10	Sec. 128.101. DEFINITIONS. In this subchapter:
11	(1) "Federal firearms licensee" means any person
12	licensed under 18 U.S.C. Chapter 44.
13	(2) "Firearm" means any device designed, made, or
14	adapted to expel a projectile through a barrel by using the energy
15	generated by an explosion or burning substance or any device
16	readily convertible to that use.
17	(3) "Firearm hold agreement" means a private
18	transaction between a federal firearms licensee and an individual
19	firearm owner in which the licensee takes physical possession of
20	the owner's lawfully possessed firearm at the owner's request,
21	holds the firearm for an agreed period of time, and returns the
22	firearm to the owner according to the terms of the agreement.
23	Sec. 128.102. IMMUNITY FROM LIABILITY. (a) A person does
24	not have a cause of action against a federal firearms licensee

operating lawfully in this state for any act or omission arising 1 from a firearm hold agreement that results in personal injury or 2 death, including the return of a firearm to the owner by the 3 licensee at the termination of the agreement. 4 5 (b) The immunity from civil liability provided by 6 Subsection (a) does not apply to a cause of action arising from the 7 unlawful conduct or gross negligence of the licensee. SECTION 3. Subchapter C, Chapter 128, Civil Practice and 8 9

Remedies Code, as added by this Act, does not apply to a cause of action that accrued before the effective date of this Act. 10
