SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

2 WHEREAS, The State of Texas and the United States federal 3 government have 1,254 miles of land to protect along Texas' border 4 with Mexico, a job that has become increasingly violent as this 5 state has been subjected to an invasion by foreign drug cartels; and 6 WHEREAS. These foreign drug cartels bring terror to Texas

6 WHEREAS, These foreign drug cartels bring terror to Texas 7 communities by flooding the streets with deadly narcotics, forcing 8 women and children into human and sex trafficking, enriching 9 themselves on the misery and enslavement of Texans, and butchering 10 and murdering anyone who tries to stop them; and

11 WHEREAS, State and local law enforcement agencies are forced 12 to contend with extensive and dangerous criminal activity resulting 13 from, or associated with, foreign drug cartels, thereby putting 14 Texas law enforcement officials in danger and draining resources 15 away from protecting our communities; and

16 WHEREAS, The State of Texas has acted to address the problem 17 by adding hundreds of commissioned law enforcement officers to the 18 border, purchasing state-of-the-art helicopters, conducting border 19 security surge operations, and paying millions of dollars for 20 overtime, training, equipment, and technology for local law 21 enforcement; and

22 WHEREAS, Law enforcement agencies working together in Texas 23 have seized billions of dollars in illegal drugs and hundreds of 24 millions in cash, along with thousands of firearms and other

1 weapons, all related to the invasion of foreign drug cartels; and

2 WHEREAS, Texas has repeatedly asked the federal government to 3 send more border security resources to the state, requesting an 4 increase in manpower and authority for border patrol agents and 5 other federal personnel; and

6 WHEREAS, Texas prisons house violent offenders that claim 7 foreign citizenship, and the state bears the cost of housing and 8 prosecuting those offenders; and

9 WHEREAS, Texas taxpayers have spent billions compensating 10 for the lack of federal resources provided to the state; and

11 WHEREAS, The federal government's failure to develop a 12 comprehensive plan to address this border security problem puts an 13 unfair and unreasonable burden on the entire state, especially on 14 Texas border communities, in violation of Article IV, Section 4 of 15 the United States Constitution; and

16 WHEREAS, Under Article I, Section 10, Clause 3 of the United 17 States Constitution, Texas is entitled as a sovereign state of the 18 United States of America to protect itself against this current 19 foreign drug cartel invasion; this constitutional authority grants 20 the State of Texas the power to defend the state when the state has 21 been invaded or is "in such imminent Danger as will not admit of 22 delay"; and

23 WHEREAS, The governor, in a letter to the president of the 24 United States on November 16, 2022, invoked the authority under 25 Article I, Section 10, Clause 3 of the U.S. Constitution, to protect 26 the State of Texas; now, therefore, be it

27 RESOLVED, That the 88th Legislature of the State of Texas

hereby demand the federal government to immediately declare violent
foreign drug cartels as foreign terrorist organizations under
Section 219 of the Immigration and Nationality Act, 8 U.S.C. § 1189;
and, be it further

5 RESOLVED, That the Texas Legislature hereby find that the 6 State of Texas has been invaded by foreign drug cartels and that the 7 citizens of this state are in imminent danger of irreparable harm; 8 and, be it further

9 RESOLVED, That the Texas Legislature hereby encourage all applicable state and local resources as needed, to use any and all 10 authority under Article I, Section 10, Clause 3 of the United States 11 Constitution to repel this violent foreign drug cartel invasion, 12 and that such authority should be invoked with the intention of 13 utilizing such authority in the most peaceful manner possible 14 15 consistent with bringing this invasion to a conclusion at the 16 earliest possible moment.
