My name is Mark Anthony Vasquez and I am in favor of HB 1708. I come to you today from the Rio Grande Valley and I speak for so many of us who have been TDCJ residents ourselves and who have loved ones as residents of a TDCJ facility. Truth is, there are so many of us who are formerly incarcerated and have the shared experiences of being in a TDCJ facility. And,

we carry within us what many do not see. I stand in support of HB 1708 because it is a humanitarian concern which calls to us as a society, to ask ourselves if we should permit inhumanity to continue. I feel HB 1708 is the correct response to this question. Quite frankly - it is the right thing to do.

The Texas heat has contributed to the deaths of so many of those incarcerated and has cost the state of Texas millions of dollars in lawsuits and wrongful death claims that one cannot afford to disregard these truths any longer. That this issue should fall upon the public charge over the bodies of TDCJ residents now long passed and gone is perhaps an apt illustration of the inhumanity altogether. What is the cost? Such a question beckons us as a community to call to mind that a human body has no defined price. Would it not? Such - I propose - were the discussions when in the 87th Legislative year a series of increment measures were passed to install proper cooling units in all TDCJ facilities by 2029. However, this measure failed to see any true application, as lawmakers failed to provide the money and the Senate did not pick up the bill. So, the question still lingers and the subject prevails - cost.

We as formerly-incarcerated and as system-impacted know all too familiar of the varying effects the term - cost - possesses in our lives. For, we have living memories of how this variable manifests itself in real-time - with stifling heat, measures to provide ice and water grow disregarded, medical emergencies due to the heat, and the countless deaths that go unnoticed or undocumented since - as medical professionals have cited - extreme heat is often overlooked or disregarded as a cause of death. More than two-thirds of the state's TDCJ facilities don't have any particular kind of device to determine temperature or indoor climate control. HB 1708 addresses this concern. Legislative measures in the past have suggested to us that the conversation in our halls of the Capitol have grown concerned, as well. Obviously, there is a professional desire to find remedy to meet these issues. Therefore, I urge our state lawmakers to act. And so I submit my own testimony in favor of HB 1708 because I stand with the thousands of families whose loved ones are TDCJ residents and who know that this is not right and that something needs to be done. I am in favor of HB 1708 because TDCJ facilities need a system of in-house climate control and/or a cooling system. This is the right thing to do and is the best way to address what is a very real humanitarian concern.
