Sec. 81B.002. PROHIBITED FACE-COVERING MANDATE. 16 17 Except as provided by Subsection (b), a governmental entity may not implement, order, or otherwise impose a mandate requiring a person 18 to wear a face mask or other face covering to prevent the spread of 19 20 COVID-19. (b) The limitation prescribed by Subsection (a) does not 21 22 apply to an order or mandate that relates to: 23 (1) a state supported living center, as defined by

- 18 (b) The prohibition under Subsection (a) applies only to the
- 19 extent the prohibition does not conflict with the final rule
- 20 adopted by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services and

- Sec. 81B.004. PROHIBITED CLOSURE MANDATE FOR PRIVATE
- 23 BUSINESSES AND SCHOOLS. A governmental entity may not implement,
- 24 order, or otherwise impose a mandate requiring the closure of a
- 25 private business, public school, open-enrollment charter school,
- 26 or private school to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

- 4 Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
