## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

2 relating to the Texas Medical Disclosure Panel.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

4 SECTION 1. Section 74.102, Civil Practice and Remedies

5 Code, is amended by amending Subsections (b), (c), (d), and (h) and

6 adding Subsection (i) to read as follows:

- 7 (b) The disclosure panel established herein is
- 8 administratively attached to the [Texas Department of] Health and
- 9 Human Services Commission. The commission [<del>Texas Department of</del>
- 10 Health], at the request of the disclosure panel, shall provide
- 11 administrative assistance to the panel; and the  $\underline{\text{commission}}$  [ $\underline{\text{Texas}}$
- 12 Department of Health] and the disclosure panel shall coordinate
- 13 administrative responsibilities in order to avoid unnecessary
- 14 duplication of facilities and services. The commission [Texas
- 15 Department of Health], at the request of the panel, shall submit the
- 16 panel's budget request to the legislature. The panel shall be
- 17 subject, except where inconsistent, to the rules and procedures of
- 18 the <a href="mailto:commission">commission</a> [Texas Department of Health]; however, the duties
- 19 and responsibilities of the panel as set forth in this chapter shall
- 20 be exercised solely by the disclosure panel, and the  $\underline{\text{executive}}$
- 21 <u>commissioner of the commission</u> [board] or the commission [Texas
- 22 Department of Health] shall have no authority or responsibility
- 23 with respect to same.
- (c) The disclosure panel is composed of 11 [nine] members,

- 1 with two members representing the public, at least one of whom has a
- 2 <u>background in health literacy</u>, three members licensed to practice
- 3 law in this state, at least one of whom is board certified in
- 4 personal injury trial law by the Texas Board of Legal
- 5 Specialization and at least one of whom is board certified in health
- 6 law by the Texas Board of Legal Specialization, and six members
- 7 licensed to practice medicine in this state. Members of the
- 8 disclosure panel shall be selected by the executive commissioner of
- 9 the Health and Human Services Commission [health].
- 10 (d) At the expiration of the term of each member of the
- 11 disclosure panel so appointed, the <u>executive</u> commissioner <u>of the</u>
- 12 Health and Human Services Commission shall select a successor, and
- 13 such successor shall serve for a term of six years, or until that
- 14 <u>member's</u> [his] successor is selected. Any member who is absent for
- 15 three consecutive meetings without the consent of a majority of the
- 16 disclosure panel present at each such meeting may be removed by the
- 17 executive commissioner at the request of the disclosure panel
- 18 submitted in writing and signed by the chairman. Upon the death,
- 19 resignation, or removal of any member, the <u>executive</u> commissioner
- 20 shall fill the vacancy by selection for the unexpired portion of the
- 21 term.
- (h) Employees of the [<del>Texas Department of</del>] Health <u>and Human</u>
- 23 <u>Services Commission</u> shall serve as the staff for the panel.
- (i) When appointing panel members representing the public,
- 25 the executive commissioner of the Health and Human Services
- 26 Commission may not appoint a registered lobbyist, a health care
- 27 provider or the spouse of a health care provider, or a person who

- 1 works in any health care-related field, including health insurance.
- 2 The executive commissioner shall give preference to persons with
- 3 experience in advocating for the public interest.
- 4 SECTION 2. Not later than January 1, 2024, the executive
- 5 commissioner of the Health and Human Services Commission shall
- 6 appoint new members to the Texas Medical Disclosure Panel in
- 7 accordance with Section 74.102, Civil Practice and Remedies Code,
- 8 as amended by this Act.
- 9 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
