## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the establishment and duties of the Texas 1836 Project.
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. Subtitle D, Title 4, Government Code, is amended
5	by adding Chapter 451 to read as follows:
6	CHAPTER 451. TEXAS 1836 PROJECT
7	Sec. 451.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
8	(1) "1836 Project" means the advisory committee
9	established under this chapter.
10	(2) "Patriotic education" includes the:
11	(A) presentation of the history of this state's
12	founding and foundational principles;
13	(B) examination of how this state has grown
14	closer to those principles throughout its history; and
15	(C) explanation of why commitment to those
16	principles is beneficial and justified.
17	(3) "State agency" means a department, commission,
18	board, office, or other agency in the executive branch of state
19	government that is created by the constitution or a statute of this
20	state.
21	Sec. 451.002. ESTABLISHMENT. (a) The 1836 Project is
22	established as an advisory committee to promote patriotic education
23	and increase awareness of the Texas values that continue to
24	stimulate boundless prosperity across this state.

(b) The 1836 Project is composed of nine members. The 1 governor, lieutenant governor, and speaker of the house of 2 representatives shall each appoint three members. The appointees 3 may include persons in the private sector with relevant experience 4 5 or subject matter expertise. 6 (c) Members serve two-year terms and may not be removed 7 except for inefficiency, neglect of duty, or malfeasance. (d) The governor shall appoint one member of the 1836 8 Project as the presiding officer. 9 10 (e) The presiding officer shall: (1) convene regular meetings of the 1836 Project; and 11 12 (2) coordinate and direct the activities of the 1836 13 Project. 14 Sec. 451.003. DUTIES. (a) The 1836 Project shall: 15 (1) promote awareness among residents of this state of the following as they relate to the history of prosperity and 16 17 democratic freedom in this state: (A) Texas history, including the indigenous 18 peoples of this state, the Spanish and Mexican heritage of this 19 state, Tejanos, the Texas War for Independence, annexation of Texas 20 by the United States, the Christian heritage of this state, this 21 state's heritage of keeping and bearing firearms in defense of life 22 and liberty and for use in hunting, and Juneteenth; 23 24 (B) the founding documents of this state; 25 (C) the founders of this state; 26 (D) state civics; and

(E) the role of this state in passing and

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- 1 reauthorizing the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 (52 U.S.C.
- 2 Section 10101 et seq.), highlighting:
- 3 <u>(i) President Lyndon B. Johnson's signing</u>
- 4 of the act;
- 5 (ii) President George W. Bush's 25-year
- 6 extension of the act; and
- 7 <u>(iii) Congresswoman Barbara Jordan's</u>
- 8 successful efforts to broaden the act to include Spanish-speaking
- 9 communities;
- 10 (2) advise the governor on the core principles of the
- 11 founding of this state and how those principles further enrich the
- 12 lives of its residents;
- 13 (3) facilitate the development and implementation of
- 14 the Gubernatorial 1836 Award to recognize student knowledge of
- 15 Texas Independence and other items listed in Subdivisions
- 16 (1)(A)-(D);
- 17 (4) advise state agencies with regard to their efforts
- 18 to ensure patriotic education is provided to the public at state
- 19 parks, battlefields, monuments, museums, installations, landmarks,
- 20 cemeteries, and other places important to the Texas War for
- 21 Independence and founding of this state, as appropriate and
- 22 consistent with applicable law; and
- 23 <u>(5) facilitate, advise on, and promote other</u>
- 24 activities to support public knowledge of and patriotic education
- 25 on the Texas War for Independence and founding of this state, as
- 26 appropriate and consistent with applicable law.
- (b) In carrying out its duties under Subsection (a)(2), the

- 1 project may solicit statements and contributions from intellectual
- 2 and cultural figures.
- 3 Sec. 451.004. FUNDING; COMPENSATION. (a) The Texas
- 4 Education Agency shall provide funding and administrative support
- 5 for the 1836 Project, including for the pamphlets described by
- 6 Section 451.005, to the extent funds are available for those
- 7 purposes.
- 8 (b) A member of the 1836 Project is not entitled to
- 9 compensation but is entitled to reimbursement for the travel
- 10 expenses incurred by the member while transacting project business,
- 11 as provided by the General Appropriations Act.
- Sec. 451.005. PAMPHLET. Not later than September 1, 2022,
- 13 the 1836 Project shall provide a pamphlet to the Texas Department of
- 14 Public Safety that explains the significance of policy decisions
- 15 made by this state that promote liberty and freedom for businesses
- 16 <u>and families. The contents must include:</u>
- 17 (1) an overview of Texas history and civics;
- 18 (2) the legacy of economic prosperity in this state;
- 19 and
- 20 (3) the abundant opportunities for businesses and
- 21 <u>families in this state.</u>
- Sec. 451.006. REPORT. (a) Not later than September 1,
- 23 2022, the 1836 Project shall prepare and produce a written report
- 24 that includes:
- 25 (1) a description of the activities of the project;
- 26 (2) the findings and recommendations of the project;
- 27 (3) a plan that identifies the best method of carrying

- 1 out the duties under Sections 451.003(a)(1), (4), and (5);
- 2 (4) any proposals for legislation; and
- 3 (5) any other matter the project considers
- 4 appropriate.
- 5 (b) Subsequent to the report required under Subsection (a),
- 6 the 1836 Project may prepare and produce additional reports the
- 7 project considers appropriate.
- 8 (c) The Texas Education Agency shall make a report described
- 9 by this section available to the public on the agency's Internet
- 10 website.
- 11 (d) To the extent existing agency resources are available
- 12 for this purpose, the Texas Education Agency may provide to the 1836
- 13 Project any agency resources necessary to prepare or produce a
- 14 report described by this section.
- Sec. 451.007. ABOLITION; EXPIRATION. The 1836 Project is
- 16 <u>abolished and this chapter expires September 1, 2036.</u>
- 17 SECTION 2. Subchapter A, Chapter 521, Transportation Code,
- 18 is amended by adding Section 521.013 to read as follows:
- 19 Sec. 521.013. TEXAS 1836 PROJECT PAMPHLET. (a) The
- 20 department shall provide the pamphlet described by Section 451.005,
- 21 Government Code, to persons who receive a driver's license:
- 22 (1) after applying under Section 521.144; or
- 23 (2) with an expiration provided by Section
- 24 521.271(a-2) or (a-3).
- 25 (b) The department shall make the pamphlet described by
- 26 Section 451.005, Government Code, available to the public on the
- 27 department's Internet website.

- 1 SECTION 3. As soon as possible after the effective date of
- 2 this Act, the governor, the lieutenant governor, and the speaker of
- 3 the house of representatives shall make the appointments to the
- 4 1836 Project under Section 451.002, Government Code, as added by

- 6 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect September 1, 2021.



## Fiscal Analysis

The bill would establish a nine-member advisory committee known as "The 1836 Project," with members appointed by the Governor, Speaker of the House, and Lieutenant Governor. The purpose of the committee would be to promote awareness of Texas state history, and advise state agencies about certain aspects of Texas

history. The committee would be required to prepare a pamphlet including certain information about Texas history to the Department of Public Safety and produce a report containing legislative recommendations.

### Methodology

The bill would require the Texas Education Agency (TEA) to provide funding and administrative support for the advisory committee. According to TEA, the bill would require 1.0 FTE to support the work of the advisory committee. Salary, benefits and other costs associated with the employee would total \$91,258 in fiscal year 2022 and \$87,258 in subsequent fiscal years. TEA estimates a cost of \$100,000 in fiscal year 2023 to contract with an external vendor to produce the report that is required by the bill. The agency estimates a cost of \$65,682 per fiscal year to print and distribute the pamphlet to driver's license applicants who are new residents or whose provision or learner license expires on the applicant's 18th birthday. The agency also estimates that \$28,440 per fiscal year would be required to support the work of the advisory committee. These funds would pay for lodging, meals and incidentals, and mileage and airfare, among other costs.

According to the Department of Public Safety, the bill would have no significant fiscal impact.
