## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

- 2 relating to a study on the effects of providing child life
- 3 specialist services to certain individuals who receive supportive
- 4 palliative care.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS. In this Act:
- 7 (1) "Advisory council" means the Palliative Care
- 8 Interdisciplinary Advisory Council established under Chapter 118,
- 9 Health and Safety Code.
- 10 (2) "Child life specialist" means a health care
- 11 provider that offers psychosocial support to pediatric patients and
- 12 to the children of seriously ill adult patients by helping improve a
- 13 child's coping skills, aiding in the development of holistic pain
- 14 management and other symptom management strategies for pediatric
- 15 patients, and improving the overall patient experience.
- 16 (3) "Commission" means the Health and Human Services
- 17 Commission.
- 18 SECTION 2. STUDY REGARDING CHILD LIFE SPECIALIST SERVICES.
- 19 (a) The commission, in collaboration with the advisory council,
- 20 shall conduct a study to assess the effects of supporting the use of
- 21 child life specialist services by or providing child life
- 22 specialist services to adult and child Medicaid recipients in this
- 23 state who receive supportive palliative care in inpatient or
- 24 community-based settings, including:

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- 1 (1) potential improvements to recipients' health care
- 2 outcomes and quality of life; and
- 3 (2) anticipated cost savings to this state.
- 4 (b) The study must identify:
- 5 (1) the role child life specialists currently play in
- 6 providing supportive palliative care services to individuals,
- 7 including Medicaid recipients, in inpatient and community-based
- 8 settings in this state;
- 9 (2) the current funding method for child life
- 10 specialist positions;
- 11 (3) opportunities for increasing the use of child life
- 12 specialist services in this state; and
- 13 (4) best practices for using child life specialist
- 14 services as developed by other states.
- 15 (c) The advisory council shall provide recommendations to
- 16 the commission regarding the structure and goals of the study,
- 17 including recommendations for:
- 18 (1) specific populations to receive supportive
- 19 palliative care under Medicaid;
- 20 (2) variables and outcomes to measure in the study;
- 21 and
- 22 (3) entities, including hospitals, hospices, and home
- 23 health agencies, with which the commission may collaborate to
- 24 conduct the study.
- 25 (d) The commission may:
- 26 (1) collaborate with private and public entities as
- 27 necessary to conduct the study; and

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- 1 (2) solicit and accept gifts, grants, and donations
- 2 from any public or private source to fund the study.
- 3 SECTION 3. REPORT TO ADVISORY COUNCIL AND LEGISLATURE. (a)
- 4 Not later than September 1, 2026, the commission shall prepare and
- 5 submit to the advisory council a report on the results of the study
- 6 conducted under this Act.
- 7 (b) The advisory council shall include the commission's
- 8 report under Subsection (a) of this section in the advisory
- 9 council's 2026 biennial report to the legislature required by
- 10 Section 118.010, Health and Safety Code.
- 11 SECTION 4. EXPIRATION. This Act expires December 31, 2026.
- 12 SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Act takes effect
- 13 immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members
- 14 elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas
- 15 Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for
- 16 immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
