A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT 2 relating to local school health advisory councils and instruction 3 regarding human sexuality, sexual orientation, and gender identity 4 provided by public schools. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 5 6 SECTION 1. Section 12.104(b), Education Code, as amended by Chapters 542 (S.B. 168), 887 (S.B. 1697), 915 (H.B. 3607), 974 (S.B. 7 2081), and 1046 (S.B. 1365), Acts of the 87th Legislature, Regular 8 Session, 2021, is reenacted and amended to read as follows: 9 An open-enrollment charter school is subject to: 10 (b) a provision of this title establishing a criminal 11 (1) 12 offense; 13 (2) the provisions in Chapter 554, Government Code; 14 and 15 (3) a prohibition, restriction, or requirement, as applicable, imposed by this title or a rule adopted under this 16 title, relating to: 17 (A) the Public Education Information Management 18 System (PEIMS) to the extent necessary to monitor compliance with 19 this subchapter as determined by the commissioner; 20 21 (B) criminal history records under Subchapter C, 22 Chapter 22; 23 (C) reading instruments and accelerated reading 24 instruction programs under Section 28.006;

No. 1072 1 instruction (D) accelerated under Section 2 28.0211; high school graduation requirements under 3 (E) 4 Section 28.025; 5 special education programs under Subchapter (F) A, Chapter 29; 6 7 (G) bilingual education under Subchapter Β, Chapter 29; 8 9 (H) prekindergarten programs under Subchapter E or E-1, Chapter 29, except class size limits for prekindergarten 10 11 classes imposed under Section 25.112, which do not apply; extracurricular activities under 12 (I) Section 13 33.081; discipline management practices or behavior 14 (J) 15 management techniques under Section 37.0021; 16 (K) health and safety under Chapter 38; 17 the provisions of Subchapter A, Chapter 39; (L) 18 (M) public school accountability and special investigations under Subchapters A, B, C, D, F, G, and J, Chapter 19 20 39, and Chapter 39A; the requirement under Section 21.006 to 21 (N) report an educator's misconduct; 22 intensive programs 23 (O)of instruction under Section 28.0213; 24 25 (P) the right of a school employee to report a crime, as provided by Section 37.148; 26 27 (Q) bullying prevention policies and procedures

under Section 37.0832; 1 2 (R) the right of a school under Section 37.0052 to place a student who has engaged in certain bullying behavior in a 3 4 disciplinary alternative education program or to expel the student; 5 the right under Section 37.0151 to report to (S) local law enforcement certain conduct constituting assault or 6 7 harassment; a parent's right to information regarding the 8 (T) 9 provision of assistance for learning difficulties to the parent's child as provided by Sections 26.004(b)(11) and 26.0081(c) and (d); 10 11 (U) establishment of residency under Section 12 25.001; 13 (V) school safety requirements under Sections 37.108, 37.1081, 37.1082, 37.109, 37.113, 37.114, 37.1141, 37.115, 14 15 37.207, and 37.2071; 16 (W) the early childhood literacy and mathematics 17 proficiency plans under Section 11.185; 18 (X) the college, career, and military readiness plans under Section 11.186; [and] 19 20 (Y) [(X)] parental options to retain a student under Section 28.02124; and 21 22 (Z) establishing a local school health advisory 23 council in which members are appointed by the governing body of the school and health education instruction complies with Section 24 28.004. 25 SECTION 2. Section 12A.004(a), Education Code, is amended 26 27 to read as follows:

Section 28.004, Education Code, is amended by 16 amending Subsection (c) and adding Subsections (r), (s), (t), (u), and (v) to read as follows: 17 The local school health advisory council's 18 (c) duties include recommending: 19 the number of hours of instruction to be provided 20 (1)in: 21 22 (A) health education in kindergarten through grade eight; and 23 (B) 24 if the school district requires health 25 education for high school graduation, health education, including physical health education and mental health education, in grades 9 26 27 through 12;

1 (2) policies, procedures, strategies, and curriculum 2 appropriate for specific grade levels designed to prevent physical 3 health concerns, including obesity, cardiovascular disease, Type 2 4 diabetes, and mental health concerns, including suicide, through 5 coordination of:

6 (A) health education, which must address 7 physical health concerns and mental health concerns to ensure the 8 integration of physical health education and mental health 9 education;

10 (B) physical education and physical activity; 11 (C) nutrition services; parental involvement; 12 (D) 13 (E) instruction on substance abuse prevention; school health services, including mental 14 (F) 15 health services; 16 (G) a comprehensive school counseling program 17 under Section 33.005; 18 (H) a safe and healthy school environment; and school employee wellness; 19 (I)20 (3) appropriate grade levels and methods of instruction for human sexuality instruction; 21 22 (4) strategies for integrating the curriculum components specified by Subdivision (2) with the following elements 23 24 in a coordinated school health program for the district: 25 (A) school health services, including physical health services and mental health services, if provided at a campus 26 27 by the district or by a third party under a contract with the

No. 1072 1 district; 2 (B) a comprehensive school counseling program under Section 33.005; 3 4 (C) a safe and healthy school environment; and school employee wellness; 5 (D) (5) if feasible, joint use agreements or strategies 6 7 for collaboration between the school district and community 8 organizations or agencies; 9 (6) strategies to increase parental awareness regarding: 10 11 (A) risky behaviors and early warning signs of suicide risks and behavioral health concerns, including mental 12 13 health disorders and substance use disorders; and available community programs and services 14 (B) 15 that address risky behaviors, suicide risks, and behavioral health 16 concerns; 17 (7) appropriate grade levels and curriculum for instruction regarding opioid addiction and abuse and methods of 18 administering an opioid antagonist, as defined by Section 483.101, 19 Health and Safety Code; [and] 20 21 (8) appropriate grade levels and curriculum for 22 instruction regarding child abuse, family violence, dating violence, and sex trafficking, including likely warning signs that 23 24 a child may be at risk for sex trafficking, provided that the local 25 school health advisory council's recommendations under this subdivision do not conflict with the essential knowledge and skills 26

4	(r) Subject to the restriction imposed by Section 28.0043
5	and using the procedure described by Subsection (e-1), the board of

7	outside of a course dedicated to human sexuality instruction
8	between a school employee and a student enrolled in the district
9	concerning topics included in the reproductive and sexual health

1 an extracurricular activity related to human sexuality. 2 (u) For purposes of adopting a communication policy under this section, "communication" includes any verbal or written 3 4 communication conducted in person or facilitated through the use of an electronic device, including communication conducted through a 5 telephone, including a cellular telephone, a computer, a computer 6 7 network, personal data assistance, a pager, e-mail, text message, 8 instant message, a social media application, or an Internet 9 website.

10 (v) If the attorney general or an appropriate district or 11 county attorney believes that a school district has violated or is violating the provisions of this section, the attorney general or 12 13 district or county attorney may bring a cause of action on behalf of the state to enjoin the district from violating the provisions of 14 this section. The action may be brought in a district court in 15 16 Travis County or a county in which any part of the violation or threatened violation occurred. The court may grant any prohibitory 17 or mandatory relief warranted by the facts, including a temporary 18 restraining order, temporary injunction, or permanent injunction. 19 20 SECTION 4. Subchapter A, Chapter 28, Education Code, is 21 amended by adding Section 28.0043 to read as follows: 22 Sec. 28.0043. RESTRICTION ON INSTRUCTION REGARDING SEXUAL ORIENTATION AND GENDER IDENTITY. (a) A school district, 23

24 <u>open-enrollment charter school, or district or charter school</u> 25 <u>employee may not provide or allow a third party to provide</u> 26 <u>instruction, guidance, activities, or programming regarding sexual</u> 27 orientation or gender identity to students enrolled in

1 prekindergarten through 12th grade. 2 (b) This section may not be construed to limit: 3 (1) a student's ability to engage in speech or 4 expressive conduct protected by the First Amendment to the United States Constitution or by Section 8, Article I, Texas Constitution, 5 that does not result in material disruption to school activities; 6 7 or (2) the ability of a person who is authorized by the 8 9 district to provide physical or mental health-related services to provide the services to a student, subject to any required parental 10 11 consent. SECTION 5. Section 12A.004(a), Education Code, as amended 12 13 by this Act, applies to a local innovation plan adopted or renewed before, on, or after the effective date of this Act. 14 15 SECTION 6. Section 28.004, Education Code, as amended by 16 this Act, applies only to a cause of action that accrues on or after the effective date of this Act. 17 18 SECTION 7. To the extent of any conflict, this Act prevails over another Act of the 88th Legislature, Regular Session, 2023, 19 20 relating to nonsubstantive additions to and corrections in enacted codes. 21 22 SECTION 8. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 23 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 24 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 25 Act takes effect September 1, 2023. 26
