Second, this cost will likely pass down to the consumer because companies will have to increase rates for transportation. My name is Stacy Elms, and I am Vice President, Risk Management for Housley Group. Housley is a 43 year old utility contractor, headquartered in San Angelo. We operate more than 200 regulated and unregulated vehicles in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas and Missouri. We respectfully oppose HB 3418 by Chairman Canales for several reasons. The bill authorizes the study of 300 regulated commercial vehicles to provide data for a potential VMT tax. This number is miniscule given the number of not only regulated commercial vehicles but unregulated vehicles and private cars and trucks. Given this number, the data will not provide any clear path to understanding the feasibility of a VMT. The State of Texas studied a VMT a number of years ago and rejected it. Several states have studied or are currently considering a VMT. That data is readily available and could be used to determine feasibility of a VMT in Texas without the significant cost to taxpayers.

Several states that implemented a VMT have discovered the significant flaws of VMT. It requires an enormous bureaucracy to collect the tax while a motor fuels tax is easily collected and is efficient. There is also significant evasion collecting VMT tax. In New Mexico, the estimate of evasion is as high as 43 percent. In New York the estimate is as high as 50 percent. Oregon has a low evasion rate of approximately 7 percent. Therefore, taxpayers have an inefficient system that costs more to operate and collects less in tax.

We agree that all users of our roads should pay for that privilege, and that increasing numbers of zero emission vehicles should pay their share. The process should be simple. Increase registration fees for electric, hybrid, hydrogen and other zero emission vehicles. The fee could be based on the value of the vehicle or the city of residence of the owner. Texans will be using motor fuels for decades. There is no hurry to implement a system that is inefficient, penalizes vast numbers of vehicle users and provides less income to build and maintain our network of highways.

For these reasons, we respectfully oppose House Bill 3418.
