## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the right of state hospital patients to designate an
3	essential caregiver for in-person visitation.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Chapter 552, Health and Safety Code, is amended

7 <u>SUBCHAPTER F. RIGHT TO ESSENTIAL CAREGI</u>VER VISITS

by adding Subchapter F to read as follows:

- 8 Sec. 552.201. DEFINITION. In this chapter, "essential
- 9 caregiver" means a family member, friend, guardian, or other
- 10 individual a patient, patient's guardian, or patient's legally
- 11 authorized representative selects for in-person visits.
- 12 Sec. 552.202. PATIENT'S RIGHT TO ESSENTIAL CAREGIVER
- 13 VISITS. (a) A patient, the patient's guardian, or the patient's
- 14 legally authorized representative has the right to designate an
- 15 essential caregiver with whom a state hospital may not prohibit
- 16 in-person visitation.

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- 17 (b) If a patient is a minor, the patient's parent, guardian,
- 18 or managing conservator may designate both of the minor patient's
- 19 parents as essential caregivers under Subsection (a).
- Sec. 552.203. ESSENTIAL CAREGIVER POLICIES, PROCEDURES,
- 21 AND SAFETY PROTOCOLS. (a) Notwithstanding Section 552.202, the
- 22 executive commissioner by rule shall develop guidelines to assist
- 23 state hospitals in establishing essential caregiver visitation
- 24 policies and procedures. The guidelines must require the hospitals

- 1 to:
- 2 (1) allow a patient, patient's guardian, or patient's
- 3 legally authorized representative or, for a minor patient, the
- 4 patient's parent, guardian, or managing conservator, to designate
- 5 for in-person visitation an essential caregiver;
- 6 (2) establish a visitation schedule allowing the
- 7 <u>essential caregiver to visit the patient for at least two hours each</u>
- 8 <u>day</u>;
- 9 (3) establish procedures to enable physical contact
- 10 between the patient and essential caregiver; and
- 11 (4) obtain the signature of the essential caregiver
- 12 certifying the caregiver will follow the hospital's safety
- 13 protocols and any other policies, procedures, or rules established
- 14 under this section.
- 15 (b) A state hospital may not establish safety protocols
- 16 under this section that are more stringent than the safety
- 17 protocols the hospital establishes for hospital staff.
- 18 Sec. 552.204. REVOCATION OF ESSENTIAL CAREGIVER
- 19 DESIGNATION. (a) A state hospital may revoke an individual's
- 20 designation as an essential caregiver if the individual violates
- 21 the hospital's policies, procedures, or safety protocols
- 22 established under Section 552.203.
- 23 (b) If a state hospital revokes an individual's designation
- 24 as an essential caregiver under this section, the patient,
- 25 patient's guardian, or patient's legally authorized representative
- 26 or, for a minor patient, the patient's parent, guardian, or
- 27 managing conservator, has the right to immediately designate

- 1 another individual as the patient's essential caregiver.
- 2 (c) The commission by rule shall establish an appeals
- 3 process to evaluate the revocation of an individual's designation
- 4 as an essential caregiver under this section.
- 5 Sec. 552.205. TEMPORARY SUSPENSION OF ESSENTIAL CAREGIVER
- 6 <u>VISITS</u>. (a) A state hospital may petition the commission to
- 7 suspend in-person essential caregiver visits for not more than
- 8 seven days if in-person visitation poses a serious community health
- 9 risk. The commission may deny the hospital's request to suspend
- 10 in-person essential caregiver visitation if the commission
- 11 determines that in-person visitation does not pose a serious
- 12 community health risk.
- 13 (b) A state hospital may request an extension from the
- 14 commission to suspend in-person essential caregiver visitation for
- 15 more than seven days. The commission may not approve an extension
- 16 for a period that exceeds seven days, and the hospital must
- 17 <u>separately request each extension.</u>
- 18 (c) A state hospital may not suspend in-person essential
- 19 caregiver visitation in any year for more than 14 consecutive days
- 20 or 45 days total.
- Sec. 552.206. PROVISION OF NECESSARY PATIENT CARE BY
- 22 ESSENTIAL CAREGIVER. This subchapter may not be construed as
- 23 requiring an essential caregiver to provide necessary care to a
- 24 patient, and a state hospital may not require an essential
- 25 <u>caregiver to provide the necessary care.</u>
- 26 SECTION 2. As soon as practicable after the effective date
- 27 of this Act, the executive commissioner of the Health and Human

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- 1 Services Commission shall prescribe the guidelines and adopt the
- 2 rules required by Subchapter F, Chapter 552, Health and Safety
- 3 Code, as added by this Act.
- 4 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
