S.B. No. 629

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to the use of opioid antagonists on public and private school campuses and at or in transit to or from off-campus school 3 4 events. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 5 6 SECTION 1. The heading to Subchapter E, Chapter 38, 7 Education Code, is amended to read as follows: SUBCHAPTER E. MAINTENANCE, [AND] ADMINISTRATION, AND DISPOSAL OF 8 EPINEPHRINE AUTO-INJECTORS, OPIOID ANTAGONISTS, AND ASTHMA 9 MEDICINE 10 SECTION 2. Section 38.201, Education Code, is amended by 11 12 adding Subdivision (3-a) to read as follows: 13 (3-a) "Opioid antagonist" and "opioid-related drug 14 overdose" have the meanings assigned by Section 483.101, Health and Safety Code. 15 SECTION 3. Sections 38.202(a) and (b), Education Code, are 16 amended to read as follows: 17 18 (a) The commissioner of state health services shall establish an advisory committee to examine and review the 19 20 administration of epinephrine auto-injectors to a person experiencing an anaphylactic reaction, and opioid antagonists to a 21 person experiencing an apparent opioid-related drug overdose, on a 22 23 campus of a school district, an open-enrollment charter school, a private school, or an institution of higher education. 24

1 (b) The advisory committee shall be composed of members 2 appointed by the commissioner of state health services. In making 3 appointments, the commissioner shall ensure that:

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4 (1) a majority of the members are physicians with
5 expertise in treating anaphylaxis or opioid-related drug
6 overdoses, including physicians who specialize in the fields of
7 pediatrics, allergies, asthma, <u>drug use disorders,</u> and immunology;

8 (2) at least one member is a registered nurse employed 9 by a school district, open-enrollment charter school, or private 10 school as a school nurse;

11 (3) at least one member is an employee of a general 12 academic teaching institution; and

13 (4) at least one member is an employee of a public14 junior college or a public technical institute.

15 SECTION 4. Section 38.207, Education Code, is amended to 16 read as follows:

17 Sec. 38.207. ADVISORY COMMITTEE: DUTIES. The advisory 18 committee shall advise the commissioner of state health services 19 on:

(1) the storage and maintenance of epinephrine
auto-injectors <u>and opioid antagonists</u> on school campuses and
campuses of institutions of higher education;

(2) the training of school personnel and school
volunteers, and of personnel and volunteers at institutions of
higher education, in the administration of an epinephrine
auto-injector <u>and opioid antagonist</u>; and

27 (3) a plan for:

No. 629 one or more school personnel members or 1 (A) school volunteers trained in the administration of an epinephrine 2 3 auto-injector to be on each school campus; [and] 4 (B) one or more school personnel members or school volunteers trained in the administration of an opioid 5 antagonist to be on each school campus; 6 7 (C) one or more personnel members or volunteers 8 of an institution of higher education trained in the administration of an epinephrine auto-injector to be on each campus of an 9 10 institution of higher education; and (D) one or more personnel members or volunteers 11 12 of an institution of higher education trained in the administration of an opioid antagonist to be on each campus of an institution of 13 14 higher education. 15 SECTION 5. The heading to Section 38.208, Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 16 Sec. 38.208. MAINTENANCE AND ADMINISTRATION OF EPINEPHRINE 17 AUTO-INJECTORS, OPIOID ANTAGONISTS, AND ASTHMA MEDICINE. 18 SECTION 6. Sections 38.208(a), (b), (c), (d), and 19 (e), Education Code, are amended to read as follows: 20 21 (a) Each school district, open-enrollment charter school, and private school may adopt and implement a policy regarding the 22 23 maintenance, administration, and disposal of epinephrine 24 auto-injectors or opioid antagonists at each campus in the district or school. 25 26 (b) If a policy is adopted under Subsection (a), the policy,

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as applicable:

1 (1) must provide that school personnel and school 2 volunteers who are authorized and trained may administer an 3 epinephrine auto-injector to a person who is reasonably believed to 4 be experiencing anaphylaxis, or an opioid antagonist to a person 5 who is reasonably believed to be experiencing an opioid-related 6 drug overdose, on a school campus; and

7 may provide that school personnel and school (2) 8 volunteers who are authorized and trained may administer an epinephrine auto-injector to a person who is reasonably believed to 9 be experiencing anaphylaxis, or an opioid antagonist to a person 10 who is reasonably believed to be experiencing an opioid-related 11 12 drug overdose, at an off-campus school event or while in transit to or from a school event. 13

The executive commissioner of the Health and Human 14 (C) 15 Services Commission, in consultation with the commissioner of education, and with advice from the advisory committee 16 as 17 appropriate, shall adopt rules regarding the maintenance, administration, and disposal of an epinephrine auto-injector and 18 19 opioid antagonist at a school campus subject to a policy adopted under Subsection (a) and the maintenance and administration of 20 asthma medicine at a school campus subject to a policy adopted under 21 Subsection (a-1). The rules must establish: 22

(1) the number of epinephrine auto-injectors <u>and</u>
<u>opioid antagonists</u> available at each campus;

(2) the amount of prescription asthma medicine26 available at each campus;

27 (3) the process for each school district,

1 open-enrollment charter school, and private school to check the 2 inventory of epinephrine auto-injectors, opioid antagonists, and 3 asthma medicine at regular intervals for expiration and 4 replacement; and

5 (4) the amount of training required for school 6 personnel and school volunteers to administer an epinephrine 7 auto-injector <u>or opioid antagonist</u>.

8 (d) Each school district, open-enrollment charter school, 9 and private school that adopts a policy under Subsection (a) must 10 require that each campus have one or more school personnel members 11 or school volunteers authorized and trained to administer an 12 epinephrine auto-injector <u>or an opioid antagonist, as applicable,</u> 13 present during all hours the campus is open.

(e) The supply of epinephrine auto-injectors <u>and opioid</u> <u>antagonists</u> at each campus must be stored in a secure location and be easily accessible to school personnel and school volunteers authorized and trained to administer an epinephrine auto-injector <u>or opioid antagonist</u>. The supply of asthma medicine at each campus must be stored in a secure location and be easily accessible to the school nurse.

21 SECTION 7. Section 38.209, Education Code, is amended to 22 read as follows:

23 Sec. 38.209. REPORT ON ADMINISTERING EPINEPHRINE 24 AUTO-INJECTOR <u>OR OPIOID ANTAGONIST</u>. (a) Not later than the 10th 25 business day after the date a school personnel member or school 26 volunteer administers an epinephrine auto-injector <u>or opioid</u> 27 <u>antagonist</u> in accordance with a policy adopted under Section

No. 629 1 38.208(a), the school shall report the information required under Subsection (b) to: 2 (1) the school district, the charter holder if the 3 school is an open-enrollment charter school, or the governing body 4 5 of the school if the school is a private school; 6 (2) the physician or other person who prescribed the 7 epinephrine auto-injector or opioid antagonist; and 8 (3) the commissioner of state health services. 9 (b) The report required under this section must include the 10 following information: 11 (1)the age of the person who received the administration 12 of the epinephrine auto-injector or opioid 13 antagonist; 14 (2) whether the person who received the administration 15 of the epinephrine auto-injector or opioid antagonist was a student, a school personnel member or school volunteer, or a 16 17 visitor; (3) the physical location where the 18 epinephrine 19 auto-injector or opioid antagonist was administered; 20 (4) the number of doses of epinephrine auto-injector or opioid antagonist administered; 21 (5) the title of the person who administered the 22 23 epinephrine auto-injector or opioid antagonist; and 24 (6) any other information required by the commissioner 25 of education. SECTION 8. Sections 38.210(a) and (b), Education Code, are 26 27 amended to read as follows:

No. 629 (a) Each school district, open-enrollment charter school, 1 and private school that adopts a policy under Section 38.208(a) is 2 3 responsible for training school personnel and school volunteers in the administration of an epinephrine auto-injector or opioid 4 5 antagonist. (b) Training required under this section must: 6 7 (1)include information on: 8 (A) recognizing the signs and symptoms of anaphylaxis or an opioid-related drug overdose; 9 10 (B) administering an epinephrine auto-injector or opioid antagonist; 11 12 (C) implementing emergency procedures, if necessary, after administering an epinephrine auto-injector 13 or 14 opioid antagonist; and 15 (D) properly disposing of used or expired epinephrine auto-injectors or opioid antagonists; 16 17 (2) be provided in a formal training session or through online education; and 18 (3) be provided in accordance with the policy adopted 19 under Section 21.4515. 20 SECTION 9. The heading to Section 38.211, Education Code, 21 is amended to read as follows: 2.2 Sec. 38.211. PRESCRIPTION OF EPINEPHRINE AUTO-INJECTORS, 23 24 OPIOID ANTAGONISTS, AND ASTHMA MEDICINE. 25 SECTION 10. Sections 38.211(a), (b), (c), (e), and (f), 26 Education Code, are amended to read as follows: 27 A physician or person who has been (a) delegated

1 prescriptive authority under Chapter 157, Occupations Code, may 2 prescribe epinephrine auto-injectors, opioid antagonists, or 3 asthma medicine in the name of a school district, open-enrollment 4 charter school, or private school.

5 (b) A physician or other person who prescribes epinephrine 6 auto-injectors, opioid antagonists, or asthma medicine under 7 Subsection (a) shall provide the school district, open-enrollment 8 charter school, or private school with a standing order for the 9 administration of, as applicable:

10 (1) an epinephrine auto-injector to a person 11 reasonably believed to be experiencing anaphylaxis; [or]

12 (2) <u>an opioid antagonist to a person reasonably</u>
 13 <u>believed to be experiencing an opioid-related drug overdose; or</u>

14 (3) asthma medicine to a person reasonably believed to
15 be experiencing a symptom of asthma and who has provided written
16 notification and permission as required by Section 38.208(b-1).

17 (c) The standing order under Subsection (b) is not required 18 to be patient-specific, and the epinephrine auto-injector, opioid 19 <u>antagonist</u>, or asthma medicine may be administered to a person 20 without a previously established physician-patient relationship.

(e) An order issued under this section must contain:

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(1) the name and signature of the prescribingphysician or other person;

(2) the name of the school district, open-enrollment
charter school, or private school to which the order is issued;
(3) the quantity of epinephrine auto-injectors,
opioid antagonists, or asthma medicine to be obtained and

1 maintained under the order; and

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(4) the date of issue.

3 (f) A pharmacist may dispense an epinephrine auto-injector, 4 <u>opioid antagonist</u>, or asthma medicine to a school district, 5 open-enrollment charter school, or private school without 6 requiring the name or any other identifying information relating to 7 the user.

8 SECTION 11. Section 38.215(a), Education Code, is amended 9 to read as follows:

10 (a) A person who in good faith takes, or fails to take, any 11 action under this subchapter is immune from civil or criminal 12 liability or disciplinary action resulting from that action or 13 failure to act, including:

14 (1) issuing an order for epinephrine auto-injectors,
15 <u>opioid antagonists</u>, or asthma medicine;

16 (2) supervising or delegating the administration of an 17 epinephrine auto-injector, an opioid antagonist, or asthma 18 medicine;

19 (3) possessing, maintaining, storing, or disposing of 20 an epinephrine auto-injector<u>, an opioid antagonist</u>, or asthma 21 medicine;

(4) prescribing an epinephrine auto-injector, an
 <u>opioid antagonist</u>, or asthma medicine;

24 (5) dispensing:

(A) an epinephrine auto-injector; [or]
(B) <u>an opioid antagonist; or</u>
(C) asthma medicine, provided that permission

1 has been granted as provided by Section 38.208(b-1);

2 (6) administering, or assisting in administering, an 3 epinephrine auto-injector, an opioid antagonist, or asthma 4 medicine, provided that permission has been granted as provided by 5 Section 38.208(b-1);

6 (7) providing, or assisting in providing, training, 7 consultation, or advice in the development, adoption, or 8 implementation of policies, guidelines, rules, or plans; or

9 (8) undertaking any other act permitted or required 10 under this subchapter.

SECTION 12. This Act applies beginning with the 2023-2024 school year.

13 SECTION 13. This Act takes effect immediately if it 14 receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each 15 house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. 16 If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate 17 effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
