1 AN ACT relating to access to criminal history record information for 2 3 certain employees, volunteers, and contractors, and for applicants 4 for those positions, by the Health and Human Services Commission. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 5 SECTION 1. Section 411.1106, Government Code, is amended by 6 amending Subsections (b), (c), (d), and (e) and adding Subsections 7 8 (b-1), (c-1), and (f) to read as follows: (b) The [executive commissioner of the] commission[, or the 9 executive commissioner's designee,] is entitled to obtain [from the 10 department] criminal history record information as provided by 11 Subsection (b-1) [maintained by the department] that relates to a 12 person who is required to be fingerprinted and is: 13 14 an applicant for an employment or volunteer (1) 15 position or an applicant for a contract with the commission [for a position] in which the person, as an employee, volunteer, or 16 17 contractor, an applicable, would have access to sensitive personal financial information, as determined by the executive 18 or commissioner, in: 19 (A) the eligibility services division of the 20 commission; [or] 21 22 (B) the commission's office of inspector general; or 23 24 (C) the regulatory services division of the

2	(2) an employee, volunteer, or contractor of the
3	commission who has access to sensitive personal or financial
4	information, as determined by the executive commissioner.
5	(b-1) Subject to Section 411.087, the commission is
6	entitled to:
7	(1) obtain through the Federal Bureau of Investigation
8	criminal history record information maintained or indexed by that
9	bureau that pertains to a person described by Subsection (b); and
10	(2) obtain from the department or any other criminal
11	justice agency in this state criminal history record information
12	maintained by the department or other agency that relates to a
13	person described by Subsection (b).
14	(c) Criminal history record information obtained by [the
15	executive commissioner of] the commission[, or by the executive
16	commissioner's designee, under Subsection $(b-1)(2)$ [(b)] may not
17	be released or disclosed, except:
18	(1) if the information is in a public record at the
19	time the information is obtained;
20	(2) on court order;
21	(3) to a criminal justice agency, upon request;
22	(4) with the consent of the person who is the subject
23	of the criminal history record information; or
24	(5) as provided by Subsection (d).
25	(c-1) Criminal history record information obtained by the
26	commission under Subsection (b-1)(1) may not be released or
27	disclosed to any person.

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1 (d) The commission is not prohibited from disclosing 2 criminal history record information obtained under Subsection 3 (b-1)(2) [(b)] in a criminal proceeding or in a hearing conducted by 4 the commission.

5 (e) The <u>commission</u> [executive commissioner] shall destroy 6 all criminal history record information obtained under <u>this section</u> 7 [Subsection (b)] as soon as practicable after the information is 8 used for its authorized purpose.

9 (f) This section does not prohibit the commission from 10 obtaining and using criminal history record information as provided 11 by other law.

12 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 13 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 14 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 15 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 16 Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
