6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
7	ARTICLE 1. STATE ANATOMICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE; TEXAS FUNERAL
8	SERVICE COMMISSION
9	SECTION 1.01. The heading to Chapter 691, Health and Safety
10	Code, is amended to read as follows:
11	CHAPTER 691. DONATION OF BODIES AND ANATOMICAL SPECIMENS
12	[ANATOMICAL BOARD OF THE STATE OF TEXAS]
13	SECTION 1.02. The heading to Subchapter A, Chapter 691,
14	Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:
15	SUBCHAPTER A. <u>GENERAL PROVISIONS; STATE</u> [ <del>ORGANIZATION OF</del> ]
16	ANATOMICAL <u>ADVISORY COMMITTEE</u> [ <del>BOARD OF THE STATE OF TEXAS</del> ]
17	SECTION 1.03. Section 691.001, Health and Safety Code, is
18	amended by amending Subdivision (1) and adding Subdivisions (4) and
19	(5) to read as follows:
20	(1) " <u>Advisory committee</u> [ <del>Board</del> ]" means the <u>State</u>
21	Anatomical <u>Advisory Committee</u> [ <del>Board of the State of Texas</del> ].
22	(4) "Commission" means the Texas Funeral Service
23	Commission.
24	(5) "Willed body program" means a program operated at

1 an institution of higher education in this state and approved by the commission or a program operated by an organization accredited by 2 the American Association of Tissue Banks that allows a living 3 individual to donate the individual's body or anatomical specimen 4 5 for educational or research purposes. SECTION 1.04. Section 691.002, Health and Safety Code, is 6 7 amended to read as follows: 8 Sec. 691.002. ADVISORY COMMITTEE [COMPOSITION OF BOARD]. The State Anatomical Advisory Committee is established to (a) 9 10 advise the commission on matters related to the regulation and operation of willed body programs in this state. 11 12 (b) The advisory committee is composed of representatives appointed by the commission from institutions of higher education 13 that operate willed body programs [The Anatomical Board of the 14 15 State of Texas is composed of one representative from each school 16 college of chiropractic, osteopathy, medicine, <del>or dentistrv</del> incorporated in this state]. 17 (c) Members of the advisory committee serve two-year terms 18 [(b) On March 1 of each odd-numbered year, the chief executive 19 20 officer of each institution described by Subsection (a) shall appoint as the institution's representative on the board 21 professor of surgery or of basic anatomical sciences who 22

23 associated with the institution].

(d) [(c)] Appointments to the <u>advisory committee</u> [board]
 shall be made without regard to the race, creed, sex, religion, or
 national origin of the appointees.

27 (e) Sections 2110.002 and 2110.008, Government Code, do not

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#### 1 apply to the advisory committee.

2 SECTION 1.05. Section 691.007(c), Health and Safety Code, 3 is redesignated as Section 691.011, Health and Safety Code, and 4 amended to read as follows:

5 <u>Sec. 691.011. RECORDS.</u> [<del>(c)</del>] The <u>commission</u> [<del>board</del>] shall 6 keep identification records of each body donated to the <u>commission</u> 7 [<del>board</del>] and of each body or anatomical specimen distributed by the 8 commission [<del>board</del>].

9 SECTION 1.06. Section 691.008(a), Health and Safety Code, 10 is redesignated as Section 691.012, Health and Safety Code, and 11 amended to read as follows:

12 <u>Sec. 691.012. FEES.</u> [<del>(a)</del>] The <u>commission</u> [<del>board</del>] may set 13 and collect reasonable and necessary fees for:

14 <u>(1)</u> receiving and distributing bodies and anatomical 15 specimens; and

16 (2) conducting inspections of institutions or other
17 persons authorized to receive and use bodies or anatomical
18 specimens under this chapter.

SECTION 1.07. Section 691.010, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

21 Sec. 691.010. PUBLIC INFORMATION AND PARTICIPATION; COMPLAINTS. (a) The commission [board] shall prepare information 22 23 of public interest describing the functions of the commission under this chapter [board] and the commission's [board's] procedures by 24 which complaints are filed with and resolved by the commission 25 26 [<del>board</del>]. The commission [board] shall make the information available to the public and appropriate state agencies. 27

1 (b) The commission [board] by rule shall establish methods by which service recipients can be notified of the name, mailing 2 address, and telephone number of the commission [board] for the 3 purpose of directing complaints to the commission [board]. 4 The 5 commission [board] may provide for that notification by including the information on each written contract relating to bodies willed 6 or donated to an entity regulated by the commission [board] or 7 8 authorized by the commission [board] to receive bodies.

The commission [board] shall keep an information file 9 (c) about each complaint filed with the <u>commission</u> [board] relating to 10 its functions under this chapter. If a written complaint is filed 11 with the commission [board] relating to a person or an entity 12 regulated by the commission under this chapter [board], the 13 commission [board, at least as frequently as quarterly and until 14 15 final disposition of the complaint, shall periodically notify the parties to the complaint of the status of the complaint until final 16 17 <u>disposi</u>tion unless notice would jeopardize undercover an investigation. 18

19 (d) The <u>commission</u> [board] shall develop and implement 20 policies that provide the public with a reasonable opportunity to 21 appear before the <u>commission</u> [board] and to speak on any issue under 22 the jurisdiction of the <u>commission</u> [board].

23 SECTION 1.08. Section 691.022, Health and Safety Code, is 24 amended to read as follows:

25 Sec. 691.022. GENERAL DUTIES. (a) The <u>commission</u> [<del>board</del>] 26 shall distribute bodies and anatomical specimens to institutions <u>of</u> 27 higher education that operate willed body programs and other

1 <u>institutions and</u> persons authorized to receive <u>a body or specimen</u>
2 <u>under this chapter</u> [them].

3 (b) The <u>commission</u> [board] shall adopt rules to ensure that 4 each body and anatomical specimen <u>is treated with respect while</u> in 5 the custody of the <u>commission</u> [board] or an institution <u>or person</u> 6 <u>authorized to receive the body or specimen, including an</u> 7 <u>institution of higher education that operates a willed body program</u> 8 [represented on the board is treated with respect].

9 <u>(c) The commission may not adopt a rule related to standards</u> 10 <u>of practice, ethics, qualifications, or disciplinary sanctions for</u> 11 <u>institutions or persons regulated under this chapter before</u> 12 <u>considering advice and recommendations from the advisory</u> 13 <u>committee.</u>

14 (d) The commission shall adopt rules, establish procedures, 15 and prescribe forms necessary to administer and enforce this 16 <u>chapter.</u>

SECTION 1.09. Section 691.0225, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

19 Sec. 691.0225. INFORMATIONAL DOCUMENT. The <u>commission</u> 20 [board] shall develop a document to inform a person making a gift of 21 a decedent's body or anatomical specimen for purposes of education, 22 including forensic science education, or research of the risks and 23 benefits associated with donation. The <u>commission</u> [board] shall 24 make the document available on the <u>commission's</u> [board's] Internet 25 website.

26 SECTION 1.10. Section 691.023, Health and Safety Code, is 27 amended to read as follows:

Sec. 691.023. DUTY TO DELIVER CERTAIN BODIES TO <u>COMMISSION</u> [BOARD]. (a) An officer, employee, or representative of the state, of a political subdivision, or of an institution having charge or control of a body not claimed for burial or a body required to be buried at public expense shall:

6 (1) notify the <u>commission</u> [board] or the <u>commission's</u> 7 [board's] representative of the body's existence when the body 8 comes into the person's possession, charge, or control if notified 9 in writing to do so by the <u>commission</u> [board] or the <u>commission's</u> 10 [board's] representative;

11 (2) deliver the body in accordance with the direction 12 of the <u>commission</u> [board]; and

(3) allow the <u>commission</u> [board], the <u>commission's</u> [board's] representative, or a physician designated by the <u>commission</u> [board] who complies with this chapter to remove the body to be used for the advancement of medical or forensic science.

(b) If the <u>commission</u> [board] does not require a political subdivision or agency of the political subdivision to deliver a body under this section, the political subdivision shall pay all costs of preparation for burial, including costs of embalming.

21 SECTION 1.11. Section 691.025(c), Health and Safety Code,
22 is amended to read as follows:

(c) A body that is not claimed for burial within 48 hours after a relative receives notification shall be delivered as soon as possible to the <u>commission</u> [board] or the <u>commission's</u> [board's] representative.

27 SECTION 1.12. Section 691.026, Health and Safety Code, is

1 amended to read as follows:

Sec. 691.026. BODY OF TRAVELER. If an unclaimed body is the body of a traveler who died suddenly, the <u>commission</u> [board] shall direct the institution or other person receiving the body to retain the body for six months for purposes of identification.

6 SECTION 1.13. Section 691.027, Health and Safety Code, is 7 amended to read as follows:

8 Sec. 691.027. AUTOPSY. Only the <u>commission</u> [board] may 9 grant permission to perform an autopsy on an unclaimed body. The 10 <u>commission</u> [board] may grant permission after receiving a specific 11 request for an autopsy that shows sufficient evidence of medical 12 urgency.

13 SECTION 1.14. Section 691.028(a), Health and Safety Code, 14 is amended to read as follows:

(a) An adult living in this state who is of sound mind may donate the adult's body by will or other written instrument to the <u>commission</u> [board], a medical or dental school, or another donee authorized by the <u>commission</u> [board,] to be used for the advancement of medical or forensic science.

20 SECTION 1.15. Section 691.029, Health and Safety Code, is 21 amended to read as follows:

22 Sec. 691.029. AUTHORITY TO ACCEPT BODIES FROM OUTSIDE THE 23 STATE. The <u>commission</u> [board] may receive a body transported to the 24 <u>commission</u> [board] from outside this state.

25 SECTION 1.16. Section 691.030, Health and Safety Code, is 26 amended to read as follows:

27 Sec. 691.030. <u>COMMISSION'S</u> [BOARD'S] AUTHORITY TO

1 DISTRIBUTE BODIES AND ANATOMICAL SPECIMENS. (a) The <u>commission</u> 2 [board] or the <u>commission's</u> [board's] representative shall 3 distribute bodies donated to it and may redistribute bodies donated 4 to medical or dental schools or other donees authorized by the 5 <u>commission</u> [board] to:

6 (1) schools and colleges of chiropractic, osteopathy,
7 medicine, or dentistry incorporated in this state;

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(2) forensic science programs;

9 (3) search and rescue organizations or recovery teams 10 that are recognized by the commission [board], are exempt from federal taxation under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 11 detection 12 1986, and use human remains canines with the authorization of a local or county law enforcement agency; 13

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(4) physicians; and

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(5) other persons as provided by this section.

16 (b) In making the distribution, the <u>commission</u> [board] 17 shall give priority to the schools and colleges that need bodies for 18 lectures and demonstrations.

19 (C) If the commission [board] has remaining bodies, the commission [board] or the commission's [board's] representative 20 shall distribute or redistribute those bodies to the schools and 21 colleges proportionately and equitably according to the number of 22 students in each school or college receiving instruction or 23 24 demonstration in normal or morbid anatomy and operative surgery. The dean of each school or college shall certify that number to the 25 26 commission [board] when required by the commission [board].

27 (d) The <u>commission</u> [board] may transport a body or

1 anatomical specimen to an authorized recipient in another state if the commission [board] determines that the supply of bodies or 2 3 anatomical specimens in this state exceeds the need for bodies or anatomical specimens in this state and if: 4

5 (1)the deceased donated the deceased's [his] body in compliance with Section 691.028 and at the time of the donation 6 authorized the commission [board] to transport the body outside 7 8 this state; or

9 (2) the body was donated in compliance with Chapter 10 692A and the person authorized to make the donation under Section 692A.009 authorized the commission [board] to transport the body 11 outside this state. 12

SECTION 1.17. Sections 691.031(a), (b), and (f), Health and 13 14 Safety Code, are amended to read as follows:

15 (a) The commission [board] shall adopt rules to ensure that: 16 each body or anatomical specimen received or (1) 17 distributed by the commission [board] is properly transported;

(2) a label with the statement "CONTENTS DERIVED FROM 18 DONATED HUMAN TISSUE" is affixed to the container in which the body 19 or anatomical specimen is transported; and 20

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each person who has control or possession of a body (3) or anatomical specimen: 22

23 satisfactorily completes the information (A) 24 required on a chain-of-custody form prescribed by the commission 25 [board];

26 (B) maintains a copy of the form for the person's 27 records; and

(C) transfers the form to any other person to
 whom control or possession of the body or anatomical specimen is
 transferred.

4 (b) The <u>commission</u> [board] may employ a public carrier to
5 transport bodies or anatomical specimens received or distributed by
6 the <u>commission</u> [board].

7 (f) The sender and receiver of each body or anatomical 8 specimen shall file the records required under this section in 9 accordance with <u>commission</u> [board] rules so that the <u>commission</u> 10 [board] or a district or county attorney may inspect the records at 11 any time.

SECTION 1.18. Section 691.032, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

DISTRIBUTION. 14 Sec. 691.032. COSTS OF Α person or 15 institution receiving a body or anatomical specimen under this chapter shall pay in a manner specified by the commission [board], 16 17 or as otherwise agreed on, all costs incurred in distributing the body or anatomical specimen so that the state, a county, a 18 municipality, or an officer, employee, or representative of the 19 state, a county, or a municipality does not incur any expense. 20

21 SECTION 1.19. Sections 691.033(a), (b), and (d), Health and 22 Safety Code, are amended to read as follows:

(a) To further medical or forensic science, a school,
college, or person designated by the <u>commission</u> [board] may use,
dissect, operate on, examine, and experiment on a body or
anatomical specimen distributed under this chapter.

27 (b) A school, college, or person shall keep a permanent

1 record of each body or anatomical specimen received from the 2 commission [board] or the commission's [board's] representative. 3 The record must be sufficient to identify the body or anatomical 4 specimen and may be inspected by the commission [board] or the 5 commission's [board's] representative.

(d) To aid prosecutions under Section 42.08, Penal Code, the
<u>commission</u> [board] shall adopt rules that clearly state the
activities that are authorized by the <u>commission</u> [board] in
relation to the use or dissection of a body.

SECTION 1.20. Section 691.034, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 691.034. REGULATION OF PERSONS AND INSTITUTIONS USING BODIES AND ANATOMICAL SPECIMENS. (a) The <u>commission</u> [<del>board</del>] shall inspect and may approve institutions and other persons for the receipt and use of bodies and anatomical specimens under this chapter.

17 (a-1) Notwithstanding any other law, and except as provided 18 by Section 691.0341, the commission may not regulate a willed body 19 program that is operated by an organization accredited by the 20 American Association of Tissue Banks.

(b) The <u>commission</u> [board] may investigate a person or institution if the <u>commission</u> [board] has reason to believe that the person or institution has improperly used a body or anatomical specimen.

(c) The <u>commission</u> [board] may suspend or revoke a person's
or institution's authorization to receive and use or dissect bodies
or anatomical specimens if the <u>commission</u> [board] determines that

H.B. No. 1565 1 the person or institution has improperly used a body or anatomical 2 specimen.

3 (d) A person or institution is entitled to a hearing before the commission [board] or a hearing examiner appointed by the 4 5 commission [board] before the commission [board] may revoke the person's or institution's authorization to receive and use or 6 dissect bodies or anatomical specimens. The commission [board] 7 8 shall make all final decisions to suspend or revoke an authorization. 9

SECTION 1.21. Subchapter B, Chapter 691, Health and Safety
Code, is amended by adding Section 691.0341 to read as follows:

Sec. 691.0341. REQUIRED REGISTRATION OF CERTAIN WILLED BODY ROGRAMS. (a) A willed body program that is operated by an organization accredited by the American Association of Tissue Banks shall register with the commission.

16 (b) The commission by rule shall develop a process for a 17 willed body program described by Subsection (a) to register with 18 the commission.

SECTION 1.22. Subchapter A, Chapter 651, Occupations Code,is amended by adding Section 651.005 to read as follows:

21 <u>Sec. 651.005. REGULATION OF WILLED BODY PROGRAMS. The</u> 22 <u>commission shall regulate willed body programs operated at an</u> 23 <u>institution of higher education in this state as provided by</u> 24 <u>Chapter 691, Health and Safety Code, and in accordance with the</u> 25 <u>powers and duties granted by this chapter to the extent necessary to</u> 26 <u>regulate the programs under that chapter.</u>

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SECTION 1.23. The following provisions of the Health and

10	ARTICLE 2. CONFORMING AMENDMENTS
11	SECTION 2.01. Article 43.25, Code of Criminal Procedure, is
12	amended to read as follows:
13	Art. 43.25. BODY OF CONVICT. The body of a convict who has
14	been legally executed shall be embalmed immediately and so directed
15	by the Director of the correctional institutions division of the
16	Texas Department of Criminal Justice [Department of Corrections].
17	If the body is not demanded or requested by a relative or bona fide
18	friend within forty-eight hours after execution then it shall be
19	delivered to the <u>Texas Funeral Service Commission</u> [Anatomical Board
20	<del>of the State of Texas</del> ], if requested by the <u>commission</u> [ <del>Board</del> ]. If
21	the body is requested by a relative, <u>a</u> bona fide friend, or the
22	Texas Funeral Service Commission [Anatomical Board of the State of
23	$\frac{1}{2}$ Texas], such recipient shall pay a fee [of] not to exceed
24	twenty-five dollars to the mortician for <u>the mortician's</u> [ <del>his</del> ]
25	services in embalming the body for which the mortician shall issue
26	to the recipient a written receipt. When such receipt is delivered
27	to the Director of the correctional institutions division of the

1 Texas Department of Criminal Justice [Department of Corrections], the body of the deceased shall be delivered to the party named in 2 3 the receipt or the party's [his] authorized agent. If the body is not delivered to a relative, <u>a</u> bona fide friend, or the <u>Texas</u> 4 Funeral Service Commission [Anatomical Board of the State of 5 Texas], the Director of the correctional institutions division of 6 the Texas Department of Criminal Justice [Department of 7 8 Corrections] shall cause the body to be decently buried, and the fee for embalming shall be paid by the county in which the indictment 9 which resulted in conviction was found. 10

11 SECTION 2.02. Section 404.093(b), Government Code, is 12 amended to read as follows:

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(b) This subchapter does not apply to:

14 (1) funds pledged to the payment of bonds, notes, or 15 other debts if the funds are not otherwise required to be deposited 16 in the treasury;

17 (2) funds held in trust or escrow for the benefit of a18 person or entity other than a state agency;

19 (3) funds set apart out of earnings derived from 20 investment of funds held in trust for others, as administrative 21 expenses of the trustee agency; <u>or</u>

(4) funds, grants, donations, and proceeds from funds, grants, and donations, given in trust to the Texas State Library and Archives Commission for the establishment and maintenance of regional historical resource depositories and libraries in accordance with Section 441.154[<del>; or</del>

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[<del>(5) funds under the management of the</del>

1	secretary-treasurer of the Anatomical Board of the State of Texas,
2	as provided by Section 691.008, Health and Safety Code].
3	SECTION 2.03. Sections 692A.011(a), (b), and (c), Health and
4	Safety Code, are amended to read as follows:
5	(a) An anatomical gift may be made to the following persons
6	named in the document of gift:
7	(1) an organ procurement organization to be used for
8	transplantation, therapy, research, or education;
9	(2) a hospital to be used for research;
10	(3) subject to Subsection (d), an individual
11	designated by the person making the anatomical gift if the
12	individual is the recipient of the part;
13	(4) an eye bank or tissue bank, except that use of a
14	gift of a whole body to a tissue bank that is not accredited by the
15	American Association of Tissue Banks must be coordinated through
16	the <u>Texas Funeral Service Commission</u> [Anatomical Board of the State
17	of Texas];
18	(5) a forensic science program at:
19	(A) a general academic teaching institution as
20	defined by Section 61.003, Education Code; or
21	(B) a private or independent institution of
22	higher education as defined by Section 61.003, Education Code;
23	(6) a search and rescue organization or recovery team
24	that is recognized by the <u>Texas Funeral Service Commission</u>
25	[Anatomical Board of the State of Texas], is exempt from federal
26	taxation under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 1986,
27	and uses human remains detection canines with the authorization of

1 a local or county law enforcement agency; or

2 (7) the <u>Texas Funeral Service Commission</u> [Anatomical
3 Board of the State of Texas].

(b) Except for donations described by Subsections (a)(1)
through (6), the <u>Texas Funeral Service Commission</u> [Anatomical Board
of the State of Texas] shall be the donee of gifts of bodies or parts
of bodies made for the purpose of education or research that are
subject to distribution by the <u>commission</u> [board] under Chapter
691.

10 (c) A forensic science program that receives a donation 11 under Subsection (a)(5) must submit a report to the <u>Texas Funeral</u> 12 <u>Service Commission</u> [Anatomical Board of the State of Texas] on a 13 quarterly basis that lists:

14 (1) the number of bodies or parts of bodies that the 15 program received; and

16 (2) the method in which the program used the bodies or17 parts of bodies for education or research.

18

ARTICLE 3. TRANSITIONS AND EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 3.01. (a) The Anatomical Board of the State of Texas 19 is abolished but continues in existence until September 1, 2022, 20 for the sole purpose of transferring obligations, property, rights, 21 powers, and duties to the Texas Funeral Service Commission. The 22 Texas Funeral Service Commission assumes all of the obligations, 23 24 property, rights, powers, and duties of the Anatomical Board of the State of Texas as they exist immediately before the effective date 25 26 of this Act. All unexpended and unobligated funds under the management of the secretary-treasurer of the Anatomical Board of 27

1 the State of Texas, as provided by Section 691.008, Health and 2 Safety Code, as that section existed immediately before the 3 effective date of this Act, are transferred to the general revenue 4 fund for the purpose of the Texas Funeral Service Commission 5 administering duties under Chapter 691, Health and Safety Code, as 6 amended by this Act.

7 (b) The Anatomical Board of the State of Texas and the Texas 8 Funeral Service Commission shall, in consultation with appropriate 9 state entities, ensure that the transfer of the obligations, 10 property, rights, powers, and duties of the Anatomical Board of the 11 State of Texas to the Texas Funeral Service Commission is completed 12 not later than September 1, 2022.

All rules of the Anatomical Board of the State of Texas 13 (c) 14 are continued in effect as rules of the Texas Funeral Service 15 Commission until superseded by a rule of the Texas Funeral Service Commission. An authorization issued by the Anatomical Board of the 16 17 State of Texas is continued in effect as provided by the law in effect immediately before the effective date of this Act. 18 An 19 authorization pending on the effective date of this Act is continued without change in status after the effective date of this 20 Act. A complaint, investigation, or other proceeding pending on the 21 effective date of this Act is continued without change in status 22 after the effective date of this Act. 23

(d) Unless the context indicates otherwise, a reference to
 the Anatomical Board of the State of Texas in a law or
 administrative rule means the Texas Funeral Service Commission.
 SECTION 3.02. (a) Not later than the 60th day after the

1 effective date of this Act, the Texas Funeral Service Commission 2 shall appoint members to the State Anatomical Advisory Committee in 3 accordance with Section 691.002, Health and Safety Code, as amended 4 by this Act.

(b) The members of the Anatomical Board of the State of 5 6 Texas whose terms expire under Section 3.01 of this Act shall continue to provide advice to the Texas Funeral Service Commission 7 8 until a majority of the members of the State Anatomical Advisory Committee are appointed under Subsection (a) of this section and 9 qualified. A member of the Anatomical Board of the State of Texas 10 described by this subsection may be appointed to the State 11 Anatomical Advisory Committee if the member is otherwise eligible 12 for appointment under Section 691.002, Health and Safety Code, as 13 14 amended by this Act.

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SECTION 3.03. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.

# A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

#### AN ACT

2 relating to the continuation and transfer of the regulation of 3 willed body programs to the Texas Funeral Service Commission, the 4 regulation of willed body programs and non-transplant anatomical 5 donation organizations, and the creation of the State Anatomical 6 Advisory Committee; authorizing a fee.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: ARTICLE 1. STATE ANATOMICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE; TEXAS FUNERAL 8 SERVICE COMMISSION 9 SECTION 1.01. The heading to Chapter 691, Health and Safety 10 Code, is amended to read as follows: 11 12 CHAPTER 691. DONATION OF BODIES AND ANATOMICAL SPECIMENS [ANATOMICAL BOARD OF THE STATE OF TEXAS] 13 SECTION 1.02. The heading to Subchapter A, Chapter 691, 14 Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows: 15 SUBCHAPTER A. GENERAL PROVISIONS; STATE [ORGANIZATION OF] 16 ANATOMICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE [BOARD OF THE STATE OF TEXAS] 17 SECTION 1.03. Section 691.001, Health and Safety Code, is 18 amended by amending Subdivision (1) and adding Subdivisions (4), 19 (5), and (6) to read as follows: 20 (1) "Advisory committee [Board]" means the State 21 Anatomical Advisory Committee [Board of the State of Texas]. 22 (4) "Commission" means the Texas Funeral Service 23

24 <u>Commission</u>.

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1 (5) "Non-transplant anatomical donation organization" means a person licensed, accredited, or regulated under federal or 2 3 state law to engage in the recovery, screening, testing, processing, storage, or distribution of tissue or human remains for 4 5 any purpose other than transplantation into a living individual. 6 (6) "Willed body program" means a program operated at 7 an institution of higher education in this state and approved by the commission that allows a living individual to donate the 8 individual's body or anatomical specimen for educational or 9 research purposes. 10 SECTION 1.04. Section 691.002, Health and Safety Code, is 11 12 amended to read as follows: Sec. 691.002. ADVISORY COMMITTEE [COMPOSITION OF BOARD]. 13 (a) The State Anatomical Advisory Committee is established to 1415 advise the commission on matters related to the regulation and operation of willed body programs and non-transplant anatomical 16 17 donation organizations in this state. 18 (b) The advisory committee is composed of representatives appointed by the commission from institutions of higher education 19 20 that operate willed body programs and at least one non-transplant anatomical donation organization. The majority of the members of 21 22 the advisory committee must be representatives from institutions of 23 higher education that operate willed body programs [The Anatomical 24 Board of the State of Texas is composed of one representative from 25 each school or college of chiropractic, osteopathy, medicine, or dentistry incorporated in this state]. 26 27 (c) Members of the advisory committee serve two-year terms

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1 [(b) On March 1 of each odd-numbered year, the chief executive 2 officer of each institution described by Subsection (a) shall 3 appoint as the institution's representative on the board one 4 professor of surgery or of basic anatomical sciences who is 5 associated with the institution].

<u>(d)</u> [<del>(c)</del>] Appointments to the <u>advisory committee</u> [board]
shall be made without regard to the race, creed, sex, religion, or
national origin of the appointees.

9 (e) Sections 2110.002 and 2110.008, Government Code, do not 10 apply to the advisory committee.

SECTION 1.05. Section 691.007(c), Health and Safety Code, is redesignated as Section 691.011, Health and Safety Code, and amended to read as follows:

14 <u>Sec. 691.011. RECORDS.</u> [<del>(c)</del>] The <u>commission</u> [<del>board</del>] shall
15 keep identification records of each body donated to the <u>commission</u>
16 [<del>board</del>] and of each body or anatomical specimen distributed by the
17 commission [<del>board</del>].

SECTION 1.06. Section 691.008(a), Health and Safety Code, is redesignated as Section 691.012, Health and Safety Code, and amended to read as follows:

21 <u>Sec. 691.012. FEES.</u> [<del>(a)</del>] The <u>commission</u> [<del>board</del>] may set 22 and collect reasonable and necessary fees for <u>the cost of</u> 23 <u>administering this chapter, including:</u>

24 <u>(1)</u> receiving and distributing bodies and anatomical 25 specimens;

26 (2) transferring bodies and anatomical specimens 27 between institutions, organizations, or other persons authorized

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1 to transfer or receive bodies or anatomical specimens under this
2 chapter; and

3 (3) conducting inspections of institutions,
4 organizations, or other persons authorized to receive and use
5 bodies or anatomical specimens under this chapter.

6 SECTION 1.07. Section 691.010, Health and Safety Code, is 7 amended to read as follows:

Sec. 691.010. PUBLIC INFORMATION AND 8 PARTICIPATION; COMPLAINTS. (a) The commission [board] shall prepare information 9 of public interest describing the functions of the commission under 10 this chapter [board] and the commission's [board's] procedures by 11 which complaints are filed with and resolved by the commission 12 The commission [board] shall make the information 13 [board]. available to the public and appropriate state agencies. 14

15 (b) The commission [board] by rule shall establish methods by which service recipients can be notified of the name, mailing 16 address, and telephone number of the commission [board] for the 17 purpose of directing complaints to the commission [board]. 18 The commission [board] may provide for that notification by including 19 the information on each written contract relating to bodies willed 20 or donated to an entity regulated by the commission [board] or 21 authorized by the commission [board] to receive bodies. 22

(c) The <u>commission</u> [board] shall keep an information file about each complaint filed with the <u>commission</u> [board] relating to its functions <u>under this chapter</u>. If a written complaint is filed with the <u>commission</u> [board] relating to a person or an entity regulated by the <u>commission under this chapter</u> [board], the

1 <u>commission</u> [board, at least as frequently as quarterly and until 2 <u>final disposition of the complaint</u>,] shall <u>periodically</u> notify the 3 parties to the complaint of the status of the complaint <u>until final</u> 4 <u>disposition</u> unless notice would jeopardize an undercover 5 investigation.

6 (d) The <u>commission</u> [board] shall develop and implement 7 policies that provide the public with a reasonable opportunity to 8 appear before the <u>commission</u> [board] and to speak on any issue under 9 the jurisdiction of the <u>commission</u> [board].

SECTION 1.08. Section 691.022, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 691.022. GENERAL DUTIES. (a) The <u>commission</u> [board] shall distribute bodies and anatomical specimens to institutions <u>of</u> <u>higher education that operate willed body programs</u> and other <u>institutions and persons authorized to receive a body or specimen</u> <u>under this chapter [them]</u>.

(b) The <u>commission</u> [board] shall adopt rules to ensure that each body and anatomical specimen <u>is treated with respect while</u> in the custody of the <u>commission</u> [board] or an institution <u>or person</u> <u>authorized to receive the body or specimen, including an</u> <u>institution of higher education that operates a willed body program</u> <u>and a non-transplant anatomical donation organization</u> [represented on the board is treated with respect].

(c) Except as provided by Subsection (d), the commission may
 not adopt a rule related to standards of practice, ethics,
 qualifications, or disciplinary sanctions for institutions or
 persons regulated under this chapter unless the advisory committee

first proposes the rule and the proposed rule is authorized by this 1 chapter. The commission may not modify a rule described by this 2 subsection that is proposed by the advisory committee. If the 3 commission declines to adopt a rule proposed by the advisory 4 committee, the commission shall return the rule to the advisory 5 committee with an explanation of the reasons the commission 6 declined to adopt the rule. 7 (d) The commission may, but is not required to, coordinate 8 9 with the advisory committee to adopt rules regarding non-transplant 10 anatomical donation organizations. The commission shall adopt rules, establish procedures, 11 (e) and prescribe forms necessary to administer and enforce this 12 13 chapter.

SECTION 1.09. Section 691.0225, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 691.0225. INFORMATIONAL DOCUMENT. The <u>commission</u> [board] shall develop a document to inform a person making a gift of a decedent's body or anatomical specimen for purposes of education, including forensic science education, or research of the risks and benefits associated with donation. The <u>commission</u> [board] shall make the document available on the <u>commission's</u> [board's] Internet website.

23 SECTION 1.10. Section 691.023, Health and Safety Code, is
24 amended to read as follows:

25 Sec. 691.023. DUTY TO DELIVER CERTAIN BODIES TO <u>COMMISSION</u> 26 [BOARD]. (a) An officer, employee, or representative of the state, 27 of a political subdivision, or of an institution having charge or

1 control of a body not claimed for burial or a body required to be 2 buried at public expense shall:

3 (1) notify the <u>commission</u> [board] or the <u>commission's</u>
4 [board's] representative of the body's existence when the body
5 comes into the person's possession, charge, or control if notified
6 in writing to do so by the <u>commission</u> [board] or the <u>commission's</u>
7 [board's] representative;

8 (2) deliver the body in accordance with the direction 9 of the commission [board]; and

10 (3) allow the <u>commission</u> [board], the <u>commission's</u> 11 [board's] representative, or a physician designated by the 12 <u>commission</u> [board] who complies with this chapter to remove the 13 body to be used for the advancement of medical or forensic science.

(b) If the <u>commission</u> [board] does not require a political subdivision or agency of the political subdivision to deliver a body under this section, the political subdivision shall pay all costs of preparation for burial, including costs of embalming.

SECTION 1.11. Section 691.025(c), Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

(c) A body that is not claimed for burial within 48 hours after a relative receives notification shall be delivered as soon as possible to the <u>commission</u> [board] or the <u>commission's</u> [board's] representative.

24 SECTION 1.12. Section 691.026, Health and Safety Code, is 25 amended to read as follows:

26 Sec. 691.026. BODY OF TRAVELER. If an unclaimed body is the 27 body of a traveler who died suddenly, the <u>commission</u> [<del>board</del>] shall

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direct the institution or other person receiving the body to retain
 the body for six months for purposes of identification.

3 SECTION 1.13. Section 691.027, Health and Safety Code, is
4 amended to read as follows:

5 Sec. 691.027. AUTOPSY. Only the <u>commission</u> [board] may 6 grant permission to perform an autopsy on an unclaimed body. The 7 <u>commission</u> [board] may grant permission after receiving a specific 8 request for an autopsy that shows sufficient evidence of medical 9 urgency.

SECTION 1.14. Section 691.028(a), Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) An adult living in this state who is of sound mind may donate the adult's body by will or other written instrument to the <u>commission</u> [board], a medical or dental school, <u>a non-transplant</u> <u>anatomical donation organization</u>, or another donee authorized by the <u>commission</u> [board,] to be used for the advancement of medical or forensic science.

SECTION 1.15. Section 691.029, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

20 Sec. 691.029. AUTHORITY TO <u>RECEIVE</u>, <u>DISTRIBUTE</u>, <u>AND</u> 21 <u>TRANSFER</u> [ACCEPT] BODIES <u>OR ANATOMICAL SPECIMENS</u> [FROM OUTSIDE THE 22 <u>STATE</u>]. The <u>commission</u> [board] may receive, <u>distribute</u>, <u>and</u> 23 <u>transfer a body or anatomical specimen from inside or</u> [<del>a body</del> 24 <del>transported to the board from</del>] outside this state.

25 SECTION 1.16. Section 691.030, Health and Safety Code, is 26 amended to read as follows:

27 Sec. 691.030. <u>COMMISSION'S</u> [BOARD'S] AUTHORITY TO

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1 DISTRIBUTE BODIES AND ANATOMICAL SPECIMENS. (a) The <u>commission</u> 2 [board] or the <u>commission's</u> [board's] representative shall 3 distribute bodies donated to it and may redistribute bodies donated 4 to medical or dental schools or other donees authorized by the 5 <u>commission</u> [board] to:

6 (1) schools and colleges of chiropractic, osteopathy,
7 medicine, or dentistry incorporated in this state;

8

(2) forensic science programs;

9 (3) search and rescue organizations or recovery teams 10 that are recognized by the <u>commission</u> [board], are exempt from 11 federal taxation under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 12 1986, and use human remains detection canines with the 13 authorization of a local or county law enforcement agency;

14

(4) physicians; and

15

(5) other persons as provided by this section.

(b) In making the distribution, the <u>commission</u> [board]
shall give priority to the schools and colleges that need bodies for
lectures, labs, and demonstrations.

19 (c) If the commission [board] has remaining bodies, the commission [board] or the commission's [board's] representative 20 shall distribute or redistribute those bodies to the schools and 21 colleges proportionately and equitably according to the number of 22 students in each school or college receiving instruction or 23 demonstration in normal or morbid anatomy and operative surgery. 24 25 The president of each university or dean of each school or college 26 shall certify that number to the commission [board] when required by the commission [board]. 27

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1 (d) The <u>commission</u> [board] may transport a body or 2 anatomical specimen to an authorized recipient in another state if 3 the <u>commission</u> [board] determines that the supply of bodies or 4 anatomical specimens in this state exceeds the need for bodies or 5 anatomical specimens in this state and if:

6 (1) the deceased donated <u>the deceased's</u> [his] body in 7 compliance with Section 691.028 and at the time of the donation 8 authorized the <u>commission</u> [board] to transport the body outside 9 this state; or

10 (2) the body was donated in compliance with Chapter 11 692A and the person authorized to make the donation under Section 12 692A.009 authorized the <u>commission</u> [board] to transport the body 13 outside this state.

14 (e) This section does not apply to a body donated to a 15 <u>non-transplant anatomical donation organization.</u>

SECTION 1.17. Sections 691.031(a), (b), and (f), Health and Safety Code, are amended to read as follows:

18 (a) The <u>commission</u> [board] shall adopt rules to ensure that: 19 (1) each body or anatomical specimen received or 20 distributed <u>under this chapter</u> [by the board] is properly 21 transported;

(2) a label with the statement "CONTENTS DERIVED FROM
 DONATED HUMAN TISSUE" is affixed to the container in which the body
 or anatomical specimen is transported; and

(3) each person who has control or possession of a bodyor anatomical specimen:

(A) satisfactorily completes the information

1 required on a chain-of-custody form prescribed by the <u>commission</u>
2 [board];

3 (B) maintains a copy of the form for the person's4 records; and

5 (C) transfers the form to any other person to 6 whom control or possession of the body or anatomical specimen is 7 transferred.

8 (b) The <u>commission</u> [board] may employ a public carrier to 9 transport bodies or anatomical specimens received or distributed by 10 the <u>commission</u> [board].

(f) The sender and receiver of each body or anatomical specimen shall file the records required under this section in accordance with <u>commission</u> [board] rules so that the <u>commission</u> [board] or a district or county attorney may inspect the records at any time.

SECTION 1.18. Section 691.032, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

18 Sec. 691.032. COSTS OF DISTRIBUTION. А person or 19 institution receiving a body or anatomical specimen under this chapter shall pay in a manner specified by the <u>commission</u> [board], 20 or as otherwise agreed on, all costs incurred in distributing the 21 22 body or anatomical specimen so that the state, a county, a municipality, or an officer, employee, or representative of the 23 24 state, a county, or a municipality does not incur any expense.

25 SECTION 1.19. Sections 691.033(a), (b), and (d), Health and 26 Safety Code, are amended to read as follows:

27 (a) To further medical or forensic science, a <u>willed body</u>

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program, non-transplant anatomical donation organization, [school, college,] or other person designated by the commission [board] may use, dissect, operate on, examine, and experiment on a body or anatomical specimen distributed under this chapter.

5 (b) A willed body program, non-transplant anatomical 6 donation organization, [school, college,] or other person shall 7 keep a permanent record of each body or anatomical specimen 8 received from the <u>commission</u> [board] or the <u>commission's</u> [board's] 9 representative. The record must be sufficient to identify the body 10 or anatomical specimen and may be inspected by the <u>commission</u> 11 [board] or the <u>commission's</u> [board's] representative.

12 (d) To aid prosecutions under Section 42.08, Penal Code, the 13 <u>commission</u> [board] shall adopt rules that clearly state the 14 activities that are authorized by the <u>commission</u> [board] in 15 relation to the use or dissection of a body.

SECTION 1.20. Section 691.034, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 691.034. REGULATION OF PERSONS AND INSTITUTIONS USING BODIES AND ANATOMICAL SPECIMENS. (a) The <u>commission</u> [board] shall inspect and may approve <u>willed body programs</u>, <u>non-transplant</u> <u>anatomical donation organizations</u>, [institutions] and other persons for the receipt and use of bodies and anatomical specimens under this chapter.

(b) The <u>commission</u> [board] may investigate a <u>willed body</u>
program, non-transplant anatomical donation organization, or other
person [or institution] if the <u>commission</u> [board] has reason to
believe that the program, organization, or person [or institution]

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1 has improperly used a body or anatomical specimen.

(c) The <u>commission</u> [board] may suspend or revoke a <u>willed</u>
<u>body program's, non-transplant anatomical donation organization's,</u>
<u>or other person's [or institution's</u>] authorization to receive and
use or dissect bodies or anatomical specimens if the <u>commission</u>
[board] determines that the <u>program, organization, or person [or</u>
<u>institution</u>] has improperly used a body or anatomical specimen.

8 (d) A willed body program, non-transplant anatomical donation organization, or other person [or institution] is entitled 9 10 to a hearing before the commission [board] or a hearing examiner appointed by the commission [board] before the commission [board] 11 12 may revoke the program's, organization's, or person's [or institution's] authorization to receive and use or dissect bodies 13 or anatomical specimens. The commission [board] shall make all 14final decisions to suspend or revoke an authorization. 15

SECTION 1.21. Subchapter A, Chapter 651, Occupations Code, is amended by adding Section 651.005 to read as follows:

18 Sec. 651.005. REGULATION OF WILLED BODY PROGRAMS AND 19 NON-TRANSPLANT ANATOMICAL DONATION ORGANIZATIONS. The commission 20 shall regulate willed body programs and non-transplant anatomical 21 donation organizations as provided by Chapter 691, Health and 22 Safety Code, and in accordance with the powers and duties granted by 23 this chapter to the extent necessary to regulate the programs under 24 that chapter.

25 SECTION 1.22. The following provisions of the Health and 26 Safety Code are repealed:

ARTICLE 2. CONFORMING AMENDMENTS 8 9 SECTION 2.01. Article 43.25, Code of Criminal Procedure, is

10 amended to read as follows:

Art. 43.25. BODY OF CONVICT. The body of a convict who has 11 12 been legally executed shall be embalmed immediately and so directed 13 by the Director of the correctional institutions division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice [Department of Corrections]. 14 15 If the body is not demanded or requested by a relative or bona fide friend within forty-eight hours after execution then it shall be 16 17 delivered to the Texas Funeral Service Commission [Anatomical Board 18 of the State of Texas], if requested by the commission [Board]. If 19 the body is requested by a relative, <u>a</u> bona fide friend, or the Texas Funeral Service Commission [Anatomical Board of the State of 20 Texas], such recipient shall pay a fee [of] not to exceed 21 twenty-five dollars to the mortician for the mortician's [his] 22 services in embalming the body for which the mortician shall issue 23 to the recipient a written receipt. When such receipt is delivered 24 to the Director of the correctional institutions division of the 25 Texas Department of Criminal Justice [Department of Corrections], 26 the body of the deceased shall be delivered to the party named in 27

1 the receipt or <u>the party's</u> [his] authorized agent. If the body is 2 not delivered to a relative, <u>a</u> bona fide friend, or the <u>Texas</u> 3 <u>Funeral Service Commission</u> [Anatomical Board of the State of 4 <u>Texas</u>], the Director of the <u>correctional institutions division of</u> 5 <u>the Texas Department of Criminal Justice</u> [Department of 6 <u>Corrections</u>] shall cause the body to be decently buried, and the fee 7 for embalming shall be paid by the county in which the indictment 8 which resulted in conviction was found.

9 SECTION 2.02. Section 404.093(b), Government Code, is 10 amended to read as follows:

11 (b) This subchapter does not apply to:

(1) funds pledged to the payment of bonds, notes, or other debts if the funds are not otherwise required to be deposited in the treasury;

15 (2) funds held in trust or escrow for the benefit of a16 person or entity other than a state agency;

17 (3) funds set apart out of earnings derived from 18 investment of funds held in trust for others, as administrative 19 expenses of the trustee agency; <u>or</u>

(4) funds, grants, donations, and proceeds from funds,
grants, and donations, given in trust to the Texas State Library and
Archives Commission for the establishment and maintenance of
regional historical resource depositories and libraries in
accordance with Section 441.154[<del>, or</del>

25 [(5) funds under the management of the 26 secretary=treasurer of the Anatomical Board of the State of Texas, 27 as provided by Section 691.008, Health and Safety Code].

1 SECTION 2.03. Sections 692A.011(a), (b), and (c), Health and Safety Code, are amended to read as follows: 2 An anatomical gift may be made to the following persons 3 (a) named in the document of gift: 4 5 an organ procurement organization to be used for (1)transplantation, therapy, research, or education; 6 7 (2) a hospital to be used for research; 8 (3) subject to Subsection (d), an individual designated by the person making the anatomical gift if the 9 individual is the recipient of the part; 10 an eye bank or tissue bank, except that use of a 11 (4) gift of a whole body must be coordinated through the Texas Funeral 12 Service Commission [Anatomical Board of the State of Texas]; 13 14(5) a forensic science program at: 15 (A) a general academic teaching institution as defined by Section 61.003, Education Code; or 16 (B) a private or independent institution 17 of higher education as defined by Section 61.003, Education Code; 18 19 (6) a search and rescue organization or recovery team is recognized by the Texas Funeral Service Commission 20 that [Anatomical Board of the State of Texas], is exempt from federal 21 22 taxation under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 1986, and uses human remains detection canines with the authorization of 23 a local or county law enforcement agency; or 24 25 (7) the Texas Funeral Service Commission [Anatomical Board of the State of Texas]. 26 27 Except for donations described by Subsections (a)(1) (b)

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1 through (6), the <u>Texas Funeral Service Commission</u> [Anatomical Board 2 of the State of Texas] shall be the donee of gifts of bodies or parts 3 of bodies made for the purpose of education or research that are 4 subject to distribution by the <u>commission</u> [board] under Chapter 5 691.

6 (c) A forensic science program that receives a donation 7 under Subsection (a)(5) must submit a report to the <u>Texas Funeral</u> 8 <u>Service Commission</u> [Anatomical Board of the State of Texas] on a 9 quarterly basis that lists:

10 (1) the number of bodies or parts of bodies that the 11 program received; and

12 (2) the method in which the program used the bodies or13 parts of bodies for education or research.

14

ARTICLE 3. TRANSITIONS AND EFFECTIVE DATE

15 SECTION 3.01. (a) The Anatomical Board of the State of Texas is abolished but continues in existence until September 1, 2022, 16 17 for the sole purpose of transferring obligations, property, rights, powers, and duties to the Texas Funeral Service Commission. The 18 Texas Funeral Service Commission assumes all of the obligations, 19 property, rights, powers, and duties of the Anatomical Board of the 20 21 State of Texas as they exist immediately before the effective date 22 of this Act. All unexpended and unobligated funds under the management of the secretary-treasurer of the Anatomical Board of 23 the State of Texas, as provided by Section 691.008, Health and 24 25 Safety Code, as that section existed immediately before the 26 effective date of this Act, are transferred to the general revenue fund for the purpose of the Texas Funeral Service Commission 27

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administering duties under Chapter 691, Health and Safety Code, as
 amended by this Act.

3 (b) The Anatomical Board of the State of Texas and the Texas 4 Funeral Service Commission shall, in consultation with appropriate 5 state entities, ensure that the transfer of the obligations, 6 property, rights, powers, and duties of the Anatomical Board of the 7 State of Texas to the Texas Funeral Service Commission is completed 8 not later than September 1, 2022.

9 (c) All rules of the Anatomical Board of the State of Texas 10 are continued in effect as rules of the Texas Funeral Service 11 Commission until superseded by a rule of the Texas Funeral Service Commission.
