## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

relating to the compensation of public school educators and to the
public school finance system, including enrollment-based funding
for certain allotments under the Foundation School Program.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

7 SECTION 1.01. Section 19.009(d-2), Education Code, is

ARTICLE 1. CHANGES EFFECTIVE FOR 2023-2024 SCHOOL YEAR

- 9 (d-2) Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, the district shall increase the [monthly] salary of each classroom teacher, full-time speech pathologist, full-time librarian, full-time school counselor certified under Subchapter B, Chapter 21, and full-time school nurse employed by the district by the greater of:

- 14 requirements of Subsection (a) in the 2023-2024 school year may
- 15 satisfy the requirements of this section by providing an employee a
- 16 one-time bonus payment during the 2024-2025 school year in an

- 18 the employee during the 2023-2024 school year and the compensation

- 7 attends a mathematics achievement academy is entitled to receive a
- 8 stipend in the amount determined by the commissioner. A stipend
- 9 received under this subsection is not considered in determining
- 10 whether a district is paying the teacher the minimum [monthly]
- 11 salary under Section 21.402.
- 12 SECTION 1.07. Section 21.4555(f), Education Code, is
- 13 amended to read as follows:
- 14 (f) From funds available for that purpose, a teacher who
- 15 attends a civics training program may receive a stipend in an amount
- 16 determined by the commissioner. A stipend received under this
- 17 section is not included in determining whether a district is paying
- 18 the teacher the minimum [monthly] salary under Section 21.402.
- 19 SECTION 1.08. Section 30.102(b), Education Code, is amended
- 20 to read as follows:
- 21 (b) A classroom teacher, full-time librarian, full-time
- 22 school counselor certified under Subchapter B, Chapter 21, or
- 23 full-time school nurse employed by the department is entitled to
- 24 receive as a minimum salary the [monthly] salary specified by
- 25 Section 21.402. A classroom teacher, full-time librarian,
- 26 full-time school counselor, or full-time school nurse may be paid,
- 27 from funds appropriated to the department, a salary in excess of the

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- 1 minimum specified by that section, but the salary may not exceed the
- 2 rate of pay for a similar position in the public schools of an
- 3 adjacent school district.
- 4 SECTION 1.09. Section 33.009(h), Education Code, is amended
- 5 to read as follows:
- 6 (h) From funds appropriated for that purpose, a school
- 7 counselor who attends the academy under this section is entitled to
- 8 receive a stipend in the amount determined by the coordinating
- 9 board. If funds are available after all eligible school counselors
- 10 have received a stipend under this subsection, the coordinating
- 11 board shall pay a stipend in the amount determined by the
- 12 coordinating board to a teacher who attends the academy under this
- 13 section. A stipend received under this subsection is not
- 14 considered in determining whether a district is paying the school
- 15 counselor or teacher the minimum [monthly] salary under Section

- SECTION 1.10. Subchapter A, Chapter 48, Education Code, is

- 27 the formula, of the following formulas, that results in the

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1 greatest annual allotment:
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- 2 (1) the formula in Subsection (b), if the district is
- 3 eligible for that formula; or
- 4 (2)  $AA = ((5,000 AE [ADA]) \times ___[.000025]) \times$
- 5 BA.
- 6 (d) Instead of the allotment under Subsection (b) or (c)(1),
- 7 a school district that has fewer than 300 students in average
- 8 enrollment [daily attendance] and is the only school district
- 9 located in and operating in a county is entitled to an annual
- 10 allotment for each student in average <a href="mailto:enrollment">enrollment</a> [daily attendance]
- 11 based on the following formula:

- SECTION 1.13. Section 48.151(c), Education Code, is amended
- 14 to read as follows:
- 15 (c) Each district or county operating a regular
- 16 transportation system is entitled to an allotment based on a rate of
- 17 \$1.54 per mile per regular eligible student or a greater rate set by
- 18 the legislature in the General Appropriations Act.
- 19 SECTION 1.14. Subchapter D, Chapter 48, Education Code, is
- 20 amended by adding Section 48.160 to read as follows:
- Sec. 48.160. ALLOTMENT FOR ADVANCED MATHEMATICS PATHWAYS
- 22 AND CERTAIN PROGRAMS OF STUDY. (a) A school district is eligible
- 23 to receive an allotment under this section if the district offers
- 24 through in-person instruction, remote instruction, or a hybrid of
- 25 in-person and remote instruction:
- 26 (1) an advanced mathematics pathway that begins with
- 27 Algebra I in grade eight and continues through progressively more

- SECTION 1.18. (a) Except as provided by Subsection (b) of
- 11 this section, this article takes effect immediately if this Act
- 12 receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each

- 14 If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate
- 15 effect, the entirety of this article takes effect September 1,
