H.B. No. 4799

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to the provision of opioid antagonists to clients on discharge from a chemical dependency treatment facility. 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 464, Health and Safety 5 Code, is amended by adding Sections 464.021 and 464.0211 to read as 6 follows: 7 Sec. 464.021. PROVISION OF OPIOID ANTAGONISTS. (a) In this 8 section, "opioid antagonist" and "opioid-related drug overdose" 9 have the meanings assigned by Section 483.101, Health and Safety 10 Code. 11 12 (b) In a state fiscal year during which a treatment facility licensed under this chapter receives state money by legislative 13 14 appropriation made for chemical dependency treatment or a similar public purpose, or in which state money is otherwise made available 15 16 for the facility's use in providing chemical dependency treatment, the facility must provide opioid antagonists to a client the 17 facility reasonably believes to be at risk for an opioid-related 18 drug overdose before discharging the client from the facility. 19 Sec. 464.0211. PRESCRIPTION OF OPIOID ANTAGONISTS. (a) A 20 physician or person who has been delegated prescriptive authority 21 under Chapter 157, Occupations Code, may prescribe opioid 22 23 antagonists in the name of a treatment facility licensed under this 24 chapter.

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H.B. No. 4799 (b) A physician or other person who prescribes opioid 1 antagonists under Subsection (a) shall provide the treatment 2 facility with a standing order for the administration of an opioid 3 antagonist to a person reasonably believed to be experiencing an 4 5 opioid-related drug overdose. 6 (c) The standing order under Subsection (b) is not required to be patient-specific, and the opioid antagonist may be 7 administered to a person without a previously established 8 physician-patient relationship. 9 (d) Notwithstanding any other provisions of 10 law, supervision or delegation by a physician is considered adequate if 11 12 the physician: (1) periodically reviews the order; and 13 14 (2) is available through direct telecommunication as 15 needed for consultation, assistance, and direction. 16 (e) An order issued under this section must contain: (1) the name and signature of the prescribing 17 physician or other person; 18 19 (2) the name of the treatment facility to which the order is issued; 20 21 (3) the quantity of opioid antagonists to be obtained and maintained under the order; and 22 (4) the <u>date of issue</u>. 23 24 (f) A pharmacist may dispense an opioid antagonist to a treatment facility without requiring the name or any other 25 26 identifying information relating to the user. SECTION 2. Section 464.021, Health and Safety Code, 27 as

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added by this Act, applies only to a client who is discharged from a chemical dependency treatment facility on or after the effective date of this Act. A client who is discharged from a facility before that date is governed by the law in effect immediately before the effective date of this Act, and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose.

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SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
