10	governmental entity may not adopt or enforce a rule, charter
11	provision, ordinance, order, or other regulation that prohibits or
12	restricts, directly or indirectly, the use of an appliance or other
13	system or component that is fueled by natural gas or propane in the
14	construction, renovation, maintenance, or alteration of a
15	residential or commercial building.
16	(b) A rule, charter provision, ordinance, order, or other
17	regulation adopted by a governmental entity that conflicts with
18	this section is void.

SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.

- 22 construction, renovation, maintenance, or alteration of a
