a weakness in this bill is found on page 2 line 8, which states "maintain a secure wireless connection that does not transmit or store data on any device or medium located outside the state; and..." No such security protocols exists.

Unfortunately, this bill is necessary to correct some serious problems with the way certified election equipment is actually configured and deployed for elections. It does no good for the Secretary of State to certify equipment and full functionality, only to have the county election authorities disable features that were required for certification.

In Harris County, the election authorities have disabled a critical function that the electronic poll books display, at the end of election day, the names of every voter who voted at that location. That's critical to the ability of the election judge to reconcile all the critical election data at the closing of the polls. The fact that so many vote centers in Harris County report more votes cast than voters signed in may be caused by their disabling of the display of voter names at the end of the day. That's unacceptable. We think that's criminal.

We have submitted dozens of official declarations from our election judges to the Secretary of State attesting to the fact that they have been unable to see the voter lists at the end of the election day. It's a real problem.

Our election judges have also run tests of the upload time of the election equipment. This bill calls for "real time" uploads and sets 10 minutes as the standard for data sharing across vote centers. Our election judges have reported that 20-30 minutes is the range of upload times in Harris County. We need to fix this.

The bill as filed has left out one important detail. No voting machine should be used in Texas unless that system can recognize a ballot that's already been counted once, and will reject that ballot for additional tabulation. We can't afford to have a voting system in Texas that can't identify a ballot already counted once. We've communicated this to the author.

Please refer HB 4459 favorably to the full House.
