26 SECTION 2. Section 25.001, Education Code, is amended by 27 adding Subsections (b-3) and (b-4) to read as follows:

1	(b-3) Except as provided by Subsection (b-4) and
2	notwithstanding any provision of Chapter 37, the board of trustees
3	of a school district or the board's designee may not refuse to
4	enroll a student based on the student's criminal, juvenile, or
5	disciplinary history or standing. A district shall promptly enroll
6	a student released from an alternative education program, as
7	defined by Section 37.023, who is otherwise eligible for enrollment
8	under Subsection (b). This subsection may not be construed to
9	prohibit the board or the board's designee from:
10	(1) revoking admission of a student under Subsection
11	<u>(b-1);</u>
12	(2) refusing to admit a person under 18 years of age
13	whom the board is not required to admit under Subsection (d);
14	(3) transferring a student in accordance with Section

27	SECTION 4. Section 37.023, Education Code, is amended by

No. 1626 amending Subsections (c), (d), and (e) and adding Subsections 1 2 (c-1), (d-1), (g), and (h) to read as follows: 3 (c) Not later than five instructional days after the date of a student's release from an alternative education program, the 4 5 campus administrator shall hold a meeting to coordinate the student's enrollment and transition to a regular educational 6 environment [classroom]. The coordination must include assistance 7 8 and recommendations from the student's parent or a person standing in parental relation to the student and, as applicable: 9 (1) school counselors; 10 school district peace officers; 11 (2) school resource officers; 12 (3) licensed clinical social workers; 13 (4) 14 (5) campus behavior coordinators; 15 (6) classroom teachers who are or may be responsible for implementing the student's personalized transition plan 16 17 developed under Subsection (d); (7) for a student who is a student with a disability as 18 defined by Section 21.001, the campus special education 19 administrator or other campus administrator responsible for 20 overseeing the student's educational program, as applicable; 21 (8) for a student who is a court-related child, the 22 liaison officer appointed under Section 37.014; and 23 24 (9) [(7)] any other appropriate school district personnel. 25 26 (c-1) The campus administrator shall, before finalizing a personalized transition plan for a student under Subsection (d), 27

No. 1626 recommendations for counseling, behavioral 1 (A) academic assistance for the student management, or 2 with a concentration on the student's academic or career goals; 3 4 (B) recommendations for assistance for obtaining 5 access to mental health services provided by the district or school, a local mental health authority, or another private or 6 public entity; and 7 8 (C) the provision of information to the student's parent or a person standing in parental relation to the student 9 about the process to request a full individual and initial 10 evaluation of the student for purposes of special education 11 services under Section 29.004[; and 12 [(D) a regular review of the student's progress 13 14 toward the student's academic or career goals]. 15 (d-1) After a student has transitioned to a regular educational environment under this section, the campus 16 17 administrator or the administrator's designee shall conduct reviews at the beginning of each semester and the end of each school 18 19 year of the student's progress toward the student's academic or career goals. 20 21 As soon as practicable after completing a student's (e) personalized transition plan under Subsection (d) [If 22 23 practicable], the campus administrator shall provide an electronic 24 or written copy of the personalized transition plan to [, or the administrator's designee, shall meet with] the student's parent or 25 26 a person standing in parental relation to the student [to coordinate plans for the student's transition]. 27

(g) A school district shall adopt a policy that, to the 1 greatest extent possible, allows for credits that were successfully 2 completed while the student was enrolled in an alternative 3 education program or at a previous school, including a school 4 5 within the Windham School District, to fulfill credits required for high school graduation, provided that the completed courses meet 6 7 the standards adopted under Section 28.002(c). The policy adopted 8 under this subsection may provide for partial credit, if determined appropriate by the district. 9

10 (h) The commissioner may adopt rules as necessary to 11 implement this section.

12 SECTION 5. To the extent of any conflict, this Act prevails 13 over another Act of the 88th Legislature, Regular Session, 2023, 14 relating to nonsubstantive additions to and corrections in enacted 15 codes.

SECTION 6. This Act applies beginning with the 2023-2024 school year.

SECTION 7. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
