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## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to the apprenticeship system of adult career and 3 technology education. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 5 SECTION 1. Section 61.8235(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 6 7 (a) The board, with the assistance of institutions of higher education, career and technical education experts, and college and 8 9 career readiness experts, shall establish alignment between the college and career readiness standards and the knowledge, skills, 10 11 and abilities students are expected to demonstrate in career and 12 technical education by establishing programs of study that: 13 incorporate rigorous college and career readiness (1)14 standards, including career and technical education standards that address both academic and technical content; 15 support attainment of employability and career 16 (2) readiness skills; 17 18 (3) progress in content specificity by beginning with all aspects of an industry or career cluster and leading to more 19 20 occupationally specific instruction or by preparing students for 21 ongoing postsecondary career preparation; 22 incorporate multiple entry and exit points with (4)23 portable demonstrations of technical or career competency, which may include credit transfer agreements or industry-recognized 24

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1 standards of apprenticeship for the particular trade which have
2 been adopted by the Office of Apprenticeship <u>or by the commission by</u>
3 rule.

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(h) A program must be<u>:</u>

5 <u>(1)</u> registered with the Office of Apprenticeship and 6 approved by the commission; or

7 <u>(2) certified by the commission as an</u> 8 <u>industry-recognized apprenticeship program as provided by</u> 9 <u>commission rule</u>.

10 SECTION 4. Chapter 133, Education Code, is amended by 11 adding Sections 133.0025 and 133.0065 to read as follows:

12 Sec. 133.0025. PAID PRE-APPRENTICESHIPS FOR CERTAIN HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS. The commission by rule shall establish procedures 13 14 and standards by which the commission may allocate funds available 15 for the support of apprenticeship training programs under this chapter to support paid pre-apprenticeships designed for high 16 17 school students enrolled in career and technical education programs of study leading to employment in high-wage, high-demand 18 19 occupations. The standards must:

20 <u>(1) be developed in coordination with the Texas</u> 21 <u>Education Agency and Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board;</u>

22 (2) align with the strategic framework described by 23 Section 318.001, Labor Code; and

24 (3) ensure that any committee overseeing a paid
25 pre-apprenticeship:

26 (A) excludes from its membership any bargaining
 27 agent representing apprenticeable occupations certified by the

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1 Office of Apprenticeship or recognized by the commission by rule; 2 (B) includes at least one member who is a 3 representative of a community-based organization that demonstrates evidence of success in coordinating and managing job placement 4 services for at least one industry served by the committee; and 5 6 (C) maintains, as a majority of the committee's membership, members who represent employers. 7 Sec. 133.0065. PUBLICATION OF WAGE OUTCOMES. 8 The commission shall publish on the commission's Internet website and 9 10 include in the unified repository for education and workforce data developed under Section 2308A.005, Government Code, wage outcome 11 12 data for apprentices who complete an apprenticeship training 13 program. 14 SECTION 5. Section 133.007, Education Code, is amended to 15 read as follows: Sec. 133.007. RULES. The commission 16 shall adopt 17 [promulgate] rules necessary to implement the provisions of this chapter, including rules establishing: 18 19 (1) which occupations are recognized by the commission as an apprenticeable occupation, based on criteria which must 20 include that the occupation: 21 22 (A) be a high-wage, high-demand occupation; (B) be customarily learned in a practical way 23 through a structured, systematic program of on-the-job supervised 24 25 training; 26 (C) be clearly identified and commonly 27 recognized throughout an industry;

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1	(D) involve manual, mechanical, or technical
2	skills or knowledge which requires significant on-the-job work
3	experience; and
4	(E) require related instruction to supplement
5	the on-the-job training;
6	(2) standards of apprenticeship for particular
7	trades; and
8	(3) a process for and the criteria by which the
9	commission may certify a training or apprenticeship program as an
10	industry-recognized apprenticeship program, which must include:
11	(A) a requirement that the training or program
12	lead to employment in a high-wage, high-demand occupation; and
13	(B) criteria generally consistent with the
14	standards of apprenticeship prescribed by 29 C.F.R. Section 29.
15	SECTION 6. As soon as practicable after the effective date
16	of this Act, the Texas Workforce Commission shall adopt the rules
17	required by Chapter 133, Education Code, as amended by this Act.
18	SECTION 7. This Act takes effect September 1, 2023.

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
