- 2 (d) An order or official document signed by the county

- 7 authority or transfer the authority to a different county
- 8 commissioner, chief administrator, officer, or employee by filing

- 11 managerial authority of the commissioners court to a county chief
- 12 <u>administrator</u>. The delegating order must clearly indicate the

14 JUDGE OR COMMISSIONERS COURT IN CERTAIN COUNTIES. (a) This section

(1) has a population of more than 800,000;

(2) is located on the international border; and
