## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

## AN ACT

2 relating to prohibiting the use of certain restraints, chemical 3 irritants, or a Taser or similar device on certain public school 4 students.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
6 SECTION 1. Section 37.0021(b), Education Code, is amended
7 by adding Subdivision (5) to read as follows:

(5) "Taser" means a device manufactured, sold, or 8 9 distributed by Taser International, Incorporated, that is intended, designed, made, or adapted to incapacitate a person by 10 inflicting an electrical charge through the emission of a 11 projectile or conductive stream. The term, for purposes of this 12 section, includes a similar device manufactured, sold, 13 or distributed by another person. 14

15 SECTION 2. Section 37.0021, Education Code, is amended by 16 amending Subsection (d) and adding Subsection (j) to read as 17 follows:

(d) <u>Subject to Subsection (j), the</u> [The] commissioner by rule shall adopt procedures for the use of restraint and time-out by a school district employee or volunteer or an independent contractor of a district in the case of a student with a disability receiving special education services under Subchapter A, Chapter 29. A procedure adopted under this subsection must:

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(1) be consistent with:

C.S.S.B. No. 133 1 (A) professionally accepted practices and standards of student discipline and techniques for behavior 2 3 management; and 4 relevant health and safety standards; (B) 5 (2) identify any discipline management practice or behavior management technique that requires a district employee or 6 volunteer or an independent contractor of a district to be trained 7 8 before using that practice or technique; [and] (3) require a school district to: 9 10 (A) provide written notification to the student's parent or person standing in parental relation to the 11 student for each use of restraint that includes: 12 (i) the name of the student; 13 14 (ii) the name of the district employee or 15 volunteer or independent contractor of the district who administered the restraint; 16 17 (iii) the date of the restraint; (iv) the time that the restraint started 18 and ended; 19 20 (v) the location of the restraint; (vi) the nature of the restraint; 21 (vii) a description of the activity in 2.2 23 which the student was engaged immediately preceding the use of the 24 restraint; 25 (viii) the behavior of the student that 26 prompted the restraint; 27 (ix) any efforts made to de-escalate the

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1 situation and any alternatives to restraint that were attempted; ( x ) 2 if the student has а behavior 3 improvement plan or a behavioral intervention plan, whether the plan may need to be revised as a result of the behavior that led to 4 5 the restraint; and (xi) if the student does not have a behavior 6 7 improvement plan or a behavioral intervention plan, information on 8 the procedure for the student's parent or person standing in parental relation to the student to request an admission, review, 9 10 and dismissal committee meeting to discuss the possibility of conducting a functional behavioral assessment of the student and 11 12 developing a plan for the student; (B) 13 include in a student's special education 14 eligibility school records: 15 (i) a copy of the written notification provided to the student's parent or person standing in parental 16 relation to the student under Paragraph (A); 17 information on the method by which the 18 (ii) 19 written notification was sent to the parent or person; and 20 (iii) the contact information for the parent or person to whom the district sent the notification; and 21 22 (C) if the student has a behavior improvement plan or behavioral intervention plan, document each use of time-out 23 24 prompted by a behavior of the student specified in the student's plan, including a description of the behavior that prompted the 25 26 time-out; and 27 (4) prohibit a district employee or volunteer or an

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1 independent contractor of a district from using any variation of a 2 restraint or other technique that results in full body 3 immobilization of the student in a prone or supine position on the 4 floor or ground. 5 (j) A peace officer performing law enforcement duties or school security personnel performing security-related duties on 6 7 school property or at a school-sponsored or school-related activity 8 may not restrain or use a chemical irritant spray or Taser on a student enrolled in fifth grade or below unless the student poses a 9 serious risk of harm to the student or another person. 10

11 SECTION 3. As soon as practicable after the effective date 12 of this Act, the commissioner of education in consultation with the 13 continuing advisory committee established under Section 29.006, 14 Education Code, shall adopt rules as necessary to implement Section 15 37.0021, Education Code, as amended by this Act, including rules to 16 provide any required definitions of terms.

SECTION 4. This Act applies beginning with the 2023-2024school year.

19 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 20 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 21 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 22 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 23 Act takes effect September 1, 2023.

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
