A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

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- 2 relating to allowing public schools to employ or accept as
- 3 volunteers chaplains to provide support, services, and programs for
- 4 students.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. Subtitle D, Title 2, Education Code, is amended
- 7 by adding Chapter 23 to read as follows:

8 <u>CHAPTER 23. SCHOOL CHAPLAINS</u>

- 9 Sec. 23.001. SCHOOL CHAPLAINS. A school district or an
- 10 open-enrollment charter school may employ or accept as a volunteer
- 11 a chaplain to provide support, services, and programs for students
- 12 as assigned by the board of trustees of the district or the
- 13 governing body of the school. A chaplain employed or volunteering
- 14 under this chapter is not required to be certified by the State
- 15 Board for Educator Certification.
- SECTION 2. Section 48.115(b), Education Code, is amended to
- 17 read as follows:
- 18 (b) Funds allocated under this section must be used to
- 19 improve school safety and security, including costs associated
- 20 with:
- 21 (1) securing school facilities, including:
- 22 (A) improvements to school infrastructure;
- 23 (B) the use or installation of physical barriers;
- 24 and

the purchase and maintenance of: 1 (C) 2 (i) security cameras or other security equipment; and 3 4 (ii) technology, including communications systems or devices, that facilitates communication and information 5 sharing between students, school personnel, and first responders in 6 7 an emergency; (2) providing security for the district, including: 8 employing school district peace officers, 9 private security officers, and school marshals; and 10 collaborating with local law enforcement 11 (B) agencies, such as entering into a memorandum of understanding for 12 13 the assignment of school resource officers to schools in the district; 14 15 school safety and security training and planning, 16 including: 17 (A) active shooter and emergency response training; 18 (B) prevention and treatment programs relating 19 20 to addressing adverse childhood experiences; and identification, 21 (C) the prevention, and 22 management of emergencies and threats, using evidence-based, effective prevention practices and including: 23 24 (i) providing licensed counselors, social 25 workers, chaplains, and individuals trained in restorative

(ii) providing mental health personnel and

discipline and restorative justice practices;

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- 1 support, including chaplains;
- 2 (iii) providing behavioral health
- 3 services, including services provided by chaplains;
- 4 (iv) establishing threat reporting
- 5 systems; and
- 6 (v) developing and implementing programs
- 7 focused on restorative justice practices, culturally relevant
- 8 instruction, and providing mental health support, including
- 9 support provided by chaplains; and
- 10 (4) providing programs related to suicide prevention,
- 11 intervention, and postvention, including programs provided by
- 12 chaplains.
- 13 SECTION 3. Each board of trustees of a school district and
- 14 each governing body of an open-enrollment charter school shall take
- 15 a record vote not later than six months after the effective date of
- 16 this Act on whether to adopt a policy authorizing a campus of the
- 17 district or school to employ or accept as a volunteer a chaplain
- 18 under Chapter 23, Education Code, as added by this Act.
- 19 SECTION 4. This Act applies beginning with the 2023-2024
- 20 school year.
- 21 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 22 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 23 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 24 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 25 Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
