- 6 SECTION 1. Section 242.043(a), Health and Safety Code, is
- 7 amended to read as follows:
- 8 (a) The $\underline{\text{commission}}$ [$\underline{\text{department}}$] or the $\underline{\text{commission's}}$
- 9 [department's] representative may make any inspection, including
- 10 an unannounced inspection or follow-up inspection, survey, or
- 11 investigation that it considers necessary and may enter the
- 12 premises of an institution at reasonable times to make an
- 13 inspection, survey, or investigation in accordance with department
- 14 rules.

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- SECTION 2. Sections 242.044(a) and (b), Health and Safety
- 16 Code, are amended to read as follows:
- 17 (a) The commission [Each licensing period, the department]
- 18 shall <u>annually</u> conduct at least <u>one</u> [two] unannounced <u>inspection</u>
- 19 [inspections] of each institution.
- 20 (b) For at least one [two] unannounced annual inspection
- 21 [inspections each licensing period] of an institution, the
- 22 commission [department] shall invite at least one person as a
- 23 citizen advocate from:
- 24 (1) the AARP;

- 1 (2) the Texas Senior Citizen Association;
- 2 (3) the department's Certified Long-term Care
- 3 Ombudsman; or
- 4 (4) another statewide organization for the elderly.
- 5 SECTION 3. Subchapter B, Chapter 242, Health and Safety
- 6 Code, is amended by adding Sections 242.0441 and 242.0442 to read as
- 7 follows:
- 8 Sec. 242.0441. FOLLOW-UP INSPECTIONS. (a) The commission
- 9 or the commission's representative may conduct a follow-up
- 10 inspection of an institution after conducting an inspection,
- 11 survey, or investigation of the institution under Section 242.043
- 12 or 242.044 to:
- 13 (1) evaluate and monitor the findings of the initial
- 14 inspection, survey, or investigation; and
- 15 (2) ensure the commission is citing and punishing
- 16 <u>institutional deficiencies consistently across the state.</u>
- 17 (b) If an institution corrects a deficiency cited during a
- 18 follow-up inspection within the time specified by executive
- 19 commissioner rule, the commission may not impose additional
- 20 punitive actions for the deficiency.
- 21 Sec. 242.0442. COMMISSION EVALUATION OF REGULATORY
- 22 CAPACITY. (a) Not later than January 31 of each year, the
- 23 commission shall evaluate the commission's capacity to regulate
- 24 institutions under this chapter and formulate a strategy to
- 25 effectively perform licensing duties, enforcement activities, and
- 26 complaint investigations for that year.
- 27 (b) The commission shall continue to regularly evaluate the

- 3 (c) The commission shall monitor the commission's staffing
- 4 of employees who perform inspections, surveys, or investigations of

- 7 (d) Not later than January 1 of each year, the commission
- 8 shall evaluate the commission's compliance during the previous year
- 9 with Sections 242.043, 242.044, and 242.0441.
- 10 SECTION 4. (a) The Health and Human Services Commission
- 11 shall conduct a survey on the number of facilities licensed under
- 12 Chapter 242, Health and Safety Code, and the number of assisted
- 13 living facilities licensed under Chapter 247, Health and Safety
- 14 Code, that are equipped with an operational emergency generator or
- 15 comparable emergency power source that is capable of providing
- 16 continuous electric utility services to the facility during severe
- 17 weather events or other emergencies.
- 18 (b) Not later than September 1, 2022, the Health and Human
- 19 Services Commission shall publish the results of the survey
- 20 conducted under Subsection (a) of this section on the commission's
- 21 Internet website.
- 22 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.

The bill would amend Health and Safety Code Chapter 242 to require the Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC), or a representative of HHSC, to conduct one unannounced inspection annually. The bill would also allow HHSC, or a representative of HHSC, to conduct a follow-up inspection after conducting the unannounced annual inspection.

Not later than January 31st of each year, HHSC would be required to evaluate their capacity to regulate institutions under Chapter 242. Not later than January 1st of each year, HHSC would be required to evaluate their compliance with unannounced annual inspections under Chapter 242.

The bill would also require HHSC to conduct a survey on the number of facilities licensed under Health and Safety Code Chapters 242 and 247 that are equipped with an operational emergency generator or comparable emergency power source that is capable of providing continuous electric utility services to the facility during severe weather events or other emergencies. Not later than September 1, 2022, HHSC would be required to submit the results of the survey to the members of the House Human Services Committee and the Senate Health and Human Services Committee, or the successor of those committees.

HHSC indicates any cost to implement provisions of the bill would be minimal and could be absorbed within available resources.

Local Government Impact
