A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2	relating to human sexuality education in public schools.
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 28, Education Code, is
5	amended by adding Section 28.0042 to read as follows:
6	Sec. 28.0042. HUMAN SEXUALITY EDUCATION. (a) In this
7	section:
8	(1) "Age-appropriate" means suitable to particular
9	ages or age groups of children or adolescents, based on developing
10	cognitive, emotional, and behavioral capacity typical for the age
11	or age group.
12	(2) "Medically accurate" means supported by
13	peer-reviewed research conducted in compliance with accepted
14	scientific methods and recognized as accurate by leading
15	professional organizations and agencies with relevant experience,
16	such as the American Medical Association.
17	(b) A school district shall provide human sexuality
18	education in accordance with this section at grade levels specified
19	by the State Board of Education.
20	(c) The State Board of Education by rule shall adopt the
21	essential knowledge and skills for medically accurate,
22	age-appropriate curricula to be used by a school district in

2	identity, gender expression, and sexual orientation;
3	(2) cover human sexuality, pregnancy, and sexually
4	transmitted infections;
5	(3) discuss human sexuality as a normal and healthy

8	(A) consent as an unambiguous and voluntary
9	agreement from each participant to engage in each physical act; and
10	(B) the importance of respecting personal
11	boundaries;
12	(5) present abstinence from sexual activity as the
13	preferred choice of behavior in relationship to all sexual activity
14	for unmarried persons of school age;
15	(6) devote sufficient attention to abstinence from
16	sexual activity to emphasize the importance of abstinence;
17	(7) emphasize that abstinence from sexual activity, if
18	used consistently and correctly, is the only method that is 100
19	percent effective in preventing pregnancy and sexually transmitted
20	<pre>infections;</pre>
21	(8) provide information about the health benefits,
22	side effects, and proper use of the methods approved by the United
23	States Food and Drug Administration for preventing unintended
24	pregnancy and reducing the risk of contracting sexually transmitted
25	infections;
26	(9) cover women's health, including the importance and
27	nurnose of regular gynecological evams. Dan smear screenings, and

1 testing for sexually transmitted infections; 2 (10) promote relationship, communication, decision-making skills, including strategies to: 3 4 (A) develop healthy, age-appropriate 5 relationships; 6 (B) develop healthy life skills, including 7 critical thinking, problem solving, effective communication, and 8 responsible decision making about sexuality and relationships; and (C) promote effective communication between 9 adolescents and their parents, legal guardians, or other family 10 members about sexuality and relationships; and 11 12 (11) discuss the basic protections provided by Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (20 U.S.C. Section 1681 et 13 seq.) regarding sexual harassment and sexual assault or abuse, 14 15 including: 16 (A) a student's rights under that provision; 17 (B) how to identify and report incidents of sexual harassment or sexual assault or abuse; and 18 19 (C) the availability of relevant services for victims of sexual harassment or sexual assault or abuse, such as 20 21 mental health or trauma counseling, academic accommodations, or 22 health service referrals. 23 (d) A school district may separate students according to sex 24 when providing instruction under this section. (e) A school district shall make all curriculum materials 25

used in the district's human sexuality education available for

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reasonable public inspection.

- 1 (f) A school district shall adopt a policy regarding whether
- 2 male or female condoms may be distributed in connection with human
- 3 sexuality education.
- 4 (g) A school district shall adopt a best practice-based
- 5 policy regarding the provision of menstrual products to students
- 6 enrolled in the district.
- 7 (h) A student shall be excused from human sexuality
- 8 <u>education on the written request of a parent or legal guardian</u>
- 9 without being subjected to any disciplinary action, academic
- 10 penalty, or other sanction imposed by the school district or the
- 11 student's school.
- 12 (i) Before each school year, a school district shall provide
- 13 written notice to a parent or legal guardian of each student
- 14 enrolled in the district of the intent to provide human sexuality
- 15 <u>education under this section. The notice must include:</u>
- 16 (1) a summary of the basic content of the human
- 17 sexuality education to be provided to the student;
- 18 (2) the district's policy on the distribution of
- 19 condoms in connection with human sexuality education; and
- 20 (3) a statement of the parent's or legal guardian's
- 21 right to:
- 22 <u>(A) review curriculum materials as provided by</u>
- 23 <u>Subsection (e); and</u>
- 24 (B) remove the student from any part of the
- 25 district's human sexuality education as provided by Subsection (h).

- 17 (7) appropriate grade levels and curriculum for
- 18 instruction regarding opioid addiction and abuse and methods of
- 19 administering an opioid antagonist, as defined by Section 483.101,
- 20 Health and Safety Code; and
- 21 (8) appropriate grade levels and curriculum for
- 22 instruction regarding child abuse, family violence, dating
- 23 violence, and sex trafficking, including likely warning signs that
- 24 a child may be at risk for sex trafficking, provided that the local
- 25 school health advisory council's recommendations under this
- 26 subdivision do not conflict with the essential knowledge and skills
- 27 developed by the State Board of Education under this subchapter.

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- 1 (j) A school district shall make all curriculum materials
- 2 used in the district's [human sexuality instruction or] instruction
- 3 relating to the prevention of child abuse, family violence, dating
- 4 violence, and sex trafficking[τ] available by:
- 5 (1) for curriculum materials in the public domain:
- 6 (A) providing a copy of the curriculum materials
- 7 by mail or e-mail to a parent of a student enrolled in the district
- 8 on the parent's request; and
- 9 (B) posting the curriculum materials on the
- 10 district's Internet website, if the district has an Internet
- 11 website; and
- 12 (2) for copyrighted curriculum materials, allowing a
- 13 parent of a student enrolled in the district to:
- 14 (A) review the curriculum materials at the
- 15 student's campus at any time during regular business hours;
- 16 (B) purchase a copy of the curriculum materials
- 17 from the publisher as provided by the district's purchase agreement
- 18 for the curriculum materials under Subsection $[\frac{(j-1) \text{ or}}{(j-2)}]$; or
- 19 (C) review the curriculum materials online
- 20 through a secure electronic account in a manner that prevents the
- 21 curriculum materials from being copied and that otherwise complies
- 22 with copyright law.
- SECTION 4. Sections 28.004(e), (e-1), (e-2), (e-3), (f),
- 24 (g), (h), (i), (j-1), and (p)(2), Education Code, are repealed.
- 25 SECTION 5. This Act applies beginning with the 2024-2025
- 26 school year.
- 27 SECTION 6. To the extent of any conflict, this Act prevails

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- 1 over another Act of the 88th Legislature, Regular Session, 2023,
- 2 relating to nonsubstantive additions to and corrections in enacted
- 3 codes.
- 4 SECTION 7. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 5 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 6 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 7 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 8 Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
