## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

- 2 relating to the creation of a criminal offense for illegal entry
- 3 into Texas from Mexico by persons who are not citizens or legal
- permanent residents of the United States. 4
- BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 5
- 6 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that:
- Mexican drug cartels are designated as foreign 7 (1)
- terrorist organizations in Executive Order GA-42 because they have 8
- trafficked hundreds of millions of lethal doses of fentanyl into 9
- Texas since 2021; 10
- to fund this deadly violence, Mexican drug cartels 11
- smuggled aliens across the Texas-Mexico border 12
- record-setting pace under President Biden's open-border policies; 13
- 14 (3) this unprecedented surge of illegal immigration
- has been a declared disaster for Texans since May 31, 2021; 15
- although an alien commits a federal crime under 8 16
- U.S.C. 1325(a)(1) and its implementing regulations by entering the 17
- United States at any time or place other than a federally designated 18
- port of entry, President Biden has ignored repeated demands for 19
- 20 aggressive prosecution of these illegal-entry offenses by the U.S.
- 21 Department of Homeland Security and the U.S. Department of Justice;
- 22 (5) President Biden's refusal to faithfully execute 8
- 23 U.S.C. 1325(a)(1) and other immigration laws enacted by Congress
- has broken the federal government's promise to "protect each 24

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- 1 [State] against Invasion" under Section 4, Article IV, United
- 2 States Constitution;
- 3 (6) this federal dereliction of duty has compelled
- 4 Texas to protect its own border against invasion by Mexican drug
- 5 cartels, using the sovereign powers reserved to the States;
- 6 (7) as "Commander-in-Chief of the military forces of
- 7 the State," the Governor has the power to "call forth the militia to
- 8 execute the laws of the State" and "repel invasions" under Section
- 9 7, Article IV, Texas Constitution; and
- 10 (8) the Governor can protect Texans from cartel
- 11 violence and defend the State's territorial integrity by enforcing
- 12 a state-law version of the illegal-entry offense that President
- 13 Biden has refused to use under 8 U.S.C. 1325(a)(1).
- 14 SECTION 2. Title 10, Penal Code, is amended by adding
- 15 Chapter 51 to read as follows:
- 16 <u>Chapter 51. ILLEGAL ENTRY</u>
- Sec. 51.01. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
- 18 (1) "Person" means any individual other than a citizen
- 19 or legal permanent resident of the United States.
- 20 (2) "Port of entry" has the same meaning assigned to
- 21 that term by Section 101.1, Title 19, Federal Code of Regulations.
- Sec. 51.02. ILLEGAL ENTRY. (a) A person commits an offense
- 23 if the person enters or attempts to enter the State of Texas by
- 24 crossing its border with Mexico at any time or place other than at a
- 25 port of entry.
- 26 (b) An offense under this section is a felony of the third
- 27 degree, except that the offense is a felony of the second degree if

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- 1 <u>it is shown at the trial of the offense that the defendant has been</u>
- 2 previously convicted of an offense under this section.
- 3 SECTION 3. The change in law made by this Act applies only
- 4 to an offense committed on or after the effective date of this Act.
- 5 An offense committed before the effective date of this Act is
- 6 governed by the law in effect when the offense was committed, and
- 7 the former law is continued in effect for that purpose. For
- 8 purposes of this section, an offense was committed before the
- 9 effective date of this Act if any element of the offense occurred
- 10 before that date.
- 11 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
