5	SECTION 1. Section 56.001, Utilities Code, is amended by
6	adding Subdivision (3) to read as follows:

23	SECTION 2. Section 56.022, Utilities Code, is amended to
24	read as follows:

1 Sec. 56.022. UNIFORM CHARGE. (a) The universal service 2 fund is funded by a statewide uniform charge payable by each 3 telecommunications provider <u>and each provider of Voice over</u> 4 <u>Internet Protocol service that has access to the customer base</u>.

5 (b) A telecommunications provider <u>or provider of Voice over</u> 6 <u>Internet Protocol service</u> shall pay the charge in accordance with 7 procedures approved by the commission.

8 (c) The uniform charge is on services and at rates the 9 commission determines. In establishing the charge and the services 10 to which the charge will apply, the commission may not:

(1) grant an unreasonable preference or advantage to a telecommunications provider <u>or a provider of Voice over Internet</u> Protocol service;

14 (2) assess the charge on pay telephone service; [<del>or</del>]
15 (3) subject a telecommunications provider <u>or a</u>
16 <u>provider of Voice over Internet Protocol service</u> to unreasonable
17 prejudice or disadvantage; or

18 (4) assess the charge in a manner that is not 19 technology-neutral or that grants an unreasonable preference based 20 on technology.

21 SECTION 3. Sections 56.024(a) and (b), Utilities Code, are 22 amended to read as follows:

(a) The commission may require a telecommunications
provider or a provider of Voice over Internet Protocol service to
provide a report or information necessary to assess contributions
and disbursements to the universal service fund.

27 (b) A report or information the commission requires a

2 <u>Protocol service</u> to provide under Subsection (a) is confidential
3 and not subject to disclosure under Chapter 552, Government Code.

4 SECTION 4. Not later than December 31, 2021, the Public 5 Utility Commission of Texas shall initiate the rulemaking to adopt 6 the rules required by Section 56.001, Utilities Code, as amended by 7 this Act.

8 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 9 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 10 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 11 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 12 Act takes effect September 1, 2021.
