	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
1	AN ACT
2	relating to establishment of the disaster identification system for
3	a declared state of disaster.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Section 418.004, Government Code, is amended by
6	adding Subdivision (3-a) to read as follows:
7	(3-a) "Illuminated display" means a device that is
8	capable of displaying a flashing light and a continuous light in
9	either the color white or the colors blue, green, red, and yellow.
10	SECTION 2. Section 418.015(a), Government Code, is amended
11	to read as follows:
12	(a) An executive order or proclamation declaring a state of
13	disaster:
14	(1) activates the disaster recovery and
15	rehabilitation aspects of the state emergency management plan
16	applicable to the area subject to the declaration; [and]
17	(2) authorizes the deployment and use of any forces to
18	which the plan applies and the use or distribution of any supplies,
19	equipment, and materials or facilities assembled, stockpiled, or
20	arranged to be made available under this chapter or other law
21	relating to disasters; and
22	(3) activates for the area subject to the declaration
23	the disaster identification system described by Section 418.0151.
24	SECTION 3. Subchapter B, Chapter 418, Government Code, is

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1	amended by adding Section 418.0151 to read as follows:
2	Sec. 418.0151. DISASTER IDENTIFICATION SYSTEM. (a) In an
3	area subject to a state of disaster declaration, a person may elect
4	to participate in the disaster identification system activated for
5	the area. The system must authorize the use of an illuminated
6	display to communicate with disaster relief personnel.
7	(b) A person participating in the disaster identification
8	system shall:
9	(1) affix to each individual and domesticated animal
10	in the person's household an illuminated display of the following
11	<u>colors:</u>
12	(A) if the person has a monochromatic illuminated
13	display, the color white for each individual and animal; or
14	(B) if the person has a multicolored illuminated
15	display:
16	(i) blue for each individual 18 years of age
17	<u>or older;</u>
18	(ii) green for each individual with a
19	disability;
20	(iii) red for each individual younger than
21	18 years of age; and
22	(iv) yellow for each animal; and
23	(2) using the illuminated display, signal to disaster
24	relief personnel responding to the area after the disaster with:
25	(A) a continuous light on the display of each
26	household member who does not need medical assistance; or
27	(B) a flashing light on the display of each

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1	household member who needs medical assistance.
2	(c) Disaster relief personnel may patrol the designated
3	disaster area by air or ground at night to locate individuals or
4	animals with activated illuminated displays.
5	SECTION 4. Section 418.042(a), Government Code, is amended
6	to read as follows:
7	(a) The division shall prepare and keep current a
8	comprehensive state emergency management plan. The plan may
9	include:
10	(1) provisions for prevention and minimization of
11	injury and damage caused by disaster;
12	(2) provisions for prompt and effective response to
13	disaster;
14	<pre>(3) provisions for emergency relief;</pre>
15	<pre>(4) provisions for energy emergencies;</pre>
16	(5) identification of areas particularly vulnerable
17	to disasters;
18	(6) recommendations for zoning, building
19	restrictions, and other land-use controls, safety measures for
20	securing mobile homes or other nonpermanent or semipermanent
21	structures, and other preventive and preparedness measures
22	designed to eliminate or reduce disasters or their impact;
23	(7) provisions for assistance to local officials in
24	designing local emergency management plans;
25	(8) authorization and procedures for the erection or
26	other construction of temporary works designed to protect against
27	or mitigate danger, damage, or loss from flood, fire, or other

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1 disaster; preparation and distribution to the appropriate 2 (9) 3 state and local officials of state catalogs of federal, state, and private assistance programs; 4 5 (10)organization of manpower and channels of assistance; 6 7 (11)coordination federal, of state, and local 8 emergency management activities; 9 (12)coordination of the state emergency management 10 plan with the emergency management plans of the federal government; 11 (13)coordination of federal and state energy 12 emergency plans; provisions for providing information to local 13 (14)14 officials on activation of the Emergency Alert System established 15 under 47 C.F.R. Part 11; 16 (15) a database of public facilities that may be used 17 under Section 418.017 to shelter individuals during a disaster, including air-conditioned facilities for shelter during an extreme 18 heat disaster and fortified structures for shelter during a wind 19 disaster; 20 21 provisions for quickly replenishing the food (16)supplies of area food banks or food pantries following a disaster; 22 23 (17) provisions for the use of the disaster 24 identification system described by Section 418.0151; and 25 (18) [(17)] other necessary matters relating to 26 disasters. SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021. 27

9	(3) any other event considered necessary by the
10	commission, the department, or the division.
11	(b) If more than one disaster is declared for the same event,
12	or the same event qualifies as an event requiring a wellness check
13	for multiple reasons under Subsection (a), only one wellness check
14	is required to be conducted under this subchapter.
15	Sec. 418.306. REQUIREMENTS FOR WELLNESS CHECK. (a) The
16	division, in collaboration with the commission and the department,
17	by rule shall develop minimum standards for conducting wellness
18	checks. Each county and municipality shall adopt procedures for
19	conducting wellness checks in compliance with the minimum
20	standards.
21	(b) A wellness check on a medically fragile individual under
22	this subchapter must:

24	(A) an automated telephone call and text to the
25	individual;
26	(B) a personalized telephone call to the

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(2) be conducted in accordance with the minimum standards prescribed by division rule and the procedures of the 2 3 applicable county or municipality. (c) A wellness check must be conducted as soon as practicable 4 but not later than 24 hours after the event requiring a wellness 5 check occurs. 6 Sec. 418.307. RULES. As soon as practicable after the effective date 10 of this Act, the Texas Division of Emergency Management shall adopt 11
